### Promotion Practices To Undergo Revision In School System Here

The East Haven Board of Education has adopted a set of promotional policies to cover the matter of promotions or retentions from the first grade through the high school. Because of the many phases which enter into the matter of promotion, it has been deemed necessary to put into writing policies which every teacher can follow in order to have as much consistency as possible within the system.

Under the direction of Supt. William Gillis and Elementary Supervisor Charlotte Brewer and Assistant Principal Thomas Murray and Mrs. Charlotte Spencer, of the high school, meetings have been held at regular intervals since last September and teachers at every grade level have participated. By a complete review of all the factors involved a comprehensive plan has been drawn up and approved by the Board of Education. All cases will follow the procedure set up.

The plan involves a good testing program, elimination of promotions "trial," limiting of skipping of grades requiring pupils who are not ready to go on to repeat grades after a review of the cases by the teacher, principal supervisor and superintendent.

## East Haven Flyer's Wife Greets Husband's Feats With Prayerful Emotion

"I don't want him to be a hero I just want him to come home."

That was the way Mrs. Alfred D. Hulse described her feelings when she greeted her husband, First Lieutenant Alfred D. Hulse in the Korean conflict last Sunday.

The former resident of 80 Taylor Street, East Haven, now a marine flyer, in company with two other flyers pounced on a concentration of Communist troops northeast of the Hwachon Reservoir and reported killing an estimated 80 to 175 troops, according to a press dispatch from Tokyo, Monday night.

The airmen are members of the Korea based First Marine Air Wing's Black Sheep squadron. They were directed to the concentration by a ground controller, it was said.

The Marine airmen strafed the enemy troops with 20mm machine cannon fire and dumped napalm and bombs into the positions. The dispatch said. The same flyers claimed direct hits on artillery pieces in the same area.

Lt. Hulse, 25, has been in Korea about two weeks, his wife the former Regina Spignesi of 229 Franklin Street, said last night.

When told of her husband's exploits in Korea, Mrs. Hulse made it

clear that "I don't want him to be a hero I just want him to come home."

The couple was married six months ago, Mrs. Hulse said.

A Marine reservist Lt. Hulse was recalled last September before entering his junior year at Yale. He served as a Marine pilot in World War II, but did not leave this country.

He was graduated from East Haven High School in 1943 and went immediately into the service. He was stationed at Trinity College, Hartford and received his wings in Pensacola, Fla., a short time later.

Discharged in September 1947, Lt. Hulse attended Cheshire Academy and a year later entered Yale to major in botany.

Lt. Hulse was stationed in El Toro Calif. before being sent to Japan on May 15. He remained in Japan five days and was assigned to duty in Korea with the First Marine Air Wing.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred O. Hulse, formerly of East Haven and Miami, Fla. He has a sister Mrs. Helen Blake, 593 Campbell Avenue, West Haven.

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## BOARD OF FINANCE AWAITS ACTION BY SCHOOL GROUP

### GIANTS OFFER CONTRACT TO BILLY BIXBY FRIDAY



The New York Giants of the National League will attempt to sign pitcher Billy Bixby of East Haven to a contract after watching him workout twice this week. In six innings of pitching Bixby allowed only two hits.

Bixby will go to New York on Friday with his father to hear the Giants' proposals. He will enter Suffield Academy next fall.

Giants scouts said that they were impressed with Bixby's poise and control. Likewise they had admiration for his newly developed cross-fire pitch.

Bill Bixby, who worked out last Monday in the Polo Grounds, accumulated a 12 and 6 record over one hundred and twenty nine innings and eighteen games played during his three years in high school.

Of his five losses four were by a single run and one by the margin of two runs. Three of the one run losses went into extra innings.

He has won only seventeen earned runs over the three year span for E.R.A. of 0.95. He issued 37 walks for an average of two per game and fanned 112 batters during he same high school schedule.

Included in his 18 game record are one no-hitter, three one hitters, and three hitters. Only once did he allow more than seven hits.

His 1951 feat of shutting out Branford twice within two weeks was never before accomplished by an East Haven pitcher. Bill turned in five shut-outs over the three year period.

The tall, well-built right hander will enter Suffield Academy next fall before entering college. Bill is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur M. Bixby of 6 Edward Street, East Haven.

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### BOARD OF FINANCE AWAITS ACTION BY SCHOOL GROUP

East Haven school teachers will depart for their summer vacation without signing contracts to teach another year. It was disclosed today when a member of the School Board said that no contracts will be signed until tomorrow night's meeting of after.

High School closes Friday and the remainder of the schools on Saturday.

The Board of Finance is apparently unmoved in its stand on the teachers' salary raise despite a hearing which was attended by 300 last Monday night in the high school auditorium. The latter group has taken the position that they were open for further proposals, had fallen on deaf ears within the Board of Education. It claims that such a meeting was never sought after they had presented a budget increase of \$15,000 compared to the Board of Education's budget request of \$47,300.

Monday's meeting lasted nearly an hour and a half and was called mainly to get public reaction on the matter.

A two mill increase in taxes is estimated if the latter's budget request is followed.

James F. Garland in discussing a resolution presented by Carleton Gould of Prospect Road argued that any action made at the hearing was not binding since it was not an authorized town meeting.

Gould's resolution which was unanimously adopted was:

"BE IT RESOLVED: That the salary schedule agreed upon between the Board of Education and the public school teachers of East Haven, Conn., is a fair and equitable one."

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That it is recommended that contracts be issued to the teachers by the Board of Education in accordance with the terms of the above mentioned schedule."

Sources close to the administration said today that the situation would probably be ironed out at a special Board of Finance meeting which would include members of the Board of Education.

Meanwhile serious other problems which will involve double sessions in two schools and the transfer of pupils in three others is occupying the Board of Education.

Schools affected are the South School, Tuttle School, Moinauguin School, Gerrish Avenue School and Union School.

South School pupils will be affected only on a temporary basis. Pupils in the kindergarten, first, second and third grades will use the present school building for double sessions. Some children will attend classes from 8 until noon and others will report at noon and stay until 4. Those in grades four through eight will follow the same plan, but will attend Tuttle School.

Overcrowding will force four of the upper grades at Moinauguin School to be on double sessions. These will be necessary despite the year-old addition. Enlarged classes have resulted in the appointment of an additional teacher at Moinauguin.

Transfer of the sixth grade at the Gerrish Avenue School to the Union School this fall will eliminate part of the double sessions at the former school.

Another problem is the ability of East Haven to provide adequate kindergarten facilities. Already more than 80 pupils in excess of this year's enrollment are registered for entry in September. The expected arrival of additional families with children in the kindergarten bracket during the Summer could add to the seriousness of this problem.

The American Automobile Association awards will be given to representatives from Waterbury, Stamford and Greenwich.

Mrs. Grace Mayney who is now principal of the present South School, will be advanced to the principalship of Laurel School. She has been a teacher in the system for 18 years, having taught in Highland and Moinauguin School.

Because of the changes taking place in the scope of elementary school principalships the Board of Education has decided to review its method of making appointments to this position. The increase in the number of male teachers in the elementary schools and the increased training for these positions have made it necessary to consider the problem. The board will have a committee to work on the question along with the superintendent and a committee of teachers so that a set of policies can be drawn up.


