The desperate need for blood for our armed forces in Korea and elsewhere is becoming increasingly evident. So far, collections from blood donors have not been sufficient to meet the requirements for blood injections and maintain an adequate margin of safety.

The indispensable character of this life-giving fluid has

The indispensable character of this life-giving fluid has not yet been brought home to the American people with sufficient force. If the wounded boys in Korea do not get the blood when they need it, they die.

Recently the Red Cross, in order to meet an emergency appeal for blood plasma for wounded combat troops was obliged to divert a supply that had originally been allocated for the armed forces at home and our civilian hospitals. The

temporary emergency was met, but obviously it did not end the continuing need for increasing blood supplies. The Red Cross has a full understanding of the require-

ments, and will insure proper and prompt distribution of blood supplies as rapidly as they are received. As part of its national program, a Bloodmobile unit is revisiting Branford. Donors may sign up now for the next visit on August 1. More than 200 donors are needed if Branford is to meet its quote.
