Barker Ridicules Demmies On Their 35 Mill Tax Stand

Does Not Advocate Approving All Items

Ridiculing the stand that the town faces a 35 mill tax increase, Frank A. Barker, G.O.P. town committee approved candidate for First Selectman, said today.

"Once more it becomes necessary to call attention to the arrogant, and in this case, almost insulting, tactics of Selectman Clancy's controlled Board of Finance. There has been a public announcement, by them, to the effect that the new proposed Town budget will cause a rise of ten mills if all requests are granted.

"The statement issued by the Board of Finance is an example of figure juggling that has become almost a democratic standard method of procedure. Here are the facts.

"The scare statement issued by Mr. Clancy and his clique contain the following key figures: 'The proposed new budget at \$965,000.2.' The estimated grand list for next year at \$27,000,000, and 3. The proposed budget increase over this year's figures, which is about \$140,000. What the Clancy group must have done is divide the amount of the budget by the amount of the grand list and then cry in horror that the result will be a 35 mill plus tax rate, or a rise of ten mills. What they carefully left out is the fact that East Haven has income other than that which comes from property taxes. These same men have estimated that this non-tax income for the present year will be \$133,000, and here's no reason to believe that it will be less next year. If, therefore, every budget request were to be granted, and this I would not advocate the sum of at least \$83,000 would have to be deducted from the \$965,000.2 budget figure before figuring the tax rate. In short, \$782,000 not \$965,000 would have to be raised by taxation. This would call for a tax rate of slightly less than 23 mills instead of the 35 mills, as claimed by the Clancy group.

Now it must be remembered that this mishandling of figures was done by men who have been dealing in figures for many years. It is impossible to believe that they could forget or neglect an item of \$133,000, or that the issuance of a public statement containing so glaring an error could be the result of mere carelessness. There must be a motive to find a motive for their action. The obvious explanation is that it was intended to scare the voters and taxpayers with this false threat of a huge rise in rate. Then, later, when the rate is finally laid, it would be pointed out that the super planning and financial genius of Mr. Clancy and his Democratic controlled Board has resulted in only a small tax rise instead of one ten mills. This same scare method was used last year when the papers carried an announcement by this same group, to the effect that a large tax rise would be necessary in order to meet budget requests. When the actual tax was laid, there was a half mill reduction in rate, rather than an increase. This would have been a real accomplishment if it had been accepted instead of the deception was not exposed at that time.

"The above is not a defense of a large budget or an attempt to belittle economy. None of us wants increased taxation. It is purely an attack upon the devious methods that have been used consistently by the Democratic administration. This is not an isolated case. Watch developments in the Momauguin Beach improvement project and observe how far actual happenings will depart from the publicity issued from the Town Hall.

"It appears to me that this juggling of facts and figures was done in an attempt to win a few voters from those who cannot see the fallacies. They represent an attitude toward East Haven people that is insulting in its low estimate of their intelligence. Does this indicate Mr. Clancy's opinion of the thinking capacity of East Haven? or does it mean that two years of fumbling and arrogance in office must be hidden, if possible, by trying to divert attention to ghosts and hobgoblins that do not exist anywhere except in Democratic publicity?"

"In this connection, I urge East Haven voters to be coldly analytical of all statements issued by either Democrats or Republicans. In spite of Democratic Town Chairman Garland's recent sarcasms and provable facts, I shall continue to use them as the basis for any statement I may make. Facts and the record do not permit the sort of confusion and contradictions that now exist between Mr. Clancy and Mr. Garland on the matter of whether or not an increase to teachers would or would not cause a large tax rise.
