HEAVY PUPIL ENROLLMENTS FORCE DOUBLE SESSIONS IN SCHOOLS HERE

Momauguin, Tuttle And South School Students Affected

Lack of adequate classroom space will force East Haven's school system to use double sessions when school opens next Wednesday, September 5th.

School officials expect a humper crop of pupils and point to increased kindergarten enrollment and the number of other pupils who have moved into town during the summer, as a new phase of overcrowded conditions.

Kindergarten enrollment has increased by approximately one hundred, school authorites say. In the high school 860 pupils are expected to be registered on Wednesday.

Because of the lack of space, double sessions will be in effect for all South School pupils and for some at Momauguin and Tuttle. For such a schedule the morning group attends from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon
