

On June 15, 1950, an Emergency Board appointed by the President under the terms of the Railway Labor Act—an Act largely fathered by the unions themselves—made its recommendations on certain wage and working conditions ("rules" in railroad language) which had been in dispute between employes and the railroads.

More Than 90% of Employes Accept Since then, terms equal to or better than the Board recommendations have been accepted by about 1,200,000 railroad employes—more than 00% of the total of all light of the control of the workers. They are represented by 20 of the 23 standard railroad unions.

Less Than 10% Refuse
But three unions—with about 130,000
men, or less than 10% of the total—have
refused to accept, even after months of
negotiations. These three unions are the
Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers,
the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen
and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway
Conductors. These are three of the socalled "operating" unions. Already the
highest paid men in the industry, their
leaders demand still further advantages
over other workers.

In all, there are about 270,000 operating
employes. But not all of them, by any
means, are represented by BLE, BLF&E,
or ORC. As a matter of fact, less than
half—132,000 to be exact—are in these
three unions. More than half—about
140,000—are in other unions, principally
the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.
What makes the whole situation so hard
to understand is that these 140,000 operating employes are working under wages
and rules which the leaders of the other

erating employes are working under wages and rules which the leaders of the other 130,000 say they cannot agree to.

What Do the Railroads Offer? What Do the Kailroads Uner?

They offer these three unions the same settlement which was contained in a Memorandum of Agreement signed at the White House on December 21, 1950, by four brotherhoods and the railroads. Later these brotherhoods sought to repudiate this agreement. But on May 25, 1951, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen signed a complete agreement carrying out the a complete agreement carrying out the

What About Wages?

Under the terms of the agreement, yard engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving a wage increase of \$.34 an hour (\$2.72 a day) and road engineers, firemen and conductors would now be ren increase of 19½ cen (\$1.56 per day). Large sums of retroactive pay have already accrued and if the agree-ment is carried out, will be paid promptly. What About "Cost of Living" Increases? What About "Cost of Living" increases?
The White House Agreement includes and
"escalator" clease under which wages will
be geared to changes in the Government's
cost-of-living index. Two such increases
—April and July. 1951—have already been
paid to the 90% of railroad employes covered by signed agreements.

What About the 40-Hour Week? What About the 40-Hour Week?
The White House Agreement calls for the establishment of the 40-hour week in principle, for employes in yard service. The employes can have it any time after January 1, 1952, provided the manpower situation is such that the railroads can get enough men to perform the work with reasonable regularity at straight time rates. If the parties do not agree on the question of availability of manpower, the White House Agreement provides arbitration by areferee appointed by the President.

What Else Do the Union Leaders Demand? The continued quibbling of the leaders of the three unions has to do principally with

which take in two or more seniority districts.

The union leaders would bar progress and efficiency in the incustry, and better service to the public, by maintaining a situation where they can arbitrarily stop a railroad from establishing such interdivisional runs. The carriers propose that if a railroad wishes to set up an interdivisional run, the railroad and the unions should try to agree on such run and the conditions which should surround its establishment, and if the railroad and the unions can't agree, the matter will be submitted to arbitration.

But the three union leaders still refuse. Rules Can Be Arbitrated The railroads have not only offered these three unions the same rules agreed to by the BRT and covered by the White House Agreement, but have even agreed to submit such rules to arbitration.



Election Laws Revision

Thursday, November 1, 1951

This newspaper is pleased to note that the Secretary of State has called a conference of Town Clerks and Registrars of Voters on November 16 to discuss the revision of the Election Laws. We have complained before about the looseness of the Election Laws in this state, particularly in the absentee ballot

The galloping around by both sides just before election day to determine how many absentee ballots can be attained must be eliminated.

We shall continue to complain about the abuses of the absentee ballot as long as the gross violations in this field are perpetuated. While we concede that the right to vote absentee should be privileged in certain instances, we do not fee that it should be allowed indiscriminately to "Any qualified elector *** who is unable to appear at his polling place ** because of absence from state, illness, or physical disability ***.' It is our opinion that every person casting an absentee bal-

be certified by some method which would protect the fraudulent use of the absentee ballot. In the case of physical disability there should be some method by which it is established that the individual casting his ballot is of sound mind. In the case of those absent from the state it should be established that the elector is a bonafide

lot, with the exception of those in the armed forces, ought to

resident of the town in which he is voting. Correction of said abuses by strengthening the Election Laws should be worked for by political parties on a non-partisan basis. The right to vote is a sacred privilege which is fundamental to a democracy.

Every citizen should be a jealous master of his privilege to cast a secret ballot at the polls. Furthermore, he ought to guard the privilege of any other voter to cast a secret ballot whether at the polls or in absentia.





Connecticut's Public Utilities Commission sees to it that the rate you pay for our service is a fair charge.

Our state's PUC consists of three Commissioners, appointed by the Governor and the General Assembly, who work with a staff of accountants and engineers and other specialists. Among their many duties is the responsibility for making certain that rates charged by public utilities like ours are fair - both to the public and to the utility.
