To Raise Polio Funds Starts Month Campaign

Starts Month Gampaign

The campaign for polio fighting funds got underway in this community and throughout the nation this week, as volunteers geared themselves for the doubled effort that will be necessary to help the March of Dimes keep pace with the march of polio.

The campaign period has been doubled this year because the National Foundation has been forced into debt four years in succession by surging polio incidence. The drive started Jan. 2 and will continue until the end of the month.

During the last four years, the National Foundation and its chapters have spent \$79,00,000 in March of Dimes funds for patient care charges alone, as compared with \$41,000,000 in the previous ten-year span.

This situation was brought about not only by rising costs but also because there were more cases during the last four years than in the entire previous decade.

Added to increased costs and increased incidence has been a third factor that has compounded the difficulties of the National Foundation. Polio doesn't just hit and run. The effects of any one year's epidemic are not soon forgotten by many of the stricken ones, nor by the National Foundation chapters which pay the bills. In 1951, for example, the March of Dimes organization provided care for 45,000 men, women and children stricken in prior years—in addition to the four out of five of the new patients who needed and received help.

This black picture has meant that the National Foundation is annually faced with an average of 30,000 cases, in contrast to the ten to twelve thousand cases a year formerly considered "normat."

The Branford post office handled the greatest amount of Christmas mail in its history during the recent Christmas season, according to Postmaster Joseph Driscoll.

Although the post office is still working on final figures for the Christmas period, Driscoll said it was obvious to all employes that this year's volume was heavier than

Driscoll said that parcel post packages were especially numerous this year, both incoming and outgoing. He estimated that the parcel post volume was about twice that of previous years, when increasingly high rates have been noted.

All mail at the Branford office was out by Christmas Eve, and the last mail which was delayed by the holiday was disposed of yesterday. Driscoll said, He said there was no backlog of mail in the local branch at this time.



New UConn Publication

Nobody has a greater variety of duties than a town clerk, according to a publication just released by the university of Connecticut's Institute of Public Service. of Public Service.
The town clerk, the booklet notes, is cutodian for hundreds of different types of documents and assorted bits or information. He keeps the minutes of meetings, issues marriage and other licenses, records vital statistics and serves, mean-while, as the channel of com-munication between the state and munication between the state and the town.

The new publication, "Handbook for Connecticut Town Clerks and Town Treasurers," Is the latest in the series of handbooks on Connecticut town government issued by the institute of Public Service.

This newest booklet was prepared by Max R. White of the university's Government Department faculty, as were two earlier booklets in the series, "The Connecticut Town Meeting" and "Handbook for Connecticut Selectmen." The present publication appears as a University of Connecticut Builetin, and copies are being supplied to town clerks and treasures.

treasures.

The handbook analyzes Connecticul statutes relating to the clerks and treasurers. It also includes material especially appropriate for rural communities where the clerk may also serve as treasurer.
The town clerk's office, establish ed in 1639, has become the center of many activities of primary signi-ficance to individuals and families. The hasic public records of property ownership and of the various limita-

ownership and of the various limitations and impairments of these property rights are kept by the clerk. He issues marriage licenses and receives and files certificates of births and deaths.

The lown clerk's office is familiar to many as a place to obtain hunting, fishing or dog licenses. But, as the new booklet points out, it also is the place for registration of owners of honey bees and ferrets.

In the clerk's office is a miscellary of other information: Licenses held by physicians, midwives and others practicing a profession in the community; articles of association of religious bodies, certificates of election of Methodist Church trustices and the description of sixay

The Modern Calendar, Mrs. Alden J. Hill Which is Quite New, To Supervise March Unified Time In World Of Dimes Campaign

The Gregorian calendar has been in popular usage only since the late 18th century, and was the first calendar to bring about such a world unity on the time front.

Yet, it has not satisfied everyone in fact, someone is always trying to introduce a new one.

One of these, concocted by a schoolboy about the time of the first World War, was considered seriously for many years. It was even brought to the attention of congress in 1945 and the countries of China and Great Britain showed interest.

Entitled the Edwards Perpetual Calendar, the plan offers striking revisions from the present Gregorian. To start, New Year's Day is not attached to any month of the year, but precedes Monday, January 1. Monday, incidentally, always starts the week, with Saturday and Sunday at the end of the week, where it would seem, a week-end belongs.



An old favorite house plant, still enjoying popularity in many modern homes is the Christmas Cactus (Zygocactus truncatus), a toughie, often skipping a year's blooming because of neglect, or over care. If the plant fails to set buds, or drops them after they have been formed, the trouble is probably due to one or more of the following causes. Over watering—cactus requires comparatively little moisture during most of the year. When flower buds begin to show (like little plink pinheads at first) watering should be gradually increased. Insufficient watering will result in a flabby appearance of the whole plant, with the leaf-life stem sections losing their normal form and texture. Sharp changes in temperature or cold drafts, may cause the buds to drop. The Christmas cactus is not finleky about temperatures, but does object to sudden variations, especially at the critical budforming time. If the plant is near a window, slip cardboard, or a few pieces of newspaper, between it and the glass on extremely cold nights as a barrier to chilling. While all Cacti do well on comparatively lean diets, a twice a mointh application of manure water of a liquid fertilizer, from the time the buds begin to form until the plant is through flowering, will generally be beneficial. Foliage that is abnormally light-colored or yellowed usually indicates a degree of undernourishment, to be remedled by the foregoing method Artificial gas—even the faintest trace of it, is a cause for non-flowering, "There is no remedy for this, except to move the plant" permanently to gas free quarters. When the plant is through flowering which may, not be until weeks after Christmash gradually reduce watering, but do not let it dry out. If repotting is necessary, the best time to do it is shortly before the plant goes outdoors for the summer. Old plants, in good sized polss or tubs often go on for years without a change, cheerfully providing their annual show of pendant blooms indoors in a

It is not to late to grow some of those good natured billis which will bloom indoors in a dishr or glass vase, without benefit of soil. All they require is to be supported by pebbles fibre, or some similar medium. Those which bloom most readily under this treatment include Ferneth, Roman and Ditch Hyganths, the familiar Paper White Narcissus and the less well known but just as easily grown. 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
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
