QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

A-No. The additional guarantee may be used only in connection with a GI home loan. Q—I was disabled in service in 1949. Would I be eligible for vocational training under the program that recently was set up for Korean disabled veterans? disabled veterans?

A—No. One of the requirements of the law is that the disability must have occurred after June 27, 1950, the official date of the outbreak of Korean hostilities.


Q—I intend to apply for an increase in my pension to \$120 a month, since I'm so severely disabled that I need the regular aid and attendance of another person in order to get about. If the increase is granted, will it be retroactive to the date that I first got on VA's pension rolls?

A-No. If VA awards you the increase, it will become effective as of the date you filed your application. Q—I'm a Korean veteran, hospitalized for a service-connected disability, and I'm now awaiting my final discharge. May I apply for vocational training available to Korean veterans? Korean veterans?

A—Yes. Members of the armed forces hospitalized while awaiting final discharge may qualify for the training provided they meet all requirements. They may not receive

bsistence payments, however, for to actual discharge or sepration.

Medical research laboratories are the arsenals for the FREEDOM, AS WE HAVE COME TO KNOW IT IN AMERICA, BRINGS
INDEPENDENCE OF MIND AND
SPIRIT, SECURITY FROM OPPRECEION
THE OPPORTUNITY fight against heart diseases. There, skilled investigators are working, day after day, with endless patience. Specialists in bio-chemistry, pathology, nutrition, physiology, electronics and many other sciences are forging new weapons, which in physicians' hands are saving and prolonging lives. In these laboratories, all the techniques of modern science have been mobilized in the search for increased understanding of the heart and blood vessels and the diseases that attack them. The investigators who man these laboratories are creating "new hope for hearts"-slogan of the Heart Fund appeal that opens February 1 and runs throughout the month.

What if laboratories were to close—what if scientists were to leave their work unfinished? Of course, such a thing is unthinkable. Yet, if no one gave to the Heart Fund, powerful support for heart research would be lost-promising new lines of investigation would be threatened—many hopes would fade.

In these days when manpower is so vitally needed for the defense effort, it is sobering, indeed, to reflect on some of the statistics relative to this leading cause of disability and death in America. In the year 1950, alone, 745,440 persons died of diseases of the heart and circulatory system. It is estimated that some 176,000,000 work-days were lost in a single year through cardiovascular illnesses. Another estimate was that 10,000,000 Americans are affected by these diseases.

Yet, it is a tremendous task. It was only 13 years ago, 1939, that the first successful operation was performed upon a living heart. This was to remedy a congenital defect. Less than three years ago, the first successful operation was accomplished inside a heart chamber. It corrects a valvular deformity caused by rheumatic fever. Dramatic progress is being made in the treatment of some forms of heart disease through recently developed drugs, notably penicillin and new hormone derivatives. New methods of control and rehabilitation are being developed.

But work of the affiliated heart associations does not stop with research. For new information to be put to work, postgraduate education of physicians in latest advances must be a constant objective.
