The Boy Scouts are trained from their earliest association with the organization to adopt a code of living that will make them responsible and useful citizens in later life. Boy Scout Week is indeed an occasion on which we can pause and consider its mark on the youth of the nation. Since 1910, more than nineteen million American boys and men have been influenced by this Scout Oath:

"On my honor I will do my best-to do my duty to Goo and my country, and to obey the Scout Law; to help other people at all time; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight."

For its young members, known as Explorers, the pledge of dedication could be well adopted by all Americans. And from this pledge we quote in part: "I will share the responsibility of my home, school, church, neighborhood and community; and when legally of age, I will register and vote in all elections. I will deal fairly and kindly with my fellow citizens of whatever race or creed, in the spirit of the Scout Law and America's tradition of equality of opportunity.

"I will work to preserve our American heritage of libert, and responsibility. I acknowledge that the privileges we enjoy were won by the hard work, and sacrifices, faith and clear thinking of our forefathers. I will do all in my power to pass on a better America to the next generation."
