No, it has a representative town meeting, with members elected by the rest of the voters. These members are supposed to be a sort of elite of the town who will really attend to business and use their heads-but of course the supposition now stands exposed to ridicule and contempt.

Only one voice was raised against the interruption of the meeting for this purpose, that of Miss Florence Tinkham, who said, "Falmouth has sunk" business of the community.


