Pfc. Anastasiou is assigned to the controller section at the headquarters of Continental Division, Continental, with two other MATS divisions, forms a world-wide air route command composed of personnel and equipment from both the Air Force and Navy.

In support of UN troops in Korea, MATS furnishes an around-the-clock airlift of cargo and personnel to the Far East, and evacuates wounded to U. S. hospitals on return trips.

Mrs. Asa Hunt is East Haven chairman for the 1952 Easter Seal Drive. She appeals to all residents to help in the rehabilitation of the physically handicapped through the purchase of the seals which have been mailed to homes throughout the New Haven area.

The drive is sponsored by the Connecticut Society for Crippled Children and Adults of which the New Haven Curative Workshop is the local agency. At the workshop occupational therapy and physical therapy is administered by skilled technicians to help victims of cerebral palsy, polio and other crippling diseases, strokes and accidents to overcome these handicaps.

Eighty-five per cent of the funds is retained for the support of the Curative Workshop. The remainder goes for the work of the Connecticut Society for Crippled Children and Adults which operates Camp Hemlocks, a camp for crippled children, and for the national organization for education and research.

New Walk Signal Placed At Junction Of Main and High
