In spite of the extension of the Red Cross Fund Campaign, in the local branch the total to date is only \$1500 which falls far short of the quota of \$4500 which is needed to meet the budget set up for the coming year. Flfty per cent of the total raised is returned to National for Disaster Relief and the balance s kept in the local branch treasury. Unless the quota is raised, it is possible that the Water Safety Program which enrolls about 200 school children every Summer will have to be climinated. Also, it is finy through local contributions that the Red Cross Bloodmobile visits are made possible and by this means blood for the boys in Korea and for the Veterans' and local hospitals, is made available. 




