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## FERGUSON SUIT AGAINST FORD SETTLED!

On April 9, 1952, the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York entered a final judgment, with the consent of all parties, which ended four years of litigation between Harry Ferguson, Inc. and Ford Motor Company and others. It was ordered and adjudged that: 1. The sum of \$9,250,000 shall be paid to Harry Fergu-

- son, Inc. as royalties on Patents Nos. 1,916,945; 2,118,180; 2,223,002, and 2,486,257.
- 2. Ford Motor Company shall not manufacture, after December 31, 1952, such tractors, and Dearborn Motors Corporation shall not sell any such tractors manufactured after December 31; 1952, as have



This notice will continue to be affixed until October 25, 1966.

- 3. The Ford Motor Company and Dearborn Motors Corporation shall have a period of time, expiring not later than December 31, 1952 in which to make these changes.
- 4. All other claims and counter claims are dismissed and withdrawn on the merits.


