



Install New Telephone Cables Along U.S. 1 To Provide Branford-Guilford Direct Dialing



A familiar sight along U.S. 1, as telephone crews work on the extensive installations of new cable that will permit direct dialing between the Branford and Guilford exchanges when Guilford is converted to dial operation in July.

Here, on a cable platform twenty feet above the highway, cable splicer Ralph L. Hill (right), who lives at 90 Seaside Avenue, Guilford, and his helper, William B. Hinckley, of 6 Clenmoor Drive, East Haven, are shown completing a splice in one of the cable sections.

The cables are being installed from the Branford telephone building underground out East Main Street to Beach Street. Acrial cable then follows the Post Road to within a mile of the Guilford town line where it is to be connected to a portion of existing cable.

In Guilford, aerial cable runs from the town line along U. S. 1 to West River, and then goes underground to connect with the dial equipment in the new Guilford telephone building on Church Street.

This project, which requires cable containing more than 4,800 miles of copper wire, is typical of telephone activity throughout the state. Telephone construction, which has totalled \$142,000,000 in Connecticut since World War II, will continue to be carried on with all the speed that the availability of critical materials permits.

While attending Tri-State. Pozzi has been active in the Electrical Engineering Society, and was given a Silver Key award for scholastic attainment.

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
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
