

Defense Act Retains Rent Control Program

Area Rent Director Clarence C. Westerberg stated Monday that the new Defense Production Act recently enacted does not materially change the administration of the Federal Rent Stabilization protection for the strong eviction protection for tenants, adjustments for landlends. for landlords who improve their property and the leading role played by volunteer unpaid Rent Advisory Boards all remain as im-pertant provisions of rent stabilizaion." Westerburg said.

Westerberg pointed out, however, that the new bill continues Federal rent stabilization until September 30,/1952 for areas presently under rent stabilization unless, by September 30, they have been declared "critical" or have exercised their right of local option given by the Congres to ex tend these controls for critical areas and for those which exercise their extension right the Feds eral Rent Stabilization program is extended to April 30, 1953. 

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

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
