An itemized list of expenses for he coming year shows that the argest single item helping to raise the proposed budget \$131,169 over the past year's school expenditures is an increase of \$64,102 in salaries for regular teachers. Most of the proposed increase is for the teach-ing staff of the elementary schools thing staff of the elementary schools which would receive \$226,917 as a gainst \$178,400 for the 1951-52 year. The regular high school payroll, in comparison, would go fro its present \$157,295 to \$172,880.


