# Wheeler And Leigh Fined \$50 Harold La Pointe For Evading Responsibility

First to appear was Patrolman Albert Wheeler, 36, of 25 Martin Road, who was suspended Tuesday. August 26, after the car he was driving struck a parked car on Main Street in a night-time ac-

cident the previous Wednesday.

At the time of the accident, William P. Leigh, 35, of 47 Short Beach Road, owner of the car that Patrolman Wheeler was driving, told police he was behind the wheel when the accident occurred. However subsequent investigation and statements from witnesses led police to believe that Wheeler and not Leigh was the actual driver when the crash occurred,

Attorney General George C Conway, who acted as counsel for the defendant entered a plea of note contendere to the charge of evading responsibility and asked the judge to consider that his client had struck his head against the windshield.

Judge Fasano found Wheeler "gulity" on the evasion count, but nolled a second count of reckless driving, on the recommendation of Town Prosecutor Robert M.

'I understand that this man has been suspended from police duty, and that the Board of Public Safety will consider his case," said Judge Fasano, He said he would leave further handling of the case

After a short recess, Leigh appeared in court to answer a charge of evading responsibility arising out of a similar accident last Thursday when his car, the same one Wheeler had been driving

one wheeler had been driving, struck a parked auto belonging to Arthur Braun, of 51 Martin Road. Attorney Arthur O'Keefe, counsel for Leigh, told the judge that his client had struck the parked car early in the morthing and since the damage was foll great, walted the damage was not great, waited until the following day to locate the owner.
The defense told the court that

Leigh had enlisted the aid of Patrolman Wheeler in trying to discover the owner of the damaged auto, and that, after locating Mr. Braun, he agreed to pay for the damages and requested that he (Braun) ask the police to withdraw the charges.

Counsel for the defendant en-

tered a plea of nolo contendere and requested that Judge Fasano con-sider that Leigh had made a satisfactory settlement with the owner

of the damaged car.
Judge Fasano announced he
could "do no more than find the could "do no more than find the defendant guilty and impose the minimum penalty of \$50." Judge Fasano told O'Keefe, "I don't see any reason why the defendant couldn't have rung a doorbell after the accident and left his name with

the owner of the damaged car."
Judge Fasano pointed out the association of Leigh and Wheeler and stated it was his hallef that both had resorted to their action to hide the fact; that they had been drinking. The judge also reverted to his judgment on Wheeler's case as-serting that he thought that "as an officer, his (Wheeler's) conduct was reprehensible."

A charge of violation of motor vehicle laws lodged against Leigh in the first case was nolled by Judge Fasano with a warning to the defendant that he might have been prosecuted on a false information charge.

### Total Of 2,835 In East Haven Schools, Superintendent Says

The total public school registra tion in East Haven has reached a record high of 2,835, or an increase of 228 over last year's figures Superintendent William E. Gillis announced.

Mr. Gillis sald that there were 575 high school students compared with 550 last year. Use of high school classes for the seventh and eighth grades of Union, Tuttle and Gerrish Schools, a class of pupils from Foxon and Highland Schools and a fourth grade from Gerrish School brings to a total of 865 the number of students and publis using the high school.

In the elementary classes from kindergarten through the eighth grade, the number of enrolled ju-plis stands at 2,260, or an increase of 203 over last year.

## Barker Says Dump Conditions Being Given Attention

Nine days of dry weather combined with cooler temperatures during the evening so far, have helped to reduce the number of mosquitoes in the Momanguin beach area. At the same time, several proprietors remaining open in the Cosey Avenue Beach section insisted that the problem of files

First Selectman Frank, Barker stated this week that he has been working on the insect problem in tain corrections in the system of control can be effected.

Replying to criticism that the disposal of rubbish at the town dump was unsatisfactory, Mr. Barker explained that a breakdown of a bulldozer used to cover rubbish had forced a temporary halt to usual dump practices. Julius Elston, chief of the Mosquito Control Division, -- had criticized the filing of tin cans at the dump as providing breeding places for mos-

The first selectman said that the recommended practice at the dump was to excavate pits, push the cans cover them up. Because of difficulty in getting parts for the bull-dozer, he said, the practice had to be discontinued until the equipnent was repaired.

Mr. Barker also pointed out that abnormally heavy rains were responsible more than any other factor, for the mosquito problem The first selectman asserted that in his opinion, East Haven had more satisfactory dump management than some neighboring com munities.
He said that he also hoped to

secure the cooperation of people in refraining from dumping garbage at the dump. Closing off the dump after daylight hours may help to discourage this unsanitary practice, he said, which provides breeding grounds for flies.



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
