The director presented maps and financial estimates on the million-dollar project, which is now under consideration by Federal officials. If approved, it will be presented to a Town meeting in the near future.

Mr. Beausolell said that assessed valuations in the area would rise from a present value of \$775,000 to \$1,850,000 if the development were undertaken. Tax revenue would b more than doubled, he said.

In answer to questions regarding the relocation of property owners, the agency director said that each home would have to be approved by the Federal Housing Authority, which would then provide loans for the construction of new homes. rising costs of operations.

Despite their best efforts, Cretel-la continued, local officials cannot meet the demand of their citizens because they are not getting their fair share of the total tax pie. He contrasted this with 1932 when local governments received 55 per cent of the total tax dollar with the balance divided between the state and local governments.

The solution to the twin problem

of high federal taxation and inflation, he said, lies in a reduction of the federal budget. He called for the election of General Eisenhower, saying that it was the best hope of achieving that objective. Because 75 per cent of the current oudget is devoted to defense, Cre lella said, Eisenhower's experience qualifies him to cut the military spending portion of the budge

### **Petition Requests** Jetty Be Built To Halt Erosion

A special town meeting will be held Tuesday at 8 p. m. in the lown hall auditorium to consider a petition for the construction of a protective jetty in the vicinity of Mansfield Grove, the Board of Selectmen announced.

The meeting was called after a petition bearing 27 signatures was submitted to the board by a group of Momanguin property owners whose shore properties are in serious danger from the crosive ac-tions of shore currents and tides.

The petition requests the consideration of the struction of a jetty (or other such structure as is deemed necessary to restore and protect" a portion of the beach area. It also seeks to have the Board of Finance authorize the appropriation of money to finance the construction.

It is the hope of the property owners, located in a shore area bounded approximately by First Avenue and Bradford Cove that the Tuesday meeting will author-ize both construction and the necessary financing. However, town officials seems to feel that the Board of Finance could only be authorized to look into the proposal and that it would have submit a report and recommenda tions to another town meeting.

The sixproperty owner immediately affected by the serious ero sive condition all have riparian rights and own property to the high water mork, Some officials seemed to feel that the legality of this request may be affected by these rights and that ownership o ferred to the town.

Indications were that the pro-perty owners may be willing to turn over shore rights which would

make the area a public beach. Examination of the beach area evealed that sand, which had previously served as a protection a-gainst erosive currents had mostly been washed away so that, at high tide and during storms, several of the beach homes are now in seri-ous danger of being completely undermined.

It is believed that the disinte-gration of a jetty near the Bradford Cove outlet together with a shift in the course followed by the waters of the tidal creek are mainly responsible for the serious

### To Support State Wide Program Of **Erosion Control**

A pledge to explore "every possibillty" in securing a program of erosion control along East Haven's shoreline was made yesterday by two local Republican candidates for the state House of Representa-tives. The declaration was made shortly after the Board of Select-men announced, a town meeting on a petition for the construction of a jetty near Mansfield Grove.

The candidates, Mrs. Elizabeth M. Croumey, and Adelbert C. Maulle, declared in a joint statement that they would explore every possibility for h program to curb or half beach erosion along the or halt beach erosion along the town's long frontage on Long Island Sound." 
