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Advices Removing Seventh Grades From High School

A recommendation that the seventh grades be retained in the grammar schools in order to keep the number of children affected by double-sessions at a minimum was made by Supt. William Gillis in his report before the Board of Education Friday night.

According to the report an estimate was made that all the classes in the Mannaquin school will be held on double session, six classes in Union school, eight in Gerrish Avenue school, and two in Laurel. Under the recommended arrangement the seventh grades of Laurel and Foxon will be combined with the seventh grade of Highland.

Gillis also reported that if kindergartens are established at Laurel and Foxon, still more double sessions will be required.

He estimated that under his recommended plan approximately 835 pupils will be involved in a double session program, whereas in the high school approximately 1,000 pupils would be affected, with still almost as many elementary pupils on the double session plan.

The report revealed that by November 10 the grand total of pupils was 2,843 or an increase of 18 over the September figures shortly after school opened. In the last month the elementary enrollment went up by 12 pupils. The superintendent reported that the average first grade enrollment is 34 pupils which he described as "rather high for this particular grade." He said he would provide the committee on schools with detailed enrollment figures as soon as the groups had named a new committee member to fill a vacancy now existing.

Approves Purchases
The board approved the purchase of a Bell saw-planer at a cost of \$490 and a paper cutter at a cost of \$426.40 for the Industrial Arts department in the high school. John Corbett, board secretary, said that the two pieces of equipment were of vital importance and were being bought instead of other equipment originally requested but not available.

The school board also voted to have a letter of appreciation sent to the Lions club for the setting up of figure traffic signs in the vicinity of town schools in order to warn motorists of school children.

Florence Parker, school nurse, submitted her annual report for the recent school year, explaining that an increase in enrollment of school children by approximately 850 pupils since 1944 has increased her duties considerably. She estimated that accidents of all degrees and illness requiring treatment or attention of some kind total more than a thousand annually.

Praise was given to the Christmas Seals program under which annual tuberculosis X-rays are made of students in the upper grade levels. In September, 1951, 565 persons were examined by X-ray at the high school.

Foxon Contractor Succeeds Allen On School Board

George T. Letis, of Hunt Lane, Foxon, was appointed to the Board of Education Friday to fill the unexpired term of John Allen, who resigned recently because of pressure of business.

Letis was one of names nominated by members of the board at their session Friday. The name of Vincent Vetrone, who retired recently after completing a term on the board, was also presented. Letis was appointed by a vote of four to two.

It is the new board member's first public office, although he has been serving as chairman of the building sites committee appointed last July.

A resident of Foxon for the past 10 years, Letis is a general contractor. A native of New Haven he attended Commercial High and finished an academic course in Booth Prep. He has been active in the boy scouts for about six years and is commissioner for the East Haven scouting district. He is a member of the Foxon Volunteer Fire Company and of the Foxon School PTA.

The new board member is married to the former Mildred Lindhardt, also of New Haven. They have two sons, Tommy, 15, attending the High School, and Michael, 11, at Highland. His term runs until the town elections next year, when the seat will be filled by the voters.

The seals were accompanied by a letter signed by Albert D. Davidson, president of the association, who expressed his hope that recipients would use the seals freely this year in decorating their holiday mail and Christmas packages.

Such usage he said would show that we are cooperating in the vital struggle to keep our community free from the inroads of tuberculosis.

Davidson stated that funds derived from this year's sales will enable the association to provide safeguards such as tuberculin tests, X-rays, clinics and nursing services to adults and children.

The seals sell for \$1.00 a sheet and early returns are urged. Checks should be made payable to Frederick Klein, treasurer.

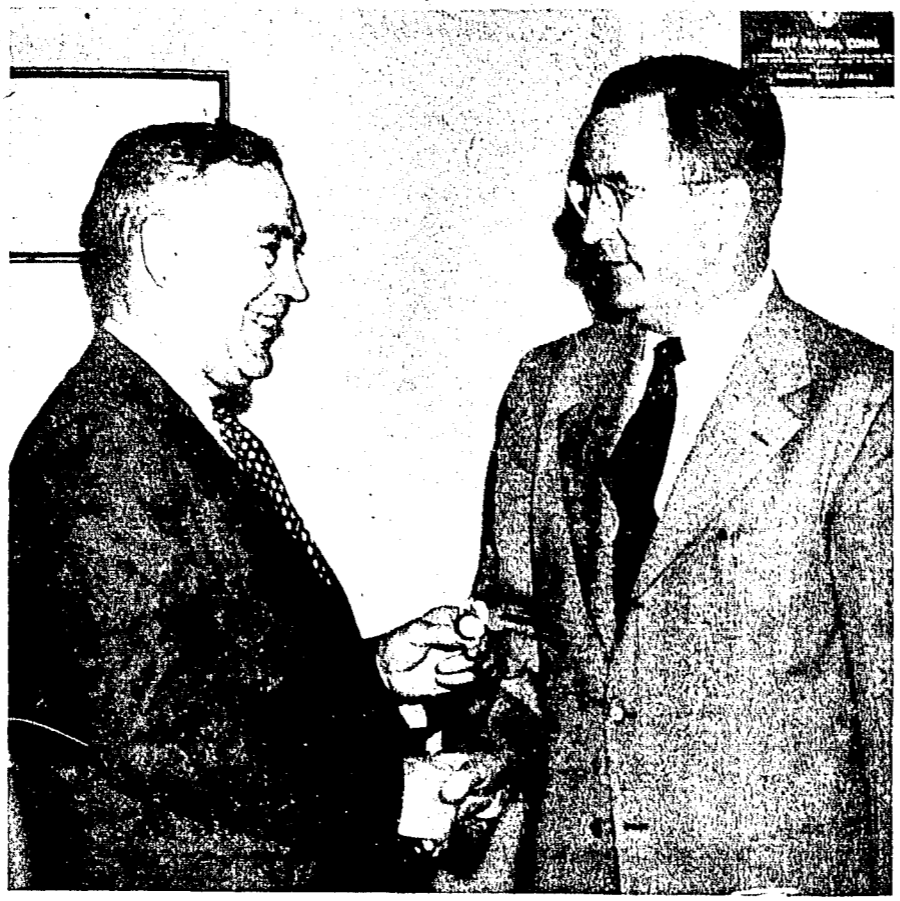

Fund For Nearly Blind Baby Rises To Total Of \$124

Contributions to a trust fund being set up for a nine-months-old East Haven boy afflicted with glaucoma continue to mount and reached a total of \$124 by Monday morning, according to Mrs. Joseph Bianchi, a co-sponsor of the fund.

Meanwhile, the child Bruno, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruno Anderoli, of 72 Charter Oak Avenue, is being readied for his sixth operation, the "News" learned today. Doctors will perform an operation on his right eye to help relieve the internal tension caused by the eye disease with which he is afflicted.

Several weeks ago, his left eye, which is more seriously affected, was operated on in an attempt to prevent complete blindness. Young Bruno was born with the affliction last February 4 in the New Haven hospital.

Many messages of sympathy and offers of aid have been received from townspeople since the "News" reported the plight of little Bruno last week, according to Mrs. Bianchi. As neighbors, she and Mrs. Tod Solevo, of 15 Haines street, began a campaign several weeks ago to raise a small trust fund to help Bruno get the extra care he will need.

Doctors attending the case are not very optimistic about the boy's chances, and feel that if his sight is saved at all, he will still have very restricted vision.

Warns Public Of Outside Groups In School Disputes

A warning to the public not to be taken in by organized "hate groups" who seek to foist their own special brands of control on schools was sounded by Supt. William Gillis Thursday evening in a talk before the Harry Bartlett Post of the American Legion.

Gillis told his audience that "there always have been, and always will be, criticisms of the school system; and we welcome them." However, he warned against groups which, he said, sought to capitalize on local disputes over school policy by injecting false issues and whipping up emotions over so-called "socialistic" teaching.

The superintendent said his talk was prompted by an article appearing in a recent issue of the American Legion Magazine. The article, titled "Your Child Is Their Target" attempted to establish that the American school system was being subverted by "authoritarians in education," who sought to gain full control of the development of children. He pointed out this claim was contradicted by another part of the article which accused teachers of advocating that the child "should not be restrained or disciplined."

East Haven prepared for the Thanksgiving holiday this week, and Schools Supt. William E. Gillis announced that schools will close early on Wednesday to start a two-day school holiday.

The superintendent said that the lunch hour will be eliminated in the schools so that high school classes will be out at noon, and grammar schools, at one o'clock. Branford Review Editor Sees Tight Game On Thursday

The game will be marked with a certain amount of ceremony and the Branford band will perform at half-time. Winner of the contest will take away the Joseph Mayo-Warren Sampson trophy which will be awarded for the first time this year. The winner each year will hold the memorial trophy until the next season. Also, a trophy will be presented to the most outstanding player at the event. The game officials will serve as the final judges in this award.

Crisafi Silent
This year the Easties' coach ain't sayin' nuthin'. He looks forward with eagerness, and with confidence to this crowning game; but he says, this is one game in which either side's record has little significance. "Anything can happen."

The game will find two top quality teams pitted against each other. The Easties in fifth place among high schools in this state, are placing their hopes on their quadruple-threat combination of Vince Gagliardi, Dominic Pettinlechi, Dan Mautte and Hank Luzzi. One man may not make a team, but little (147) Pettinlechi is the multi-hope of the Easties. The seal-back has picked up a total of eight touchdowns this season. A quick futility who can't get around ends with edge, he's a tough little player who has been plenty of action.

The high school senior will be pitted against Joey Paul, Branford veteran ender, who has piled up a total of 10 TD's this season. Nine of these have been by passes and one by interception.

The pass-bleeding arm of Quarter-back Vince Gagliardi, who is credited with three touchdowns, will be pitted against Branford's Billy General, who lobbed six of those rewarding passes to Joe Paul.

Mautte and Luzzi, halfbacks for the East Haven team, are expected to do their usual good job of lugging the ball on the plunges through center. Although somewhat on the small side, both are real fighters, and Mautte has two touchdowns to his credit.

Defensively, co-captains Mario Muzzillo, 220-pound tackle, and Richard Orlando, 180-pound end, assisted by such toughies as guard Joe Walker and star end Paul Morman, ought to give Branford's offense a play or two of trouble. Incidentally, Morman is credited with the single touchdown by East Haven in its recent meet with Milford. Other dependables in the line will be Burch Orfice, who trades off his tackle position with Eddie Clough; center, Bruno Vitale; and Vincent Bruno, guard. All have turned in excellent performances in the past.

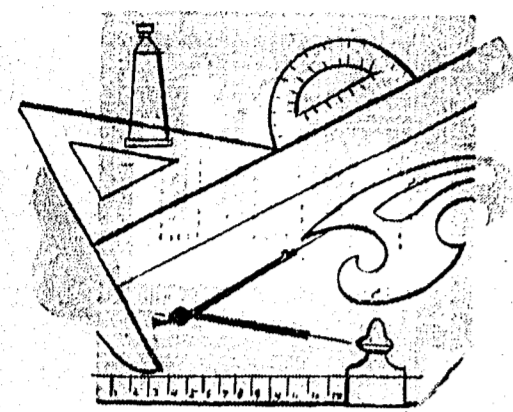

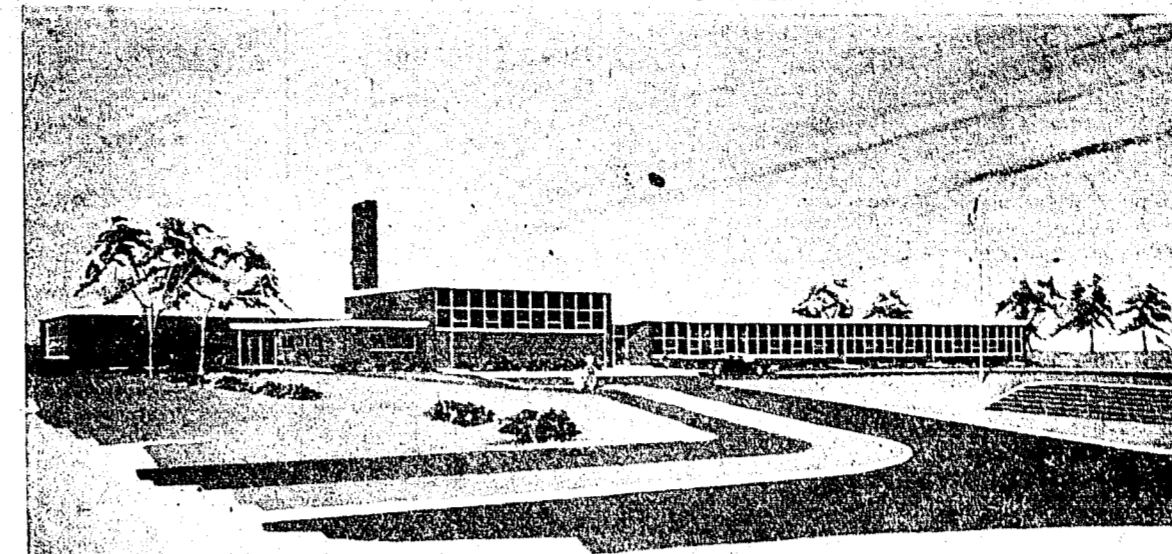

Invocation will be read by the Rev. J. F. O'Donnell, pastor of St. Clare's church, Monmouth.

Harold F. Davis, local architect who designed the building, will present the ceremonial keys of the building to Saturno Francini and Andrew Bardugone, of the firm of P. Francini, contractors. These will then pass them on to Vincent Vetrone, chairman of the school building committee. The keys will then be presented to Mrs. W. O. Parker, president of the Board of Education who will give them to William E. Gillis, superintendent of schools, in whose honor the building has been named.

Musical selections will be played by Marie Piscitelli and Salvatore Calligari.

The Rev. Virgil Wollenberger, pastor of the Foxon Congregation-

al Church, will deliver a short address and will close the ceremony with a benediction.

The total figure set at \$362,288.00, was released by the architect's office this week in advance of the official announcement of the amount at the dedication ceremonies on Sunday.

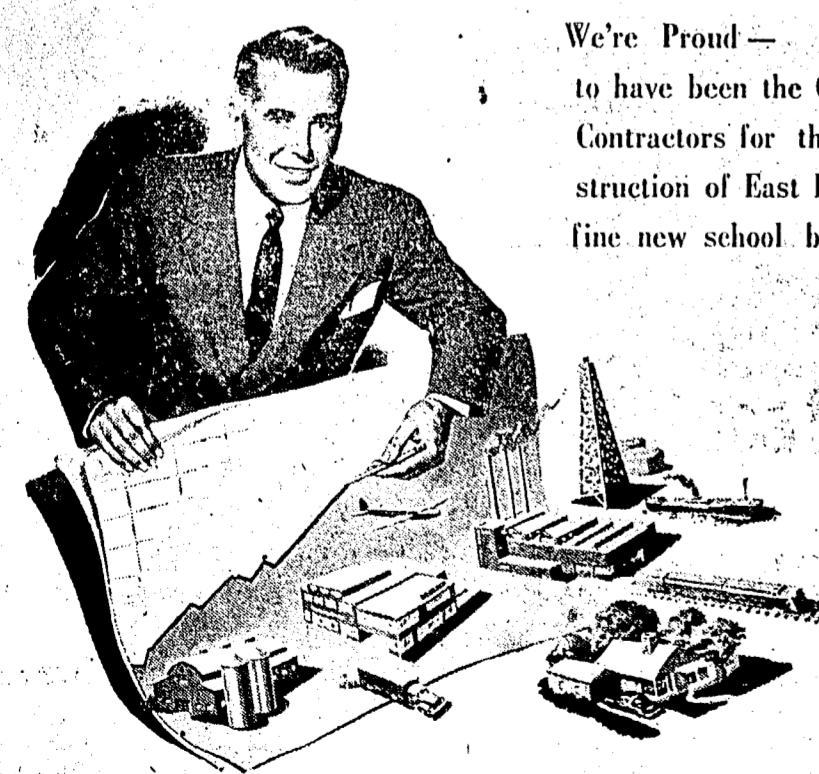

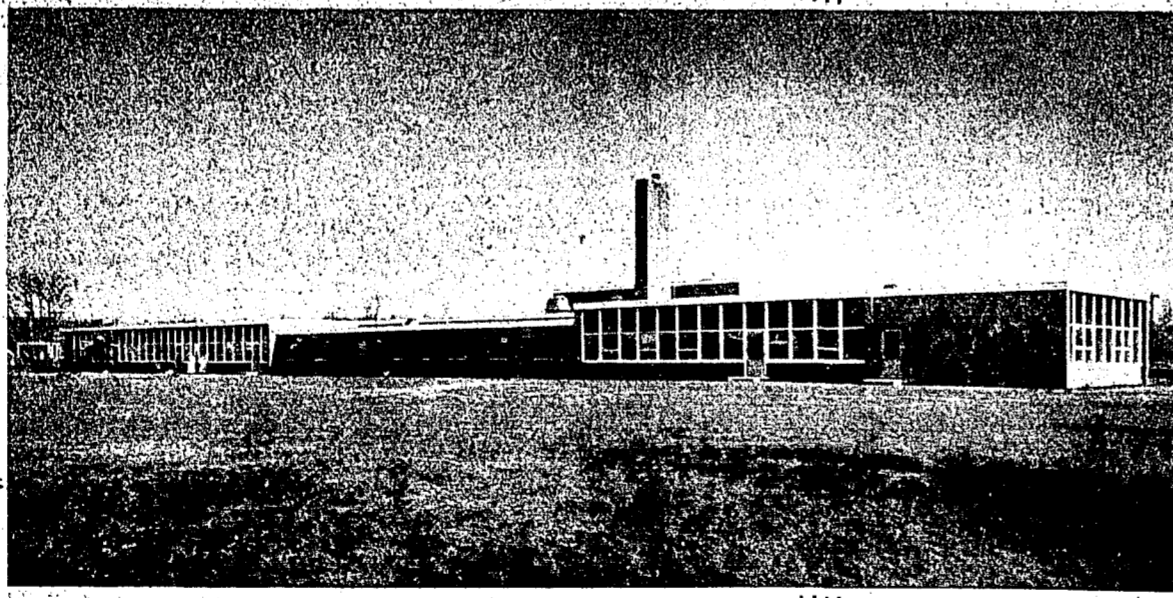

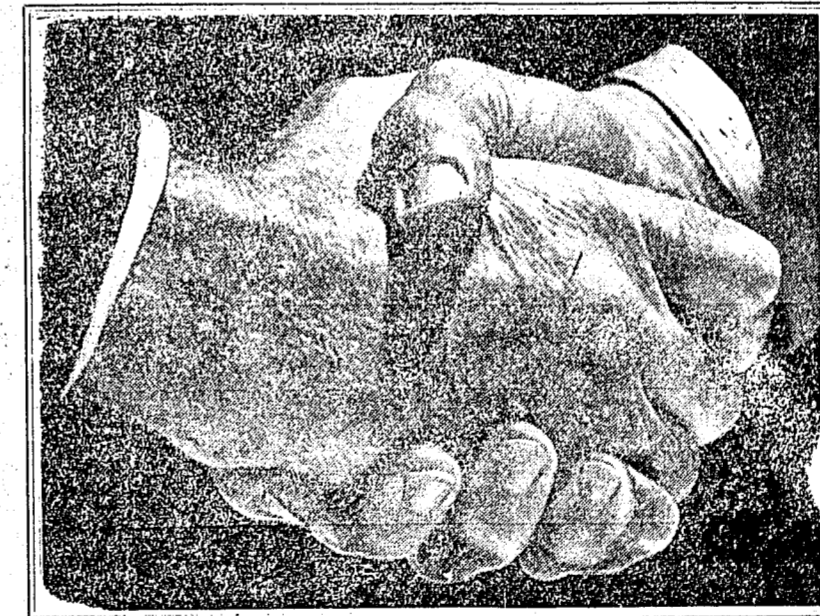

POETIC PROCLAMATION
Public proclamations by government officials are usually pretty stiff and formal with little or no regard for literary value. When a proclamation can become a live part of the history of a state then it is worth the effort. It is doubtful whether Governor Cross' Thanksgiving proclamation of 1933 has ever been matched. It is a high call for any proclamation to surpass. It is a piece of writing that deserves to be read at this time of year. In it, the season and idea of Thanksgiving has been captured in beautiful prose.

It is not for comparison that it is printed here but for its own beauty. It is Henry David Thoreau. The proclamation follows:
State of Connecticut
A Proclamation by His Excellency Wilbur L. Cross, Governor.
As the colors of autumn stream down the wind, scatter and smatch and burn, upon gold in the breezes, a splendor of smoldering fire in the oaks along the hill, and the last leaves flutter away, and dusk falls briefly about the worker bringing in from the field a late load of grain, and autumn in its last and fiercest mood, I have been thinking of that great sun upon his shoulder, we are stirred once more to ponder the infinite goodness that has set apart for us, in all this moving mystery of creation, a time for living and a home. In such a spirit I now proclaim Thursday, the twenty-fourth of November, a day of Public Thanksgiving.

In such a spirit I call upon the people to acknowledge heartily, in friendly gathering and in prayer, the increase of the season. Let us feel the harvest of the earth, the yield of patient mind and faithful hand, that have kept us fed and clothed and have made for us a shelter even against the storm. It is right that we whose area of sky has been darkened by an unrelenting winter, and whose hearts are heavy with the burden of a year, should be stirred once more to ponder the infinite goodness that has set apart for us, in all this moving mystery of creation, a time for living and a home. In such a spirit I now proclaim Thursday, the twenty-fourth of November, a day of Public Thanksgiving.

NO CENSORSHIP

There is still enough competition, although that seems to be declining fast, to make attempts at suppression or distortion of news comparatively rare.

This does not refer to the approximately 80 per cent of the politically-committed newspapers supporting Eisenhower vs. the 20 per cent supporting Stevenson. 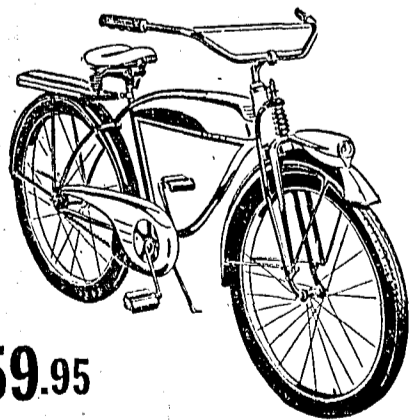

The office also revealed a "building cost" figure of \$244,019 for general contracts and mechanical contracts, including cost of purchasing and installing a septic tank. An additional \$26,400 expended for site development brings the figure to a total of \$270,419. On this basis the building cost per square foot is \$13.72; per cubic foot, \$97; and per pupil, \$841.69.

A financial report submitted by the school building committee on November 6 revealed that of an adjusted appropriation total of \$345,000, \$250,150.63 had been expended leaving a balance of \$94,849.37.

The school building consists of nine classrooms, an all-purpose room and other auxiliary rooms.

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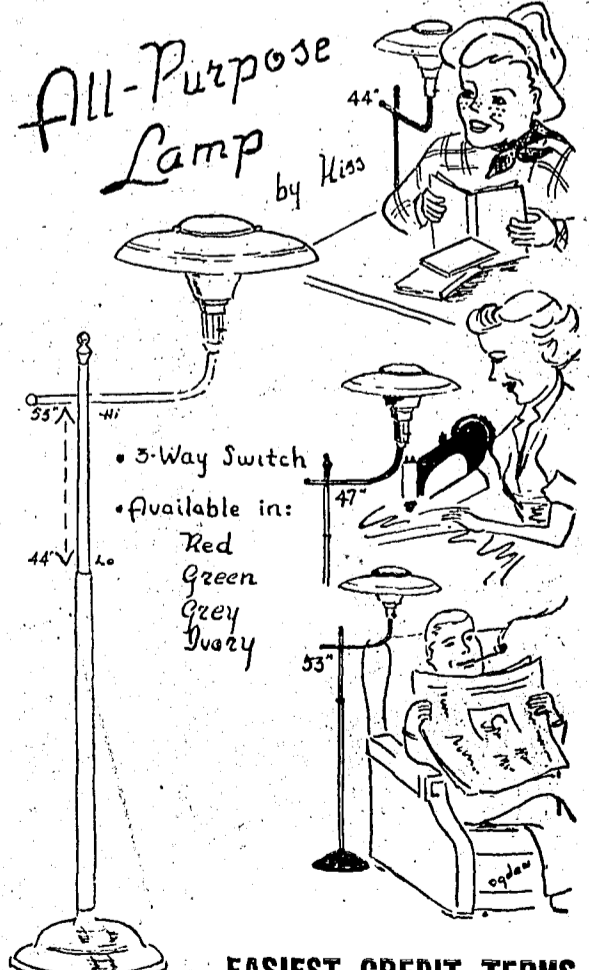
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
