Parents Should Censor Own Selectmen Name Two To Zoning Appeals Comics, Legislator Advises

"I think we tidults ought to buy more comic, books," Mrs. Alice Town To Get New Paterson, of Branford, told a meet-**Dump Truck At** ing of the East Haven Parent-Cost Of \$2600 Teacher's Council Monday night in the Hagaman Memorial Library.

Mrs. Peterson, who is a veteran member of the lower house of the state legislature and now serving her third term, advocated that parents take a greater hand in selecting the reading matter of their children, rather than resort-ing to the supervisory services of a state administrative authority to regulate the sale of comic books. Difficulties Of Regulation

The Republican legislator, who spoke also on the topic of fluoridization of public water supplies, warned her audience of the difficulties which state regulation and censorship of comic books entailed. Because of these problems, she said, she suggested that parents do their own regulating. "You probably won't like what l

have to say," she told the approximately 25 members present, "but I must ask, do you think that par-ental authority has deteriorated so that we must appeal to the laws of the state?" "I suggest," she con-tinued, "that we take an Inventory of ourselves and call a halt to this process of giving away our children to the state," Fluoridization

On fluoridization of water supplics, Mrs. Peterson said she was not prepared to present the pros and cons on the issue, "But I'll go this far (to say)," she continued, "among those opposed to fluoridi-zation I have yet to find one but says that it is beneficial."

"I assume that you have made up your minds that comic books are bad." Mrs. Peterson said in her opening remarks. However, she noted a number of questions which she, as a legislator, would ask about any proposed board to regulate the sale of coinic books. Some of her questions were: How

many are to be on this board, in view of the 169 towns with their numerous outlets which would have to be covered? Is the board going to be partisan, bi-partisan or non partisan? Who will appoint it?

Board Qualifications She asked about the qualifica-tions of board members, and sug-gested that writers, artists, clergymen, the Inter-racial commission distributors, educators and other might want representation. What about appeals from the

board's rulings? she asked, and what power would be given to the board for confiscation and disposal The Branford legislator, who has a 10-year-old son, asked who would

enforce the decisions of the board special agents, local police or state police? Who would pay for the additional expense of such regula-tion?, she wanted to know. Potato Could Grow.

"This could be a small potato," she said, "which could grow into a big thing." "What effect would this have on us 10 or 15 years from now?" she asked. Mrs. Petersor also said she wondered what effect such regulation and censor-ship would have on the freedom of the press, of radio, of television

and of the movies. The Branford legislator also wanted to know what facilities the board would have and how its activities would be financed.

Opposition To Foxon Site Fails To Materialize

Anticipated opposition to the approval of a new school site in Foxon failed to materializo Tuesday evening last week when ar assembly of about 500 persons voted without dissent for the approval of the purchase of five sets of property for construction of new school facilities.

In one of the smoothest town meetings on record, the assembly voted approval of the purchase of land valued at a total of \$72,300, and empowered the Board of Finnnce to appropriate and borrow

The properties approved con-sisted of a 24-acre plot in Foxon, costing \$28,800, a 65-foot wide by 400 feet deep right of way on To-masi property into the Zuckorman bits at a cost of \$4500, 61 more of site, at a cost of \$4,500; 6.1 acres of land on the De Caprio property on Gerrish Ave., costing \$20,000; and the Cohen property of 11 1-2 lots and Connecticut Company property of four acres, costing \$9,000 and \$10,000, respectively, in Momau-
