

Some 260 miles of copper wire in cable have been installed on Maple Street and various side streets in the Maplevale development to provide party-line service for about 300 new homes which will be constructed in this area. However, extensive additional installations between this section and the telephone office on Townsend Avenue will be necessary before it will be possible to offer private or two-party lines in Maplevale.

Telephone construction has totalled \$159,000,000 in Connecticut since World War II. And this project, already in service in the East Haven section of the New Haven exchange, is typical of current activity throughout the state.
