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Burial Services Friday For Judge Armen K. Krikorian

Succumbed Tuesday After Heart Attack

Local government officials and members of the legal profession from surrounding areas planned to attend funeral services here tomorrow to pay their respects to former Judge Armen K. Krikorian, of 24 Wilkenda Ave. Attorney Krikorian succumbed early Tuesday morning in St. Raphael's Hospital after suffering a sudden heart attack in his home on Sunday.

Delegations are expected from the East Haven Democratic town committee; New Haven Lodge 25, B. P. O. E.; East Haven Rotary; Momaugun Lodge 138, A. F. & A. M.; Men's Club of the Old Stone Church; and the New Haven County Bar Association.

Services will be at 2 p. m. in the W. S. Clancy Funeral Home, 43 Kirkham Ave. with the Rev. James E. Waery, pastor of the Old Stone Church, officiating. Burial will be in the family plot in Westville.

Passing Regretted

News of the death of Krikorian, who was 51 years of age, came as a shock to many East Haveners who expressed great regret at his passing. A year-around resident here for 14 years, Atty. Krikorian was widely known by the townspeople. Since he became a resident here he was active in Democratic politics here, being a member of the party's town executive committee from the time he first took up full residence.

In July, 1949, he became the first Democrat in a number of years to occupy the judgeship in the local court. He served the full two-year term until July of 1951. From October, 1949, he served for two years as town counsel to First Selectman Frank Clancy.

Vice-chairman of the local Democrats' executive committee, he was an unsuccessful candidate for state senator from the 12th senatorial district in 1948.

Prior to his locating here as a resident he lived here during the summer season for many years.

Born in New Haven, Atty. Krikorian was born in New Haven on Feb. 21, 1902, the son of the late Aramian and Julia Constantin Krikorian. Both his parents came to this country from Turkey, and his father operated a tailoring business in New Haven.

He was educated in New Haven public schools and graduated from Willoughby High in 1919. As a child he began a close friendship with New Haven Mayor William Celestano which continued through his life.

Krikorian received a B. A. degree from Clark University, Worcester, Mass., in 1922 and a Bachelor of Laws degree from the Yale Law School seven years later. He was admitted to the Connecticut Bar shortly after graduation in 1929, and opened his present office at 865 Chapel St. He was a former law partner of the late Isadore Sigle.

Jovial Nature

Unmarried, Krikorian was of a very jovial nature, and was well liked. He displayed an interest in all people and was active in many local charity movements, organizational and private.

He was a member of the County and the Connecticut State Bar Associations and was a past president of the East Haven Rotary Club. A member of Momaugun Lodge 138, A. F. & A. M., he was a trustee of the Old Stone Church.

He is survived by a brother, Albert P. Krikorian, of Agawan, Mass., and two sisters, Mrs. Mary K. Bazarian, of Waterbury, and Miss Grace Krikorian, of New Haven.

Krikorian served for a time also as legal adviser to the town Redevelopment Agency.

Police Head Calls For More Respect Of Law Enforcers

Respect for the law and for law enforcement authorities provides for more efficient government to the benefit of all, Assistant Police Chief Joseph Folio told more than 800 children in the High School auditorium last Friday.

Speaking in connection with Crime Prevention Week, which is sponsored by the National Exchange Clubs, Inc., Folio told his young audience that disrespect for the law and for officers was a material aid to Communism in its attempt to destroy the American way of life.

Folio was introduced by Police Chief Edwin B. Priest who in his brief remarks, warned the school children of vandalism, he told them that destruction of school property meant destroying that very property for which their own parents have paid through taxes.

Henry J. De Vita, president of the East Haven Exchange Club and Anthony Marino, chairman of the Crime Prevention Week program also addressed brief remarks to the children.

As main speaker, Chief Folio told the students and pupils: "I am here today in behalf of the Exchange Club's National Crime Prevention Week. We sponsor Crime Prevention Week annually in the hope that it may awaken the American people to the need for individual and collective action designed to prevent crime and its unbearable burden. The Exchange Club believes that crime is everybody's business, and that every citizen, youth, and adult alike, should work toward this prevention."

Folio told his audience that "crime is on the increase" and cited statistics showing that for every day in the year, 300 persons are killed or assaulted, 160 robberies are committed, 1100 burglaries, 450 cars are stolen and 2800 grand larceny thefts are committed.

"Can you imagine," he asked, "what the grand total would be if we did not have these policemen?" He guessed that the difference without law enforcement would be like comparing the effect of a sling shot with that of an atom bomb.

Folio urged that greater respect be held for law enforcers and pointed out that they were men no different from any one else, but, at the risk of their own lives, entrusted with the duty of guarding the lives and property of others. He said that respect for the policeman would make him "a more efficient cop."

"If you make fun of our laws or officers," Folio said, "or try to pull a fast one, you are materially aiding Communism in its attempt to destroy our government."

Hayes Blames Carelessness For Fires; Permits Needed

Carelessness was blamed by Chief Thomas J. Hayes as being the main reason for a rash of grass and brush fires for which firemen were called out eleven different times during the past week ending yesterday. The Chief also served notice that fire permits would be needed to burn outdoors after Sunday.

Hayes said that many of the fires had spread from improperly tended incinerators and said that a total of more than 30 grass fires had been reported so far this month. The fire department head pointed out that the hazards from such fires were two-fold: First, high winds could spread such fires to valuable property such as buildings; and, second, apparatus and men on such fires are not immediately available to answer more serious calls.

Hayes urged that local residents cooperate with the department in securing permits for the kindling of fires starting March 1 in accordance with state law. He pointed out that persons burning without such permits are subject to arrest. Penalties amounting to the cost of sending equipment and men onto such fires may be levied against violators.

Permits were obtainable from fire headquarters or the following fire warden: In Foxon, Richard Flynn Foxon Rd.; Bassett, Laurel, High Streets area, Joseph V. Polrot, Bradley St.; Short Beach Rd., Mansfield Grove area, Walter Wayland, 131 Short Beach Rd.

According to the General Statutes, sections 8300, 8424, and 8425 require that permits be obtained for outside fires for the period March 1 to Dec. 1. Also, they require that such fires, which are permitted only between sunrise and sunset, should be handled by proper implements.

Permits invalidated. Chief Hayes warned that permits issued are voided during windy weather.

Pointing to the danger that fire apparatus working on grass fires may be needed for more serious emergencies, Hayes said that only one truck is equipped with radio and revealed that the monitor in fire headquarters was not yet in operation contrary to earlier reports. "The operator in fire headquarters," he said, "is still dependent upon police headquarters to relay by phone messages between apparatus and headquarters." He said this meant some delay in re-shifting use of equipment.

To Consider PTA For High School At Meeting Thurs.

Formation of a Parent Teacher Association for the High School will be the subject of a discussion at a meeting of the Parent Teacher Council scheduled for next Thursday in the school.

All East Haven schools now have parent-teacher associations or, in the case of Momaugun School, a parents' club. The need for a P. T. A. at the high school has long been felt by the school authorities. A Fathers' Club which was active at the high school soon after its organization, functioned successfully for sometime but was then abandoned because of lack of interest.

A few years back a P. T. A. was formed in the high school, with Mrs. Edie Dohm as the first president; but after four or five years, attendance at the meetings was poor and it was disbanded.

If the response justifies a P. T. A. in the high school, a charter application will be forwarded to Hartford without delay so that the unit may get underway this Spring.

Previously the committee had been meeting on the second Thursday of the month. A special meeting to be held last Tuesday was cancelled out of respect for the late Atty. Armen K. Krikorian.

Old Stone Church Sets Mar. 27-8-9 For Passion Play

Subject to the approval of the Board of Education for the use of the high school auditorium the week of March 23, the Old Stone Church Drama Guild has set the dates, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, March 27, 28 and 29, for the production of the 1953 Passion Play, "Cradle to Throne." This will be the fourth season of the production locally.

At a meeting at the parish house recently, presided over by President Carlton Willman, the Drama Guild made further plans for the forthcoming performances.

Wilfred Rafter, former town tax collector, will again appear in the role of the Christus, and many of the key figures will be the same as in the past, although about a dozen substitutions are necessary this year. It was stated, because of illness or press of other activities.

The production committee is asking for volunteers to fill the various places in the cast and also on the technical and production staffs where vacancies may arise.

There are approximately 200 men, women and children in the cast or otherwise participating in the production.

The costumes and scenery are carried through from year to year, but assistance is also required for mending, cleaning and otherwise keeping the costumes and props in good repair.

Laurel Principal Consultant At Nat'l Conference

Robert Green, principal of Laurel School, was a consultant to the panel on the Teaching Principal at the annual conference of the Department of Elementary School Principals, National Education Association. The conference, held in Atlantic City on Feb. 12, 13 and 14, was attended by several hundred school principals from all parts of the nation.

The group studying the specific problems of the teaching principal expressed concern with the difficulties involved in attempting to provide educational leadership while carrying a full teaching load. It was pointed out that under such conditions the teaching principal was faced with an almost insurmountable task.

Among the final recommendations were two of special significance to East Haven which has eight teaching principals: 1) schools with 200 or more pupils should have a supervising principal released from all teaching duties; and 2) schools with less than 200 pupils should have a principal who is released for half of the school day plus regularly employed clerical assistance.

New Homes Here Total 266 In 1952 UI Reports

Construction of new homes in East Haven totaled 266 last year, as builders surpassed the busy pace set the year before, according to a report from the United Illuminating Company this week. The 1952 figure compares with 201 homes finished in East Haven in 1951.

The UI study covers construction progress in the 15 towns served by the Company in the Bridgeport-New Haven area. The total number of dwellings completed during 1952 in the nine towns served by the Company in its New Haven operations came to 1,894. This reflects a slight drop from the 1,901 mark scored in 1951.

One important trend noted in the report was the "growing practice of builders to offer a choice of electric appliances with the new home, payable with the mortgage on the residence."

The analysis also pointed out that a number of multiple-unit construction developments finished in the last year were completely electric-equipped and that "there is an increase in the trend toward all-electric homes."

In East Haven, more than 95 per cent had electric washers in electric ranges installed. More than 90 per cent were equipped with electric refrigerators and over 84 per cent had electric washers installed.

"There is a general rise in the average number of electric appliance units per new home throughout the territory, as well as a definite effort on the part of builders to plan an adequate number of outlets for future rises," the UI survey found.

Total Of \$2980.14 Collected In Polio Campaign Locally

The drive chairman expressed his thanks to those participating in the campaign and announced that a dinner meeting of the members would be held in a few weeks.

Airport Chairman Uncovers Hornet's Nest Of Critics

Allen Hubbard, chairman of the New Haven Board of Airport Commissioners overturned a hornet's nest of criticism when he appeared before a joint meeting of the East Haven and Branford Chambers of Commerce last Thursday to present his views on expanding the New Haven Municipal Airport.

No sooner had Hubbard, who appeared as speaker upon the invitation of the Branford Chamber, finished his talk when he was set upon by protesting East Haveners who would have none of his proposals for enlarging the air field.

Hubbard outlined plans whereby a new east-west runway would be built, extending across Uriah and Coe Ave. Such a change would block off both accesses to Momaugun and Morris Cove and Momaugun traffic would have to be routed over Hill Rd. by the old South School and down Henry St. extension.

Claims Town Benefit. The commission chairman argued that East Haven would benefit from the expansion of the airport which would attract the location of additional tax-paying industry here. He said that industry was shifting south because of bot-

Issue May Bring Debate And Compromise Moves

Postponed for one month in order to permit school board members a chance to study available classroom facilities, a decision on where to schedule double sessions is expected to touch off a vigorous debate at the regular meeting of the Board of Education tomorrow night.

The School Building Committee is expected to deliver a report on a study into the availability and cost of renting additional classroom space from churches and other private organizations in the town on a temporary basis. The study was undertaken after a recommendation was advanced by a joint meeting of the committee with the Committee on Schools.

This week the building committee toured some of the schools in the town and met Monday to prepare a report for tomorrow's board meeting.

Debate Likely. Whatever form the committee's recommendation may take, it is unlikely that controversy will be avoided in view of the way in which members have stated their own preferences on double sessions in the past. However, it is not unlikely that a compromise plan may be adopted.

The vote to refer the latest recommendation for study was not unopposed. Charles Copeland indicated from the start that he would oppose any plan which did not coincide with his own insistence that the High School be placed on double sessions. In this he appears to have the support of Charles Sizemore. Of the remaining members most have indicated interest in Supt. William E. Gillis' recommendation plan for restricting double sessions to the grammar schools.

Opposes Bill. One of Copeland's major objections to the plan is that it would require a shifting of the seventh grades from the High School back to the grammar school. He has argued that it would aggravate a situation already intolerable.

Copeland also expressed vigorous opposition to the joint committee's proposal for shifting the kindergarten from Momaugun to the High School.

The decision to look into additional facilities represents a compromise attempt which might permit a removal of the seventh grades from the High School without further over-crowding other schools.

Under the superintendent's recommended plan, unless new facilities are found, 27 double sessions and ten double grades will be required next year. However, Gillis cited the advantage that the plan would effect only 769 pupils in the primary schools. Second plan would place 85 elementary school pupils on double session and 329 more in the High School making a total of 870. Double sessions in the High School would affect 1,068 there in addition to 550 more in the elementary schools.

Ignore Supt's Figures. Despite Gillis' insistence that a double session plan for the entire High School would not eliminate double sessions for elementary school pupils as his figures above would indicate Copeland and Sizemore have continued in their advocacy of such a plan.

Tomorrow was set as the deadline for the decision under the urging of Gillis who has warned that Carl Garvin, principal at the High School, must have the decision and plan in order to make provisions for the coming school year.

The superintendent is scheduled to return today from a week's vacation with Mrs. Gillis in Florida after attending a national school superintendent's conference last week in Atlantic City. He may deliver a report in which he may comment on his observations on such conference subjects as loyalty oaths.

The Board of Education last week went on record as requiring all school department employees to take a loyalty oath.
