Board Votes To Compare Costs Of Rival School Plans

Session Marked By Brisk Debates

After smouldering over the matters for weeks, the Board of Education Friday burst into a flame of action when it voted (a) tojkcep double sessions out of the High School and (h) to have the Committees on Schools and Buildings prepare estimates on the relative osts of additional construction under the junior high and the eight-

In a meeting which was marked by occasional brisk arguments al-though they never reached the able-pounding stage, the school board's actions marked progress on questions which had been un-der consideration for a long time.

The provision to have Principal Carl Garvin lay out next year's grades eight through twelve in the High School in accordance with a plan recommended by Supt. William E. Gillis stipulated that one classroom be reserved for use by seventh graders. In effect, it rep-resented a defeat of attempts by board member Charles Copeland to forestall the removal of the seventh grades to the grammar

Hope For More Rooms

Board members still apparently entertained the hope that it would be possible to obtain at least some additional classroom facilities in the two rooms of the old South School and in extra rooms in some of the grammar schools. In addition, the possibility of renting fa-cilities of private organizations was still under investigation as to cost In all about 13 additional rooms as "possibly available" although a number may be ruled out for vari-

The proposal to have the Committees on Schools and Buildings prepare estimates on the relative costs of the two school plans was advanced by Burton Reed, who argued that by working on the figures board members would be-come acquainted with the facts. He rejected a suggestion that he work with these two committees to help on the figure preparation.

Copeland wanted to know where

After providing for the setting up of zoning authorities in municipalities involved in the overation of airports, the bill states that should the municipalities concerned fall to cooperate in creating a joint pality owning or controlling the airport may itself adopt, administer, and enforce airport zoning regulations for the airport hazard area in question."

While not granting the right of eminent domain, this section (5-b) would make it possible for one municipality to govern land usage in another.





An interesting thing about plumb lines is that no two are ever exactly parallel. Each plumb line demonstrates the perfectly straight up and down for only the point to which it is attached. If, for example, we hang a plumb line in Hamden and another in Tokyo, Hamden and another in Tokyo, Japan they won't be parallel. They would be about a 120 degree angle to each other. Each would begin at the particular point where it is fastened and then (thanks to the pull of gravity) point directly to-ward the center of the earth. We couldn't build upright houses here by a plumb line drawn somewhere else in the world. It provides a standard by which to judge and build in only one place at a time.
