Registration Of Bicycles Inspection In The Offing

Registration of bicycles in East Haven appeared a psssibility in the near future as local police, in cooperation with several private groups instituted a safety campaign for local bicyclists. Wounded In Action

The campaign, which is aimed at educating young bleyelists on proper behavior in traffic was inspired by complaints of pedestrians and the involvement of one bicyclist in an accident with a motor vehicle. It has come to our attention within the last few weeks that persons have been rundown by bi-cycles while walking on the pub-lic sidewalks in the center of Annual Dinner town, and also that an operato of a bicycle was struck by a mo-tor vehicle. We feel that the town as a whole has been fortunate in-deed that accidents of this nature

have not been more serious. It is our responsibility to reg-ulate bicycle traffice in and around the town. The immediate olan is to have instruction teaching the safe way to operate bicycles on the public streets and highways and to instruct bleycle owners concerning the state-laws governing the use of bleycles. Also, it is thought wise to have compulsory inspection of equipment such as lights, brakes and scaling arrangements and to have compulsory registration of all bi-cycles within the town limits.

Regulations concerning bicycle traffic are in existence but have not been enforced. In order to enforce these laws, since they in-volve the liability of parents for operators of bleycles the town as a whole will have to back such a

Corporal Piccionelli graduated from East Haven High in 1949 and prior to his entry into service was employed as an assistant supervisor at the A. C. Gilbert Company in New Haven

It was on his third visit to the front lines that he was wounded. His parents operate the East Haven Nursery on North High St.

Administration Busy With

Water Drainage Problems tinued wrestling this week with the problem of storm water drainage on Main St. as a blocked off sewer line near the Kirkham Ave. intersection was excavated to remedy the situation.

First Selectman Barker revealed that similar operations were being conducted on Roma St. opposite Memorial Field, on Doran St. and at the intersection of Henry St. and Austin Ave. Excavations were made either to replace lines or to emporarily drain off accumulated storm water.

Meanwhile, Barker has said, he ecided to proceed with a plan he had been considering for laying down an additional sewer line on Taylor Ave, to handle some of the water pouring into central Main St. catch basins. The first select man corrected an earlier News re be replaced by a larger one. In-stead, Barker said, the present 12nch line will be supplemented by another line of the same size which will connect into a 15-inch line starting at Bishop St, and leading south on Taylor Ave, to a 24-incl nain on Tyler St.

The additional line, which would be laid on the west side of the treet near the curb, will be concrete pipe, Because of its strength the pipe can be laid learer the surface of the road and providing more pitch or tilt which would facilitate the flow of water and discourage silling.

The block in the Main St. pipe vas discovered after crews had fed 400 feet of fire hose equipped with a special, whirling nozzle into the sewer from a manhole at Main and been collecting silt. It was during the flushing operation that the block was discovered near Kickham Ave junction.

On Chance Measure Will Be Killed East Haven town officials took

their fight against Senate Bill 611 on "Airport Zoning" to the Avia tion Committee on Capitol IIIII Puesday afternoon. There in a three-hour session they found ample support of their views from officials of other communities and ome prospect that the measure will be toned down or side-tracked in favor of some other legislative means of handling the problem of alrport safety.

The measure had the support of the adjutant general, Major General Frederick G. Reincke and of the State Aeronautics Commission: and a sizeable number of "big guns" from around the state appeared to advance the cause of the

Joining the East Haven delegation in opposition to the measure, criticized as being "too broad in tionality were representatives from the towns of Stratford and Wethersfield.

First Selectman Frank Barker, who headed the local delegation and who spoke briefly urging nonfavorable action on the bill, said yesterday that he was "optomisle" over the chances that the measure would be killed.

· Detailed Presentation The most detailed presentation of East Hayon's case against the proposed bill was made by Town Engineer Charles Miller, appear ing in his capacity as chairman the Zoning Board. Tarming measure as a "not very good bill" and describing it as too broad in cope, Miller pin-pointed section 5

of the proposed measure. The Town engineer said that the general statement of purpose in the hill glossed over the real difficulty. Pointing to the section which permits the municipality operating an airport to proceed with its own zoning if it fails to secure the cooperation of neighboring communities affected by the airport, Miller stated "this is the gist of the matter." He said that East Haven was opoosing the granting of such power to any community to affect the af-

Speaking of the right of East laven to govern its own property Miller said "I do feel that we have prerogatives that we must preerve. After all, this is New England and we are jealous of these prerogatives." He said, that he vas sure that if New Hayen wanted to discuss the matter and work something out" the town would be willing to cooperate. We will cooperate," he said, "but we won't be walked on."

Effects On Realty Values

In answer to arguments, adanced at the hearing that airport onstruction does not affect real state values, Miller read an exerot from a book "Home Builders Manual" published by the National Association of Home Builders and claiming that the consensus of pinlon of members of the National Association of Assessing Oficers was that airports detrimental to property values.

On eight acres nestled against the far wall of the lower Farm River valley an East Haven man runs a small mink, farm which will gross about \$15,000 this year. Operator of the growing enterprise which has been in existence Frank Ursone, of 295 North High
