The Hagaman Memorial Library has added to its permanent files a study unit prepared by the Disabled American Veterans to provide reference material on the dis-

There are approximate-ly 20 million living ex-servicemen in the United States today and more than 10 per cent of this num-ber -2,357,689 as of a recent date-are recognized as disabled by the Veterans Administration.

Veterans Administration. The DAV reports that 20 million Americans have served in the armed forces of this nation since the Revolution and including Ko-rea. More than 965,000 have lost their lives. In addition to the number of disabled veterans, there are 440,647 wildows of veterans and 305,982 dependent children.
