Rifle Range Plans Resumed Misunderstanding Claimed

dermining the High School foundation has subsided as the Harry Bartlett Post of the American Legion announces that plans have been cleared for the construction of a rifle range in the school base-

Excitement over the failure of the local post and the first select-man's office to notify the Board of Education of plans to begin excavating was reported to be the result of "misunderstanding."

On Monday, the Legion post, Herman Goldbecker and Milton Corbett, of the architectural firm of Schilling and Goldbecker. The architects were conducted on a tour of the building basement and agreed to inspect and revise floor plans submitted by the Legion, sponsor of the rifle range project.

John Camp, ex-commander of the Bartlett post, reported that the Legion is revising its plans and submitting them to the Board of Education for approval. "All considerations as to the structural foundation have been carefully looked into and all safety precautions will be adhered to."

One of the things which was be-lieved to have contributed to the misunderstanding was a press re-port on the April 10 meeting of the school boar dat which Legion, representatives had advanced their plans. The Bast Haven News of April 16 reported that permission was granted at that meeting for the rifle range. It did not report that he board stipulated collaboration with the board's Committee on Buildings.

It was at a subsequent meeting, which may have been held in executive session on July 27, because it was not covered by the press, that the school board voted to table consideration of the plans until it got further information on

Driver Gets Minimum Fine For Evading Responsibility

Sherwood Tarr, 31, of 34 Prospect Pl. Ext., motorist charged with evading responsibility, was found guilty and fined \$50 by Judge Vincent J. Fasano in Town Coutr Monday morning. The fine, which is the minimum set by law, was recommended by Town Prosecutor Robert M. Taylor Jr., on the ground that Tarr had been very cooperative" with police,

that while he had heard talk about the case outside the court, he would be guided strictly by the town prosecutor's report and Library hours Monday through the court hearing itself. He said he was not interested in local politics, but offered to disquality himself "so that there won't be any misunderstanding."

Koletsky insisted that he had no objection. "We know you are not prejudiced legally," he said, adding that "we ask you to act on the case and we are willing to

accept your decision." The defendant then entered a plea of nolo contendere to the charge. A companion charge of passing a stop sign was nolled on the recommendation of the prosecutor. Judge Fasano accepted the nolo contendere plea and asked Taylor for a "brief statement of the facts."

According to the prosecutor, nvestigating police found Clancy to be the only occupant of the car when they arrived shortly after the accident was reported at 10:29 p.m. Although he insisted that he was not the driver he was taken to headquarters for questioning. No arrest was made, until after a new shift had come on duty at midnight and Lieut. Herbert Smith order ed a completion of the investiga-

After interrogating Clancy, who then stated that Tarr was the driver, the investigating officer went to Tarr's home at about 2:30 a.m. and he latter admitted driving the car. In his statement to police, he said he had received a knock on the head in the accident and did not remember anything else. He could not explain how he had left the scene of accident.

Insists On Full Discussion Attorney Koletsky told the court that Tarr had left the scene of the accident because he was injured. He insisted on a fulldiscussion of the case in order that the matter he cleared up. Once and for all it should be stated that Mr. Clancy had nothing to do with this accident, he declared.






