Appeal Of Ruling Against Garbage Ban Is Weighed

A ruling by a New Haven Court of Common Pleas Judge voiding a Town ban on the importation of garbage is being studied by local officials. This study, with a view of a possible appeal to the Supreme Court of Errors was indicated by the remarks yesterday of First Selectman Frank Clancy.

Foxon Residents May Seek Appeal Of Gagliardi Reversal

Residents of the Foxon area were preparing to take action to secure some means of deterring the erection of a pavilion by Antonio Gagliardi, on property already owned by him on Route 80. Several members of the Board of Zoning Appeals have been contacted on the possibility of appealing a decision by a Common Pleas Court Judge. "The decision over-ruled the local Zoning Board on its refusal to grant Gagliardi permission to build the pavilion."

"Disposes" of 1942 Law
By implication, the ruling also disposes of another Town ordinance, passed by town meeting in 1942, requiring the licensing of contractors hauling garbage and refuse through the streets. Mellillo had been convicted on 13 counts of violation of this ordinance last summer and while he was appealing it the more recent ordinance was passed.

The earlier ordinance was enacted after the Hamden garbage contractor won an appeals court decision in 1941 against Town efforts to enjoin his operation of the piggery.

Clancy said that he was not ready to announce any course of action on the matter which was under study by Town Counsel Richard Kelly. The first selectman is scheduled to meet with a group of residents from the Foxon Park area at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The group will be represented by New Haven Attorney Joseph Kolotsky.

Appeals Court Judge Raymond J. Devlin ruled last Friday that the Board of Selectmen, presumably under the special Board of Finance Act of 1915 is the proper authority to enact such an ordinance as the one in question. The act states in part that "said selectman shall have the power to make rules and regulations concerning the removal and disposition of garbage and rubbish."

Clancy admitted that the decision puts the selectmen, particularly the majority members and the town administration, "right in the middle." In short, responsibility would rest with the administration and not merely with those voting at a town meeting.

Aside from this, the first selectman did not make clear exactly why he felt himself to be "on the spot." Nevertheless, the situation appeared to be uncomfortable enough, so that recourse by appeal to the Supreme Court, almost sure to be drawn out over a period of months - is being considered.

The first selectman asserted that the Common Pleas Court ruling put in doubt the validity of a number of other Town laws and that a possible Supreme Court reversal could serve to reinforce confidence in ordinances now on the books.

At least one local lawyer doubted that all Town ordinances were in jeopardy. He felt that a number might be, if Devlin's decision is allowed to stand, but these would be the ones affected by the statutes and special act pertinent to his particular case only.

Whether the local Board of Selectmen can command exclusive jurisdiction in those spheres of administrative activity as are very generally defined in the special act of 1915 is being debated. It was felt by some, at least, that the possibility of a Supreme Court reversal of the recent ruling was strong enough to warrant taking the matter to that high judicial body.

The Town has until Friday to file notice of appeal.

Charges Dismissed
In voiding the recently passed ordinance, Judge Devlin dismissed charges of violations lodged against Mellillo and three employees. No law, no violation, he said.

The Hamden pig-farm operator, who claims he has since lost a garbage removal contract with New Haven and North Haven, was fined \$30 each for 15 violations and his helpers fined at the same rate on four additional violations.

Further arrests and prosecution were halted last November under a temporary injunction secured from the Court of Common Pleas.

Judge Devlin's decision represents the legal victory for Mellillo who has been involved in a long-standing conflict with his Foxon

Town Meets Thursday To Act On \$1,160,000 School Bldg. Budget

Urges Action To Put Town On Sound Financial Basis

To the voices of private citizens urging prompt action to put the widening gap between the Town's growing school needs and its financial ability to meet those needs this week was added that of R. Vernon Hays, superintendent of schools.

Speaking Tuesday night before a meeting of the East Haven Chamber of Commerce, Hays warned that unless some action was taken soon to put the Town on a more realistic basis, budget-wise, it was headed for a great deal of trouble. The remarks were not an criticism of the town government.

Pointing to the growing emphasis on Town financial matters in the papers, Hays asserted that East Haven was, in the absence of corrective measures, in the ludicrous position of a business enterprise which was consuming three times as much money as it was producing.

The head school administrator advanced three possibilities which the Town might consider in order to bring its revenues and its expenditures into balance: 1) secure the location here of heavy industry, 2) obtain an equalization of the school tax load over a larger base, i. e., on a state-wide basis, 3) enact some measure of controlling the growth of housing projects.

Two Possibilities
The school head said that of the three possibilities he listed as means of correcting this trend toward insolvency, he thought the latter two were more feasible.

The superintendent of schools endorsed the announced plans by Town officials to secure a zoning plan as promptly as possible in order to enact more rigid building requirements. He said that East Haven would do well to follow the example of North Haven in establishing larger minimum lot requirements and requiring certain improvements such as permanent roads.

Urges Equalization
Hays urged that the Town instruct its two representatives to the next session of the General Assembly to work for an equalization of the tax load for educating children. He explained the present state grants for current operating expenses are based on a rigid system which does not take into account a municipality's actual need for aid.

For example, he said, towns like North Haven and East Haven received the per pupil grant on the same basis. This, he said, notwithstanding the fact that North Haven has extensive industrial property from which it can derive a great deal more revenue than can East Haven. Many of the people who work in North Haven industries, live in East Haven and leave it to this town to educate their children, he pointed out.

Members of the chamber were unanimous in agreement that a zoning plan be adopted as quickly as possible.

Hays thought that a more equitable system might be enacted by the state legislature under a system of equalization taking into account the ratio between a town's school population and its grand list.

Support By Sales Tax
Since the revenue for state grants was received from a sales tax, there was little relation between a community's ability to pay taxes and the amount it did pay. He said that only until enough towns in predicaments similar to that of East Haven got together would there be a broadening of the educational tax base.

State grants to assist in the construction of schools was also calculated on a fixed basis rather than on need, Hays said, and were therefore insufficient help to growing towns like this one.

Radical Step
Hays stated also that each new family purchasing a home in East

Clancy Praises Committee Help In Drawing Budget

A school budget totaling \$1,160,000 to meet all the costs of constructing two 11-room elementary schools and a three-classroom addition will be submitted for action by a town meeting next Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Town Hall.

Official notice for the meeting was due to go out this week. The date is within a few days of a tentative schedule which Leslie Redfield, a member of the Board of Finance, had set forth at a meeting early last week.

There were no signs of open opposition to the budget which was approved by the Board of Finance at a joint meeting with the Elementary School Building Committee last week. The board and committee appeared to be in complete agreement on the final total.

Praises Committee
First Selectman Frank Clancy declared this week that he thought the Building Committee had done "a very good job." He said he wanted to express his public thanks to the committee "for their tremendous job, and for the way in which they handled it." He said he was pleased with the spirit of cooperation which was displayed by the committee and the Finance Board.

"Only their complete unity of purpose made it possible to get this final budget drawn so quickly," Clancy said.

The Town Hall was selected as a meeting place instead of the High School auditorium, as has been the case usually. A Finance Board member explained that little opposition was anticipated to the budget, and that consequently a large meeting place was not needed. He said also that the Finance Board, anxious to get things underway, had no time to check on the availability of the auditorium for next Thursday and thus selected the Town Hall. If, he said, the meeting could be transferred to the High School, Clancy said.

The Finance Board met Monday with Allen Smith, a representative of the Hartford bonding firm of Day, Berry and Howard, Hartford bonding attorneys, to prepare the final budget draft and town meeting call.

Sites Acquisition
To Be Included
In Bond Issue

Months of hard work by the Elementary School Building Committee bore fruit last Thursday night when the Board of Finance agreed to recommend \$1,160,000 to finance the current school building program. Town Counsel Richard Kelly is drawing up the call to a town meeting which will be held as quickly as possible following publication. Once the "Go" signal comes with approval of the bond issue, opening steps of the building program will be taken immediately.

Architect Herman Goldbecker informed the NEWS that once the town meeting approves the bond issue, actual construction could very possibly begin early in March. The D. French Co. of Derby, low bidders on the two schools in Gerish and Foxon districts gave an estimate of 270 days for completion, which even with favorable weather would carry it well into November.

However, Mr. Goldbecker stated that in his opinion, it might be possible for construction to be concentrated on the rooms needed for educational purposes, leaving the general purpose rooms for completion after the schools are actually in use. A precedent was set on the William E. Gillis School where classrooms were occupied a couple of weeks after the start of the school year in 1952, and final acceptance camp when the

Enactment Of A 'Skeleton' Town Zoning Plan Imminent

The enactment of a skeleton town plan which would entail larger residential lot requirements and serve as a check to the now unregulated increase of homes in East Haven is possible within the next few weeks.

Lawrence Moore, senior member of Technical Planning Associates, Inc., told a gathering of more than two dozen persons last Thursday evening that he hoped he would be able to present a general zoning plan to the Planning and Zoning Commission within "a week or 10 days" for subsequent enactment. The meeting was held by the Planning and Zoning Commission in the basement of the Town Hall.

Charles H. Miller, chairman of the Town planning body, favored the enactment of a general plan over the enforcement of limited and arbitrary regulations designed to check the rate of residential land development within East Haven limits.

When prepared by Technical Planning, which is now engaged in drawing up a detailed pilot plan, the "stop-gap" measure would be submitted to a public hearing. Moore told the assembly and the Commission that it would be in-

advisable for the Town to wait the "six or eight months" longer which would be needed to complete the pilot plan. "I can see no reason for finishing up a complete plan before taking certain steps," he said.

Moore said he thought it would be "injurious" to the Town not to take steps as quickly as possible to regulate the existing situation. The planner said he felt that the Town had a serious problem and that it ought to do something as soon as possible.

Moore pointed out that zoning is accomplished by the Zoning and Planning Commission in accordance with a comprehensive plan. He said he felt that a general plan which would serve later as the backbone of the more detailed pilot plan could meet legal requirements for a comprehensive zoning.

Miller, who introduced the New Haven plan, said in his opening remarks that the Town's present zoning code, set up in 1937, was "very weak" in some places. He said that it could be described generally as "obsolete."

In a remark later he stated that "We definitely want to help the Town x x x but now we are

To Ask Authority For Joining N.H. On Air Zoning Bd.

Enactment of an ordinance authorizing East Haven to participate with New Haven on a joint airport zoning commission may be sought in the near future.

First Selectman Frank Clancy today displayed a copy of a New Haven ordinance authorizing the city to appoint two members of a joint commission. The ordinance was adopted by the New Haven Board of Aldermen at a session last month.

The town chief said he had no doubt but that two local representatives would have to be selected to serve on the joint commission. The new body is authorized under an act passed by the last session of the General Assembly.

It would be composed of two members each from New Haven and East Haven. The four would, in turn, select a fifth member and chairman by majority vote. The commission would have the power to enforce zoning regulations in those East Haven areas affected by the flight paths of the New Haven Municipal Airport.

Clancy pointed to a provision in the new statute which would invest the state Aeronautics Commission with power to enforce any safety zoning regulations in the event this town failed to participate on a joint board. He said that the Town would thus be at the mercy of outside authorities, unless it cooperated.

Insurance Com'n To Weigh Private Survey Of Needs

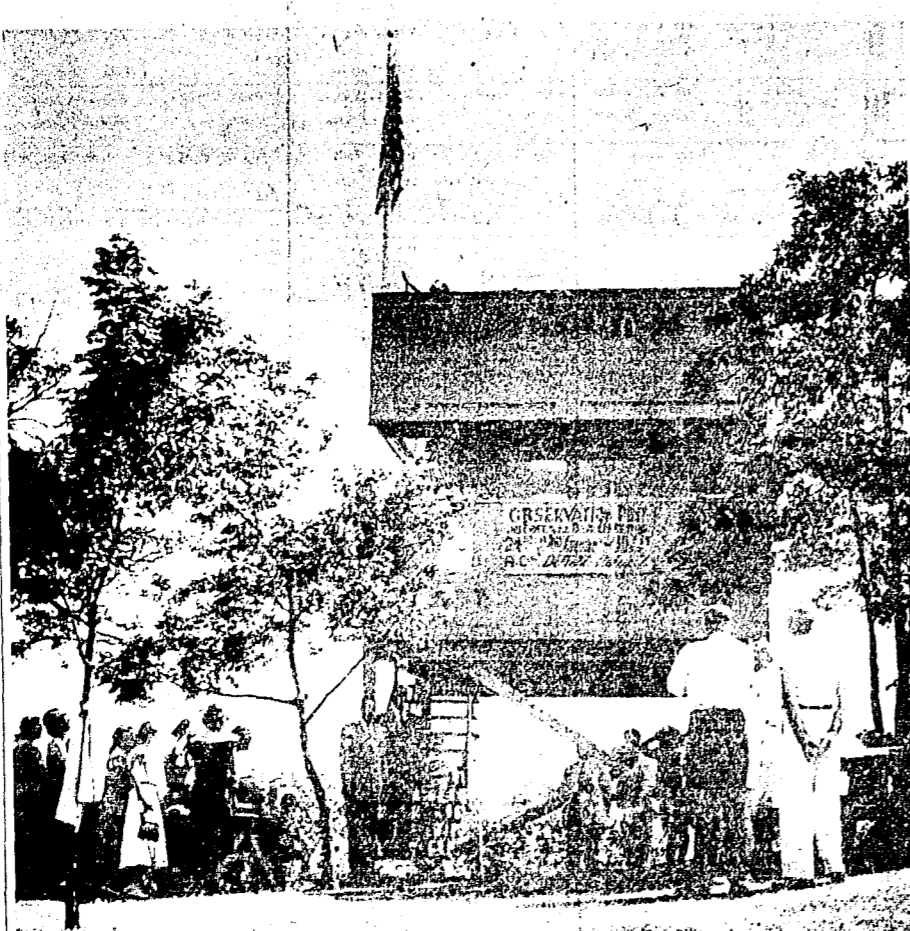
A meeting of the Insurance Commission with a representative of the Hartford Insurance firm of Watson, Morley and Baldwin took place last Saturday. Another meeting is scheduled for two o'clock this afternoon when the commission will consider a proposal by that firm to conduct a \$2,500 survey into Town insurance policies and a recommended plan of coverage.

First Selectman Frank Clancy said that the firm had offered to carry out the survey without cost to the Town and that its recommendations would be subject to approval or disapproval by the Insurance Commission. The plan would include possible reassignment of town property in building and upward revision of coverage on these buildings, heating equipment and on Town motor vehicles.

The firm, which provides some of the Town insurance would draw up a unified plan of coverage with the assistance and advice of the insurance commission, Clancy said. He also stated that insurance commissions would be divided among all local and active insurance brokers, in accordance with a plan announced earlier. Size of the firms would have some bearing on how much of a "cut" each received.

Clancy said he thought there were now "about eight or nine" active insurance firms in town. Each would receive a share regardless of "politics," he said. The plan was devised with the purpose of securing the most efficient system of insurance protection for the Town.

Post Needs Observers



Shown above is a picture of the Branford Civil Defense Observation Post at the base of its dedication in July 1952. The post, located at Memorial Park on Branford Point, has been in constant operation since that date as an integral part of the continental air defense system. This past season the top portion has been enlarged to protect observers from the weather. More volunteer observers are now being recruited in East Haven and Branford.

Recruit Air Spotters Here To Help Man Area Observatory

Because the radar screen protecting the continental United States against enemy attack cannot cover all areas, it must be supplemented by human observers using their own eyes and ears. For that reason, hundreds of ground observation posts have been re-established throughout the United States.

One of the most prominent parts played in this sphere of civil defense has been that of the observatory posted on a knoll in Memorial Park at Branford Point. During the war and since, when it was moved to its present location and quarters, the observatory post has had a leading part in many dramatic rescues of American pilots downed in Long Island Sound.

Most recently, early last December observers in the post spotted the flares about a downed Navy plane off New Haven harbor. The observers' report permitted a rescue by Coast Guard planes of Ensign James Shapiro and his mechanic, Donald E. Sackman.

Help Needed
The present post, in constant operation since it was opened on July 14, 1952, needs a large number of recruits to help the present staff continue this valuable civil

While recognizing the need of that area for recreational facilities, Redfield denied a request for "contingency fund" to be held in reserve for emergency expenditures, and any remaining funds would be used for town bond redemption.

State FFA Week Observed By Local Student Chapter

State "FFA Week" is being observed by the East Haven High School chapter of the Future Homemakers of America. The seven days, February 8 through 12, have been set aside in the state in recognition of the role played by this nationwide organization of high school girls who are dedicating themselves to improving family and community life.

This organization which was originated in 1915 has, since that time, grown to a membership of more than 250,000 throughout the United States and including members from Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Several national meetings have been held in which practically every state in the Union was represented. Last summer, 2,000 girls participated in a national convention held in Columbus, Ohio.

The East Haven chapter, which is considered one of the best in the state, has several of its members holding offices in the state organization. These officers include Nancy Callahan and Vice President Sybil Provost, while Carl Walsh, president of the local chapter, is now serving as a member of the national finance committee.

The local chapter of the FFA has opened its activities aimed at improving community life by preparing and delivering Christmas boxes to the patients in convalescent hospitals in East Haven. It was represented by its own delegates at the national conventions held in Columbus, Ohio, and before that in Kansas City, Mo. It hopes to be able to send delegates to a regional convention to be held next summer at the University of New Hampshire in Durham, N. H.

Gradually Growing
It is gradually expanding its membership and now has a total enrollment of 35 girls. Besides Miss Walsh, other officers of the group are: Dorothy Johns, vice president; Josephine Nordin, secretary; Judy Applegate, treasurer; Elizabeth De Palma, parliamentarian; Helen Kelsey, reporter; and Betsy Cochran, song leader.

A regional meeting of the FFA will be held in the High School auditorium on March 17 when the local chapter will be hostess to members of the Seymour chapter and representatives from Bullard Havens Technical School of Bridgeport.

At this meeting the campaign and election of state song leader will be conducted as well as the election of a regional nominee for the post of state president. Miss Walsh plans to be a candidate for this office. Eva Aldrich will be a candidate for the post of state song leader.

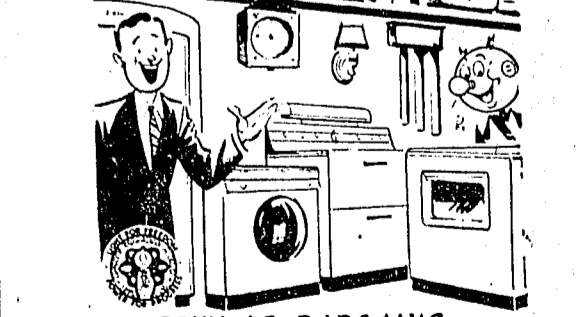
