

GOP Leaders Re-elected

Anastasio, Re-Elected, Is Girding For Clancy Ouster

His primary, though somewhat distant in time, objective as head of the Republican Town Committee was to oust the Democratic Town administration of Frank S. Clancy. That's what Matthew Anastasio said this week upon his being re-elected as top officer in the local Republican party setup.

Anastasio and three other officers of the town committee were re-elected "unanimously" or at least without opposition at an organizational meeting Monday night. The other officers are: Charlotte Miller, vice chairman; Mrs. Ruth Barker, secretary; and William Jasper, treasurer.

The meeting followed a primary last Thursday in which a 53-member town committee was elected by a single ballot to two-year terms. Reported "Spill" Healed

The "unanimous" vote along with other reports on the state of affairs in the local Republican party indicated that a reported split of several months ago had been healed, temporarily, at least. At that time, it was reported, Anastasio had come under criticism of some portions of the party who had blamed him as partly responsible for the Republican defeat in the last Town election despite the fact that he was not the campaign chairman.

"The Republican Town Committee is closer (in agreement) than it has ever been," Anastasio reported. The Town chairman, who starts his second two-year term as head of the local party organization, said that as far as he was concerned the town committee was never "split down the middle" as was unofficially reported about two months ago. His claim of party unity was backed by another reliable source.

Not "Packing" Action

Anastasio was asked if there was any truth to the theory of some observers that the town committee was expanded from 51 to 53 in order to "pack" it with his

supporters. "No such thing," he replied. He asserted that the action was taken to give the growing town "more representation." "We thought it was a good idea to bring in new people," he said, adding that it meant increased representation for such out-lying and expanding areas as Foxon and the West End.

Anastasio said that the committee members had "differences of opinions" but that "I still want to respect anyone who has an honest difference of opinion from mine."

"The only fight I have, as chairman, and you can quote me on this," he said, "is the fight to take out the present Town administration." "I think Clancy has made enough mistakes already and I am hoping that I will see him go out in the next election," said Anastasio.

The GOP town chairman was asked about the coming state elections, and his own political fortunes as a supporter of, and assistant to, State Comptroller Fred R. Zeller. He replied that "I expect John Lodge to be a candidate for re-election as governor; Ned Allen, as lieutenant governor, and Fred Zeller, as comptroller."

He was asked about the "Eisenhower or McCarthy" question that was voted upon by several Republican caucuses in the state—particularly on the Avon caucus which voted approximately 350 to one for Eisenhower.

Anastasio replied that he would endorse the opinion of State Chairman Clarence Baldwin and national Committeeman Maurice Alcorn who thought these caucuses should have voted on the matter. "Eisenhower is head of the party and I don't see why anybody would question it," he said. "What is this vote accomplishing, and what bearing would it have on Eisenhower's leadership?" he asked.

Also voted at last week's uncontested primary were two new regulations. One now grants to the

town committee power to increase its membership by a two-thirds vote. The other requires a \$200 fee for the filing of any opposition slate.

ness. However, it was acknowledged that that area would have a problem in providing off-street parking space.

Moore explained that if the new zoning were instituted it would not effect those lots already subdivided and laid out under the present zoning regulations, and filed after approval by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Industry Over-Emphasized

During the course of the discussion Moore said that the "idea of industry helping to pay the Town tax load" was over-emphasized. "You'd have to get a tremendous amount of industry to over-balance the residential" he said. However, he said, there was no doubt that the Town should get "more business and more industry" to help pay the tax load.

Walter Schoenknecht, of Granville St., said that "it is doubtful that East Haven is going to get much industry with other towns competing with better land."

Charles Miller, chairman of the Zoning Commission, and Andrew Vitale, Democratic member, were the only two commissioners present at the meeting. "The 'public' was represented by Schoenknecht, who had been a leader in the Lynnwood section in supporting the town plan; by Attorney Anthony DeMayo, president of the Lynnwood Association; by Mrs. David Peck appearing as a reporter and by Mrs. Walter Kane, of Minor Rd., Monauguin, and by other reporters.

Schoenknecht urged that the half-acre limit be extended to all "open" areas north of the railroad tracks not already subdivided for homes, and under his suggestion the amount of area so to be designated will be increased on the revised plan map. Mrs. Kane favored the minimum for the entire town area except the "one-acre" area.

Moore said he favored increasing minimum lot sizes. "I'm a firm believer in up-grading wherever

you can," he said. Emphasis on the "up-grading" was provided by the general feeling that the Town plan can serve a valuable function in slowing the rapid development of the Town. The growth threatens to strain the Town's financial resources.

DeMayo raised the question as to whether the Town was safe in drawing a plan for half of the town instead of seeking to enact an entire plan. Chairman Miller said that, while he would reword the statute granting authority to the board, he was fairly sure that since the Zoning Commission was established that it was within its power to zone for a substantial section of the Town.

Agree On Partial Approach

Moore and Miller were in agreement that the northerly portion of the Town ought to be worked on first. Moore told DeMayo that the section of the Town above railroad tracks was "Comparatively simple" as against the complicated situation of the southern half. Moore and Miller agreed that there were extensive shore properties and now-vacant land which would have to be, more closely surveyed. "It is our understanding," said Moore, "that time is of the es-

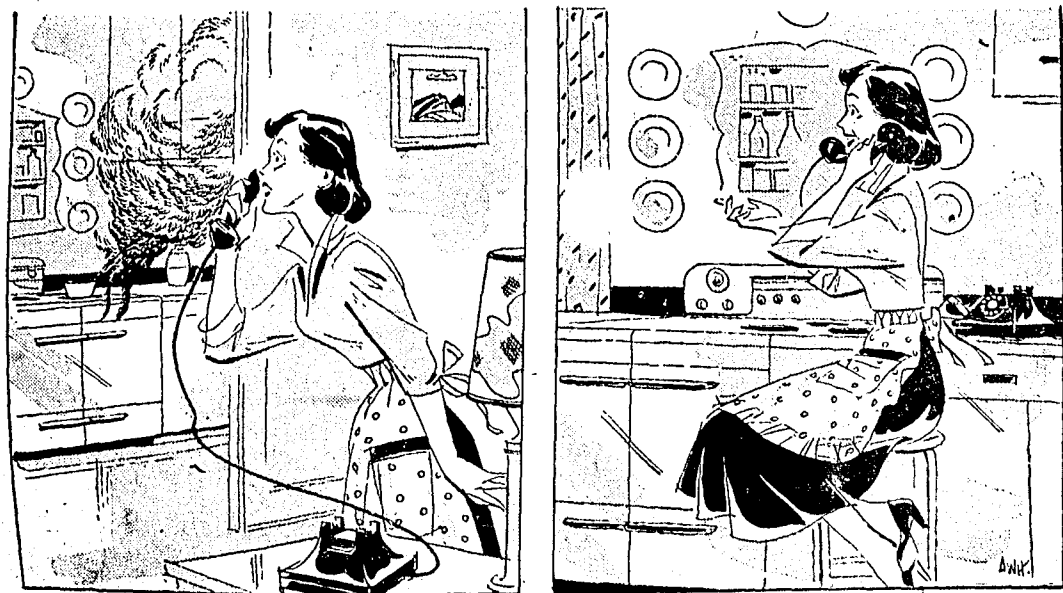
