James F. Gartland, Democratic James F. Gartiana, Democratic Town Chairman, today openly tossed his hat into the ring as a ination for Congressman from the Third District.

Third District. His announcement followed n declaration by Borough Warden John A. McGuire in Wallingford last Saturday that he would seek to run again for the seat he held in Congress. He served two terms until he was defeated in 1952 by the present incumment, Republican Congressman Albert Cretella. Gartland who is state central Gartland who is state central

committeeman for the 12th state senatorial district had previously announced his "Interest" in the nomination hut this was his first nomination nut this was his first forthright declaration. Ile told the NEWS yesterday that the "const" was now "clear" and that his personal and business considera-tions were converted to the state of the state o tions were squared away to make it possible for him to be an active andidate.

Reports Favorable Reaction The local Democratic chieftair said that he made an "overall survey" of the district and had sounded out numerous party lead-ers on the idea of his candidacy. He reported a "very favorable re-action" to his "feelers" and an-nounced that he was "encouraged by what I see."

It would appear that only two candidates have thus far announce ed their willingness to pursue the Democratic nomination. It is very likely that the Democratic nom-inee, whoever he is, will have Cretella, who has already given signs of wanting to run again, as an opponent.

Other possible candidates, in cluding Mark Barberilo, New Ha-ven Tax collector who might be able to command a sizeable block of votes in the New Haven dele-gation, have been "mentioned." Democrats in the state are hopeful of carrying most if not all of the six congressional seats this year. Without the "magio" of the Eisenhower name at the top of the Eisenhower name at the top of the ballot, Republican candidates are likely to find tougher sledding this year. 

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

No Time To Fight

The Board of Education and the teachers are in danger of running head-on into a controversy over the salary question - a con troversy certainly, that neither side wants, would appear that the main cause of vexation is a mutual misunderstanding,

One of the factors contributing to the misunderstanding appears to be the distance. n space and time, separating the two sides. Replies take days to eatch up with original statements which are modified or explained in the interim. For example, last Friday o letter from teacher representatives, dated March 11, was read to the Board of Educaion informing it that its recommendation for i salary increase was drawn up in unilateral etion and without consent of the teachers.

Before the letter was read to the board and since it was written, Chairman Francis Walsh had explained in public statements that the board recognizes that its action was unilateral and that it would have to obtain the consent of the teachers in any modificaion of the existing salary schedule. He said also that he planned to meet with the teachers again.

The letter served, however, to irk, one board member into a statement that the teachers' claim that a contract was, in danger of being violated (is that what they meant?) was absurd. This board member, has also maintained that the teachers are employing "squeeze" in using the emergency created by the shortage of elementary school teachers to win their demands for more pay.

At least, one member of the joint salar committee for the teachers denics that the eachers are attempting to employ any squeeze," and the latest statement from the sommittee maintains that the welfare of our school children is the first consideration.


