

# **Indifferent Parents Blamed For Juvenile Delinquency Problem**

Surprenant Opposes Suppressing Info **On Misdemeanors**

"The beginning of juvenile delinquency comes when the authority of the teacher is by-passed to the extent that when the condition is reported to the home, nothing is done to correct the situation."

So said Edgar Surprenant, president of the East Haven Council of Parents and Teachers, at a meeting of the council, Monday evening, Surprenant declared that juvenile delinquency "can only be corrected by parents and teach-ers". He said it was a "community problem", and chine out against the suppression of reports of misdemeanors. Members of the council were in

agreement that juvenile dellin-quency exists at least in some measure in East Haven during a discussion devoted to the problem; While suggestions were offered concerning steps to be taken to curb the current trend in delinquency, action was deferred by the council on setting up a "fact-finding committee" to study the situation and recommend cor-rective measures. Urges Action By Both

Juvenile delinquency as a com-munnity problem "should, be tak-en up collectively by both parties

(leachers and parents)" Supremant said. "If it can't be resolved that way, it should be brought to the ttention of the authorities." Citing a situation existing in one of the elementary schools where eventh graders have become trou

some, he added, "Far be it from to feel that any child of that age is so far gone that (the con-dition) can't be corrected before it gets that far."

Opposes Suppressing Of Reports "Anything that comes up in the schools, and is brought out the the newspapers, should not be suppress ed," Surprenant sald. "It should be brought up before the Board of Education, even if this means going over the head of the princi-pal of the school to bring it to the proper authorities. That way, evervone will recognize the fact that there's a certain amount of this delinquency in their community, and they will be able to stamp it

out before it gets a head start," Mrs. Anthony Panagrossi, pres-ident of the High School P. T. A. blamed at least part of the trou-ble on overcrowded conditions in the schools, where "the teacher hasn't the time to give each one individual attention." She points out that a child who finishes his work ahead of the class and has idle time "is going to get into trouble." She added that "the  $6\cdot3\cdot3$ plan adopted last year by the town is designed to help these youngsters, particularly in the seventh grade." Mrs. Panagrossi also mentioned the strong creative instincts inherent in children of this age group, which would be provided for by homemaking and

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# **Plan Pumping Station** To Serve Foxon Area Water Co. Announces Would Be Housed Heavy Down-Pour In Residence

Damage To Roads Heavy rains over the past week tion to be housed in a Colonialstyle building to serve and high lave caused considerable damage area of Foxon Park.' Foxon, and Montowese were unvelled by a representative of the New Haven o road surfaces and brought numerous complaints of flooding, Water Company last night. The First Selectman Frank S. Clancy plans were presented to a meeting reported yesterday. of the Planning and Zoning Commission by Joseph A. Novaro, on-gineer for the water company.

Clancy said that water coursing over the surface of Oregon Ave, caused so much damage that it was necessary to bring in new fill and prepare for resurfacing. Un-usually heavy tides resulted in a swelling of the creek running un-der the new bridge on Mansfield Grove Rd. The swirling waters removed part of the bog land so that the road sank along a 25-foot section making the road impassable. Clancy said that new fill was applied this week and is being allow ed to settle before new surfacing applied. In Foxon the rain undermined

The imping station would hook into the 48-inch main under Foxon Rd., pumping water into another main to the "stand pipe". The reservoir will be crected just over the line in North Haven and will be based at an elevation of 340 feet above ca level.
