Changing Finance Board

Last week these columns opined a little about what was regarded as a desirable change in the structure of the Board of Finance. As stood by us, he favors amendment of the ual department head or heads, none will be about the desired changes.

In addition, then, to our general judgment favoring a separated Board of Finance we would like to propose - and it is a timely proposal - that the amended act provides for mandatory publication of the Fown budget in advance of the annual town meeting: "

If our recollection is good, the practice that has been followed is to file the proposed budget with the town clerk's office where nny interested members of the public may see it.

hermore, we demand that the proposed bud gets of each department be released to the ublic as soon as they are presented to the Finance and before they are cut. When the fire chief or the police chief or any other department head decides he needs certain things for his department, the public ought to know what he wants.

To demonstrate why, let's take a pure ly hypothetical case. Let us suppose a depart ment head decides that he needs a particular piece of equipment which is expensive but which he feels is essential to the protection of the town. And let us suppose that the Board of Finance feels that the Town cannot afford the equipment, so that the proposed purchase of this equipment is dropped. Finalv let us suppose that a Town disaster proves that the department head was right and the Board of Finance was wrong.

So, how is the public to decide whose udgment was in error? There is no way of knowing under the present system. The traditional policy has been to keep so much of this information under wraps that the public s kept in the dark. Therefore, we suggest that these pro-

Bold Policy For Radio

The radio and television industry, with some notable exceptions, has pretty much pussy-footed when faced with the problems of airing controversial issues. More so than the press, it has been subject to pressures from various quarters.

Facts about Lightning Lightning is simply a visible dis-play of atmospheric electricity, the origin believed to be caused by friction. A period of dry weather causes a great accumulation of ls rarely heard for more than fif-teen to twenty miles. I would like to add that alelectricity, with the particles of air distributing their charges through each other. Under ordinary conditions, the distance between the earth and line sky is too great for a spark to pass. The effect of these discharges on vapor, however, is to condense ill into larger globules; this causes it to sink toward the earth as a cloud, and the enormous tension relieves itself by passing from one cloud to another, or to the earth or ob-jects upon it, preferably projec-tions of some height.

Lightning, according to its man-ifestations, is divided into three classes. The so-called "flash" or "stroke" in so-catter institute as a sharp zigwag line of extreme hilliancy of the same forked; but as more clearly revealed by photo-graphy, shows a wavy line oscillating with great rapidity — also appearing in numerous other shapes.

The second sort is "shee" light-ning_(Funny_I always 'thought it was called "heat" lighting_ didn't you?)-this display is a sudden glow of a golden or red-dish tinge on the horizon, with no definite shape or bounds, and is a reflection of discharges out of sight beyond the horizon, cast on the clouds or atmospheric haze, it is visible sometimes for many scores of miles beyond the place of the actual storm that is causing the flashes.

A third is "ball" lightning, which for a long time was not ad-mitted as a genuine form of elec-tric discharge, and is still a very difficult and, in some points, an unexplainable phenomenon.
