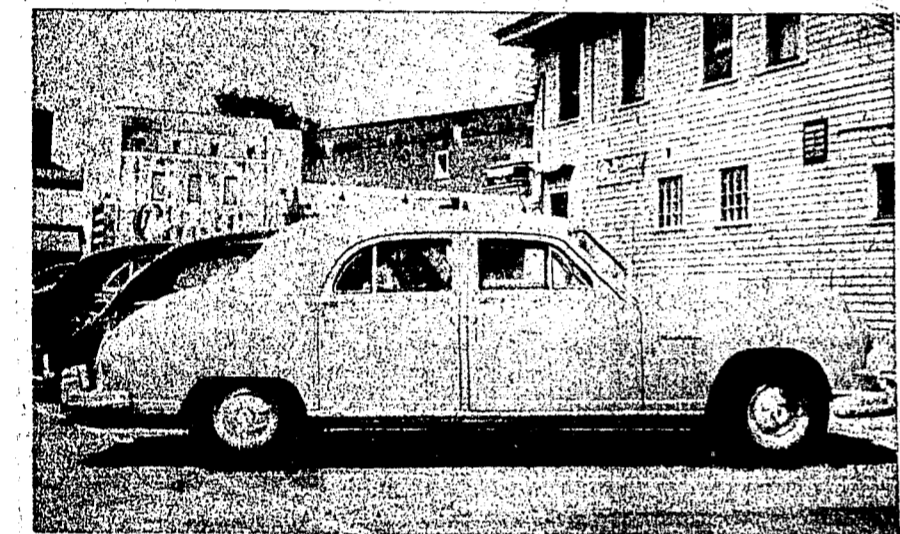

## Revised Parking Regulations Sought



Merchants concerned over the growing need for parking space along Main St. are asking that parking meters be placed in this section of the street opposite Kirkham Ave. They claim that the argument that because it is an intersection this area should be kept clear does not hold. They point out that a similar area opposite Taylor Ave. is equipped with meters. Cars and trucks have been parking here until recently when the curb was repainted yellow to prohibit them.



This blue Frazer, usually can be found parked all day in the municipal parking lot between Fred's Restaurant and Metcalf's Drug Store. It is an instance of reported abuse by a number of people who have been using the town-owned parking lot to store their cars and trucks all during the business day. Merchants are demanding that a time-limit be imposed or that meters be placed inside the lot.

## Parking Bd. Slow In Organizing Is Cause For Growing Anxiety

A number of East Haven merchants who have been leading the campaign to establish a functional Parking Authority to plan for future off-street parking facilities view with growing concern the slowness of the Town Administration in setting the authority into motion.

Hampered by the enforced absence of several of its members during the seven months since it was organized, the Authority has never met as an official body to elect its own chairman and to proceed with plans for a study of the Town parking situation.

In the meantime the Planning and Zoning Commission and Technical Planning Associates, New Haven planning firm, have nearly completed a general plan for the Town and for the center district.

Endorsed By Both Parties  
Last Fall during the Town election campaign, the present leading incumbents, then candidates for election, leaped forward to endorse the idea of a Parking Authority set forth by the local Chamber of Commerce. The chamber had voted to poll both parties on the question, and the Democratic answer came back quick as a wink: the party was all for it. The Republican candidates also endorsed such an authority.

After taking office, First Selectman Frank Clancy began the long drawn-out process of selecting men who in his opinion would constitute a capable authority. At first two members of the Board of Public Safety, Bertel Klockars, a Republican, and Fred Wolfe, Jr., a Democrat, were named along with Thomas Reilly, local lawyer and registered Democrat who headed Chamber efforts to press for the creation of an authority.

Then John Kmetzo, a retailer, was named as another Republican member of the board. The fifth position was unfilled for some time. Clancy claimed he found it difficult to secure good men for the post.

Decides Against Dual Jobs  
About the middle of last January the first selectman named Harold LaPointe as the fifth member of the authority. But just

## Ditch Blockers Plague To Town And Mosquito Control

A local property owner, who failed to observe state regulations by blocking a marshland drainage ditch while placing fill, has been given a warning by Julius Elston, chief of the Division of Mosquito Control of the State Department of Health.

This was disclosed by the first selectman's office this week, although the name of the property owner was not released. East Haven has 545 acres of salt marsh areas which have drainage ditches maintained by the state. Maintenance of these ditches are governed by state regulations, which prohibit their being blocked.

According to Elston, procedures are recommended for the filling of land from the perimeter of marsh areas so that drained areas are not sealed off to provide breeding grounds for salt marsh mosquitoes, considered to be among the worst pests of the shore areas.

Spite Blocking  
First Selectman Frank Clancy revealed this week that a drainage ditch on Casey Beach Ave. extension had been blocked by someone who dumped a wheel-barrow load of dirt into the middle of the ditch. As a result water stagnated in the ditch. The first selectman said that appearances were that the blocking of the ditch was done "on spite" since the dirt was taken from near the ditch to be dumped into it.

Clancy revealed that the dumping of rubbish and refuse into Town drainage ditches was a constant source of trouble to the Town. He reported also that inspection of one blocked storm-water catch basin revealed that someone had apparently stuffed an old coat down in it, causing the area to flood.

Town to Prosecute  
The first selectman said that the local Police Department was notified of several similar instances and that persons apprehended in the act of blocking ditches or drainage ditches will be subject to prosecution by the Town.

In a case previously reported by Clancy, rubbish tossed into Tuttle Brook had accumulated at the opening under the Burr St. bridge causing the water to back up threatening serious damage to neighboring property. Workmen had to remove the junk in a heavy downpour in order to remedy the situation.

Town crews now have the additional worry of the piped section of the Tuttle brook which traverses the grounds of the new school on Gerrish Ave. Blockage of the huge pipe could cause a tremendous back-flow of water.

## Construction Permits In May Hit Year High But Below May 1953

The number of building permits hit a high for 1954 last month when the Building Department issued 87 permits of which 47 were for dwellings with an estimated completion value of \$397,000.

However the total was far below the record 180 permits (140 for dwellings with estimated value of \$1,162,500) that were issued during the month of May in 1953.

## Town Insurance Commission O.K.'s Survey Proposals

The Town Insurance Commission voted Monday night to approve the recommendations made by a town insurance survey made by the Hartford firm of Watson, Marley and Baldwin, according to First Selectman Frank Clancy. Next Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock the commission will meet jointly with the Board of Finance for the purpose of discussing the recommendations.

According to a notice from the Commission it had approved a report by the United States Fidelity and Guarantee Company. However, Clancy pointed out that this was inaccurate since the report was prepared by the Hartford firm, although it is an agency for the U.S.F. & G. after Tuesday's meeting but revealed that it recommended a total coverage of \$3,320,600 in fire insurance for all municipal buildings, including schools. Actual coverage amounts to only \$1,448,100.

The first selectman said that the budgetary allotment for insurance, mostly for fire protection, amounts to \$12,500 covering a period of five years. To obtain the additional \$1,872,500 coverage recommended, he estimated, would cost another \$17,000 for the same period.

The first selectman said that the Town had 17 buildings in all to insure and that in most of these cases the coverage was much below cost of replacement. He gave as an example the High School which has an insurable value of \$1,800,000 but is insured for only \$457,000 or 30.2 per cent of its insurable value.

He said that the Board of Finance would study the advisability of increasing coverage as recommended under the insurance company's report. The first selectman called it a "pretty thorough report" and said that the administration "now knows where we are going."

## Ordinance Proposed To Set \$500 Bond On St. Excavations

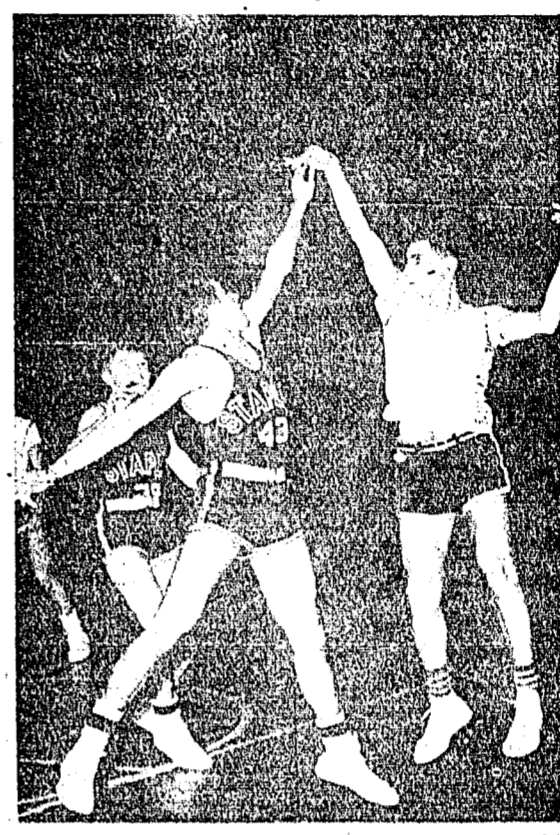
A proposed ordinance upping the permits for street excavations to three dollars and requiring a \$500 performance bond of the excavator to insure that he restores the road surface to its original condition will shortly be presented for public hearing.

The ordinance, First Selectman Frank Clancy said, is aimed at plumbers and excavators who have been passing the buck on road repairs leaving the Town with the cost of repairing road surfaces damaged by such excavations.

## Mock Raid To Be Conducted Throughout State

East Haven will participate in a state-wide air raid test Monday morning starting at 10 a.m. and lasting until 10:17 when the all clear signal is to be sounded.

Motorists, pedestrians, and school children will be subject to special safety regulations during the period of the test. All motorists will be required to halt their cars at the side of the road. Instructions are that occupants of cars are to seek a defense shelter, or there being none readily available to remain in the cars, with windows left open. In actual air raid conditions motor car passengers would be required to huddle near the floor of their vehicles. All pedestrians will be required to leave the streets to seek shelter.

In the schools, all children will leave their classrooms to go to designated safety areas in their school buildings in a "Duck and Cover" exercise.

Members of the Police Force and the Auxiliary Police will be stationed throughout the Town to see that air raid regulations are to be observed.

Signals Described  
The air raid ALARM for the center district of town will consist of two series of 32 blasts each. The alarm will be sounded on the Fire House bell-tower. The ALL CLEAR will consist of 25 blasts repeated at two-minute intervals three times.

In other districts the ALARM will consist of a continuous sounding of siren or horn for three minutes or for as long as the compressed air for these alarms hold out. For the ALL CLEAR, the sounding device will give forth a minute-long signal repeated three times at two-minute intervals. The mock raid will be declared over at the end of this signal.

The local operation will be under the direction of Allan Knight, Civil Defense Director for East Haven, who will use the office of First Selectman Frank S. Clancy as his control center.

The only exception to the ban on motor and pedestrian traffic will be permission granted to police and fire vehicles and ambulances to answer emergency calls.

Posters in Stores  
Members of the local Civil Defense groups have distributed posters with directions notifying the public of the raid and presenting directions to be followed. The regulations are re-printed by the NEWS for handy reference.

Under the state-wide mock raid, civil defense authorities are staging a test which presupposes that the City of Hartford has been subjected to a bombing raid.

## Instructions For Air Raid Test Monday Morning

Sirens will sound the RED ALERT at 10 a.m. D.S.T. Monday throughout the State of Connecticut indicating that a simulated enemy attack is imminent.

The ALL CLEAR will be completed at 10:17 a.m. Traffic will NOT be allowed to move until this signal is given completely.

During the test all motorists are requested to follow the official Air Raid Warning Instructions received with their new 1954 operator's license.

Police vehicles, fire apparatus and ambulances responding to emergency call will be permitted to travel during the period of the Red Signal.

Pedestrians will get off the street and seek the nearest shelter.

All personnel in schools, stores, and other public buildings will go to the shelter as designated by the Wardens of the buildings.

The test is in conjunction with "OPERATION ALERT" currently being held this day throughout the entire United States. It further teaches you what to do in the event of an enemy attack. The next sounding of the RED ALERT may be the real thing.

## High School To Graduate 120 Students In Exercises Thurs.

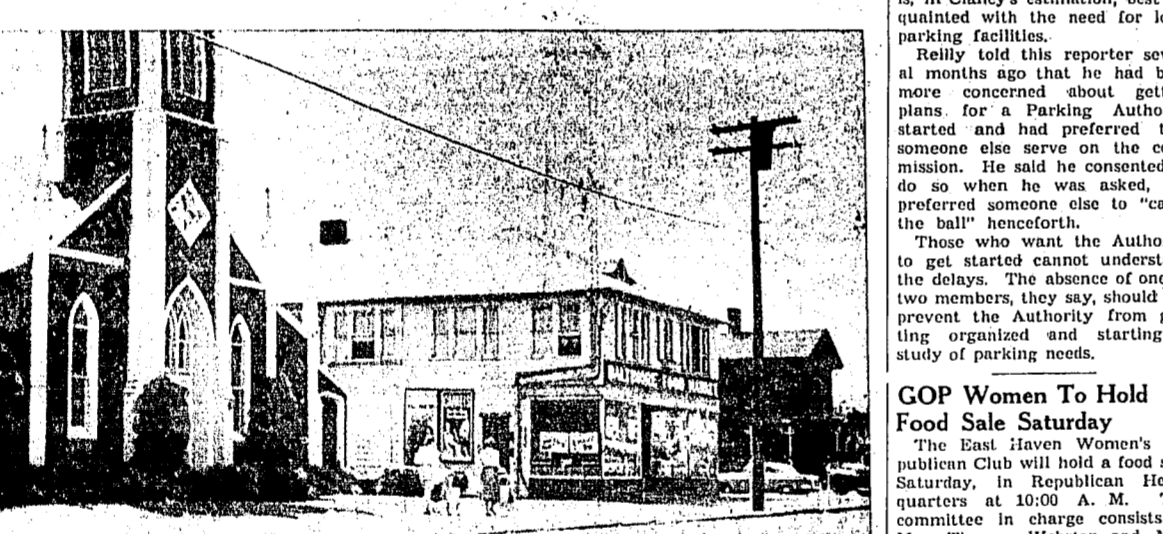

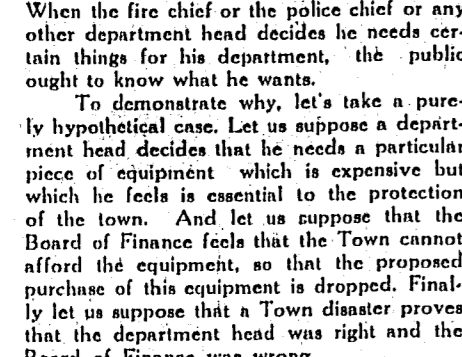

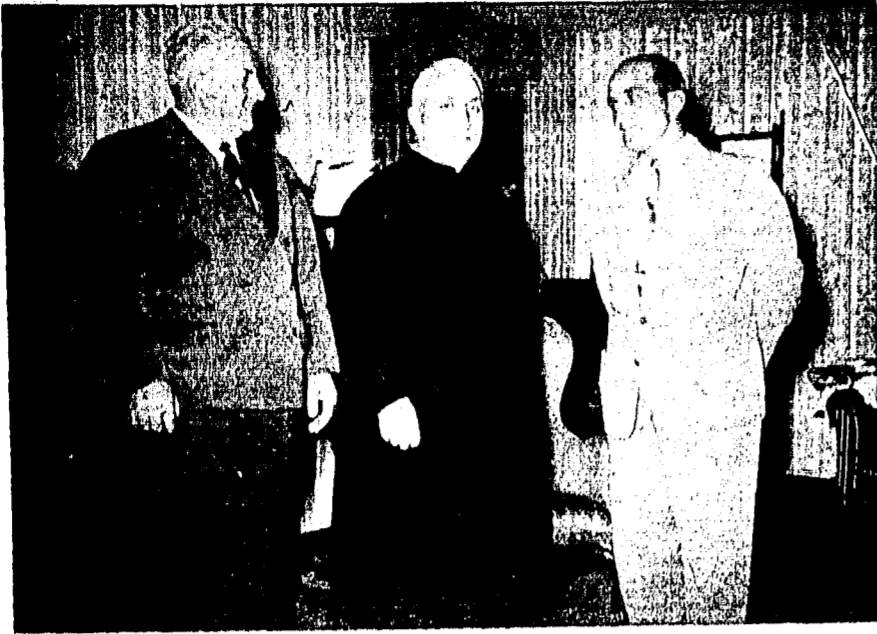

Facts about Lightning  
Lightning is simply a visible display of atmospheric electricity, the origin believed to be caused by friction. A period of dry weather causes a great accumulation of electricity, with the particles of air distributing their charges through each other. Under ordinary conditions, the distance between the earth and the sky is too great for a spark to pass. The effect of these discharges on vapor, however, is to condense it into larger globules; this causes it to sink toward the earth as a cloud, and the enormous tension relieves itself by passing from one cloud to another, or to the earth or objects upon it, preferably projections of some height.

Lightning, according to its manifestations, is divided into three classes. The so-called "flash" or "streak" lightning appears either as a sharp zigzag line of extreme brilliancy, or the same forked, but as more clearly revealed by photography, shows a wavy line oscillating with great rapidity — also appearing in numerous other shapes.

The second sort is "sheet" lightning—(Funny—I always thought it was called "heat" lightning—didn't you?)—this display is a sudden glow of a golden or reddish tinge on the horizon, with no definite shape or bounds, and is a reflection of discharges out of sight beyond the horizon, east on the clouds or atmospheric haze. It is visible sometimes for many scores of miles beyond the place of the actual storm that is causing the flashes.

**TV Should Offer Children Beller Shows, Parker Says**

A country with the diversity and richness of America surely has more to offer its children on television than western dramas and circus acts, a Hamden man who recently directed an extensive TV program study, told a United States Senate subcommittee in New York last week. Everett C. Parker of 421 Skiff St. was director of the project in which the National Council of Churches under the supervision of the Yale Divinity School, studied TV programs and parent and child reaction to them.

Parker, who is lecturer in religious radio and television at Yale

University, told the Senate subcommittee in New York. "Our age can and should be creating children's Classics, and television offers a marvelous medium for such creative activity." The Senate subcommittee currently is studying juvenile delinquency today. The Hamden man has called for further experimentation with video programs which are basically educational but are primarily entertaining in their content. Referring to the recently concluded TV study of the New Haven area, Parker said, "We did not document any evil effects of tele-

vision in this study although there were parents who claimed certain shows had had effects on their children. Nor did we document any good effects. It is true and significant that no parent reported any imitation by children of desirable traits depicted by television characters. We did, however, document the concern and confusion of a large number of parents and a genuine uneasiness regarding the impact of this medium upon the lives and character of their children. "And may I go even further and say that in the research reading we did prior to and during this survey we discovered the same concern and confusion among the psychologists and educators. We do not believe that today anyone in this country can answer the question: What is the effect of television upon children? "We need research of a scope

and competence that is equal to the size of the question before us. No one, so far as I know, is conducting a program of research in this area of the necessary scope. "We do not believe that as television has seized upon the time and imagination of children it must be an influence of tremendous potential for good or bad behavior and attitudes. We did discover that children are indiscriminate in their viewing tastes. They watch television for television's sake to a large extent. They watch programs that we do not judge good as happily as they do programs that we call bad. "We are not, making this state-

support a few feet high. It has been said, on occasion, to float through an open door or window into a house, as though drawn by a draft of air. It usually explodes, but without doing much damage. During a storm, the heat produced by the electrical discharges (traversing the atmosphere, causes a sudden expansion of the particles next to it, with a sharp compression of those beyond, in a great wave; on its passage the particles contract as suddenly, and the waves roll violently back, producing the noise of thunder, which is rarely heard for more than fifteen to twenty miles. I would like to add that although it is not necessary to have an uncontrollable fear of lightning, it is wise to use common sense during an electrical storm, so as to help prevent injuries and fatalities caused by lightning.
