

Earlier this year the Highway Department resurfaced the upper section of the street. The Town left off repairing the lower section until construction in that area had been completed and heavy equipment was no longer in

The local lawyer, who heads the Lynwood Civic Association, said that his petition to the county commissioners, if taken, would in directly represent the Lynwood group since protesting residents are members of the association He admitted that his action would be "extraordinary" but said that "I feel that's the only thing left to



Harold E. LaPointe, of 39 Eim of 101 Hotchkiss Rd. Ext. were selected as the Democratic exccutive committee's choice for state representatives at a special meeting Tuesday evening. They will be passed on by the full town committee next Tuesday.

Charles M. Copeland, of 57 Catherine St., former deputy judge in the Town court and for mer member of the Board of Education, was selected as the committee's choice for the nomination for judge of probate in the newly greated East Haven dis-

nously voted by the executive segment of the Democratic town committee and will be presented to a party caucus to be held here August 24. No opposition is exected to these candidates wi likely will be nominated by

Four names were submitted for the house nominations but two of the candidates, Jerome Grady, of 12 River St., and Arthur Riccio of 96 Hughes St., requested that their names be withdrawn. Both said they could not "find time to give proper consideration to such an important position."

Two of the selections, LaPointe and Copeland, came las no surprise to political observers. How ever, the second selection for state representative, Alackett, is r newcomer in local politics and virtually unknown in political circles although he is reported to have a background in politics b New Haven. He is an official with the New Haven Railrone

company.

LaPointe, who has served on the local Board of Education and, for a time, was considered as a replacement for Charles Copeland on that board last year, has been considered a "natural" selection for the state House of Representatives. He is employed as a health counsellor with the Southern New England Telephone Company, He was honored recently in recogni-tion of 25 years of service with the company.

Copeland is well known in East Haven. In addition to serving as deputy judge under the late Armen Krikorian during the 1949-51 term, he was a member of the building committee for the Gills School and served most of a three-year term as a member of which he resigned last summer He conducts an auditing and

McGuire May Take Battle To Floor

Golden rolled relentlessly on to its announced objective: the nom-Ination of James F. Gartland, East Haven town chairman, as the Democratic candidate for Congressman from the Third District.

And despite reports of frantic behind-the-scenes efforts by ex-Congressman John McGuire to capture the nomination just one more time, indications were that Gardand would be nominated by an overwhelming majority among the 251 votes to be cast

Adoption of a unit-rule resolu-tion by the New Haven delegation over the voiced protests of a single man appeared to spell doom for the chances of Mc-Goom for the chances of Me-Guire Monday evening. The key 90-man delegation will be bound to support en bloc its majority choice - and all indications were that the choice - Golden's choice - was "Jimmy" Gartland.

"Surprise" Unlikely

No Effect On Golden

These intercessions for McGuire are falling on deaf cars as far as Golden is concerned, according to reports. The New Haven party chieftain has anticipated all this and is undeterred. Golden isn't mad at McGuire, some observers say. He is simply opposing Mc-Guire because the Wallingford borough warden has be pressed in the organizational

McGuire backers are hinting at a last minute coup. In the key New Haven delegation they purport to command 32 votes pledged to McGuire with hopes of picking up 14 more. This bare majoring up 14 more. This bare majorily of 46 votes may stay away or walk out of the convention preventing a vote under the unit rule. Where the alternates enter into this is not explained.

One Gartland backer claims the possibility that the Wallingford delegation, normally expected to back McGuire may show a split. Several token candidates are in the field by convention time but are expected to withdraw quickly. One, Hamden Town Chairman Dennis Garvey, who commands 22 votes, has withdrawn. man Dennis Garvey, who com-mands 22 votes, has withdrawn. Kenneth Wynne Jr., of North Haven, also may be placed in nomination, but is likewise ex-
