Wins GOP Probate Nomination



Reynolds Named For Probate Court, Croumey and Mautte Re-nominated

Edward L. Reynolds was nominated for Judge of Probate and State Representatives Elizabeth Crowney and Adelbert C. Mautto re-nominated by the casting of a single ballot at an official Republican Party primary yesterday evening in Town Hall.

All candidates were unopposed.

Reynolds, who was one of two candidates for the probate judge ship, was endorsed by the Repub lican town committee at a caucus Friday evening.

The Republican candidates will face Harold LaPointe, and William T. Hackett, Democrats who have been nominated for the lower house of the General Assembly and Charles Copeland, former de puty judge who is running for judge of probate.
