High Ridge Endorses \$40 Per Pupil Aid Bill

PTA's Asked To Join Call For More Educational Aid

Parent-teacher associations and other groups associated with the public school system are being asked by the Board of Education to throw their support behind measures to provide \$40 more per pupil a state aid.

Board Chairman Francis Walsh predicted another jump next Fall in the educational budget comparable to that taken in the present budget, if state aid is not increased substantially. Considering the revised school budget of \$751,383.82, it represents an increase of \$32,905 over the previous year.

Another jump like that would mean an increase of about three cents per pupil next year, it was estimated. As an example, Supt. E. Vernon Hays pointed out that registration by Friday night indicated that there would be a minimum of 3,802 children in town schools next Fall. This number is increasing day by day, he said, and is expected to reach 3,900 "easily."

The present enrollment is now about 3,520, Mr. Hays said, and the additional children would mean between 10 and 13 additional teachers needed next Fall.

While East Haven's school population figures continue to mount, and mount, George Miller, assessor, estimated that more than 90 percent of East Haven's taxable grand list is made up of residential-type property.

Examination of the grand list reveals that a total gross list of \$35,749,485, the commercial segment consisted of 191 commercial buildings worth \$1,636,325, seven small factories assessed at \$138,200, and land not used at \$515,885. Or a total of \$2,904,090.

In comparison, 5,293 homes totaled \$21,326,585, residential land amounted to \$5,938,835 more and motor vehicles added another \$2,904,090, for a total of \$29,969,500.

For that reason, Mr. Walsh and Mr. Hays smiled wryly at the legislative hearing when they heard Mrs. Budd, representative from Westfield, speak of her community as a "bedroom town" and point out that 60 percent of the grand list was made up of private dwellings. "They ain't seen nuthin'" was the response to Mrs. Budd's plea.

Hearing On Bill To Change Finance Bd. Set-Up Due Mar. 15

Public hearings on a bill to amend the Board of Finance Act of East Haven is scheduled at the legislature on Tuesday, March 15.

The bill will be read by the Committee on Cities and Towns in Room 411 in the capitol at 1:30 in the afternoon, according to Rep. Adelbert C. Mautte.

An extension of the hearing date until some later time may be sought, however, according to Matthew Anastasio, Republican town chairman, who said he favored postponement in order to provide the public with ample notice of the hearing.

In another matter, Mrs. John Sullivan said she would like to have it noted when she voted against retaining the kindergarten as a matter of choice in a recent board decision she did so only because she was "more interested in the first graders" and "vehemently against having children in the first grades going to school until four in the afternoon." She was not opposed to kindergartens, she said, and regretted that a choice had to be made.

Only 10 Building Permits Issued In Month Of February

Ten building permits, including one for a complete dwelling valued at \$8,000, were issued during the month of February by the Town Building Department. Total fees from building permits amounted to a mere \$59—one of the lowest in the past several years.

In February of 1954, for example, the department issued 34 permits, including 12 for dwellings valued at \$107,500. However, permits vary in number considerably from month to month.

Building department fees last month totaled \$676.50 in all.

Mautte Criticized For Switch Over

The High Ridge Civic Association has gone on record as favoring a \$40 increase in per-pupil grants as an aid to our educational system. Members were also critical of State representative Adelbert Mautte for his reversal in coming out for House Bill 118 which calls for a smaller increase of only \$21.

Frank Clifford, past president of the Association, pointed out that East Haven is in extreme need of assistance in expanding school facilities to meet our enrollment.

Since industrial facilities are lacking and the burden of paying for educational budget appropriations comes out of the taxpayers' pockets, members agreed that it was the duty of East Haven legislators to seek to provide the largest sum in State aid possible.

The question arose as to whether the recommendation would infringe on the Association's "non-political" policy. Following discussion on this issue, it was agreed that advocating the \$40 increase could not be construed as a "political" action, since it meant advising the legislators of a "stand adopted by an active organization representing interested taxpayers and parents whose main concern was in seeing that East Haven children receive a good education. The group—approved of State representative Elizabeth M. Crouney's position in favoring the \$40 increase, but felt that Rep. Mautte had let the voters down by his about-face after having previously gone on record as favoring the larger amount.

Gas And Oil Supplies Bought At Discount, First Selectman Says

Purchase Of Two Trucks Is Defended

Retail prices are not paid for gas and oil for motor vehicles equipment in the Public Works Department as stated in a NEWS story last Thursday. First Selectman Frank Clancy declared this week.

Mr. Clancy revealed that gasoline for Public Works equipment is supplied from the Town-owned pump near the Town garage and is bought at a discount. He also said that oil for trucks and other equipment was also being bought at an appreciable discount.

The first selectman said the NEWS reporter had not checked with him before printing the story which appeared in last week's issue. He presented vouchers showing that the Town had bought 881 gallons of gasoline at 22.9 cents per gallon from the American Oil Company. This gasoline was high test and compared with a retail price of 28.9 cents per gallon, he said.

Defends Truck Purchases. Mr. Clancy also defended the purchase of two trucks from the East Haven Green Garage. A large 1954 International truck for which the Town paid \$3,493.75 together with a trade-in represented the lowest of three bids obtained from nearby dealers, the first selectman said.

Mr. Clancy said the local garage's bid was about \$600 less than the next lowest bid, with trade allowances on the old truck about the same. He identified the other bidders as the Wilson Auto Sales Company, of Branford, and Schneider Motors of Madison.

As far as a reported claim by Selectman Frank Barker that he knew nothing about the truck purchase last summer until fairly recently, Mr. Clancy said that "he must have signed the voucher" in payment for the truck.

Mr. Clancy said, also, that a pick-up truck bought from the East Haven Green Garage at a price of \$1,347 was sold at near dealer's cost to the Town. The truck was bought only in Mr. Clancy's term, and he defended its purchase, then, as an economy measure since it reduced wear on heavier equipment.

Praises Clancy On Pump. Mr. Clancy's establishment of a Town gas pump won the praise of Bertel Klockars at a session of the Board of Public Safety Tuesday night.

Sewerage Committee To Discuss Finance Aspect Of Sewers

Three members of the Sanitation Committee will meet tonight for the purpose of discussing the financial aspects of plans for sewerage.

They will be D. Charles Beausoliel, acting chairman, and Ray Lurie and Frank Clifford. They will discuss the details of financing sewers, as part of a general hearing into the feasibility of installing a system of sewerage in the new future.

Next Thursday the full committee will meet for purposes of selecting permanent officers as well as to continue discussions on data for sewers.

Mr. Beausoliel expressed the hope that public hearings can be held within the next five weeks on plans for sewers. He estimated that the annual operating cost would amount to between \$6 and \$8 per family.

After financial data is gathered for presentation at a public hearing and if public reaction is favorable, the next step would be to secure the approval of the Board of Finance before going to a town meeting to establish a sewer commission, which would be empowered to borrow funds for the construction of a system of sewerage.

The total cost for sewer mains and pumping stations for the town center and for Momauguin has been estimated at \$3,226,000.

AMVETS To Hold Paper Drive Sunday

The monthly paper drive of AMVETS Post 14 is scheduled for this Sunday. All sections of town will be covered with the exception of the Foxon area.

Paper Drive Chairman Lucretia Neel wishes again to extend to the townspeople the appreciation of the post membership for the fine cooperation in these monthly pickups.

He requests that bundles be left at the curb no later than 10 a.m. as the trucks are limited to one run in the area.

Officials, Citizens Invited To Confab On Shore Erosion

Representatives of the South End Association and individuals interested in the problem of shore erosion are being invited by First Selectman Frank S. Clancy to attend a conference dealing with that problem on Saturday, April 2.

Mr. Clancy and D. Charles Beausoliel, director of the Redevelopment Agency, will attend the conference which will be held in the Clinton Town Hall at 1 p.m.

The call for the conference of shore communities came from Gov. Abraham Ribicoff, who has invited all interested officials and other citizens to attend. In a letter to Mr. Clancy, Gov. Ribicoff wrote "Your State and Federal officials are anxious to co-operate with you in securing prompt action concerning the serious beach and shore erosion problems which affect your town, as well as the entire Connecticut shoreline."

First Selectman Clancy said he would like anyone from East Haven who is interested to attend the conference.

The South End Association, made up of residents of the Morgan Point area, has petitioned Congressman Albert Cretella for assistance in securing relief against the destruction of beaches by natural forces.

Parking Authority Head Asked Explain Request For Lot

John Kmetz, chairman of the Parking Authority, will attend a meeting of the Board of Selectmen tonight to explain the authority's request for jurisdiction over the Town parking lot on Main Street.

First Selectman Frank Clancy said that the selectmen did not act on the request at their last meeting because they are unacquainted with the reason for the authority's action.

It is believed that the Authority will seek to place meters in the lot, although this has not been stated openly. But, under one possible plan, the revenue from the meters would be placed in a special fund for use by the Authority to develop off-street parking facilities.

Finance Bd. Change Would Limit Over-Appropriations

Over-expenditures like the \$54,000-plus which was spent in excess of original appropriations by the Public Works department last (fiscal) year would require town meeting approval under the provisions of House Bill 1265 amending the East Haven Board of Finance Act.

The provisions are something additional to those amendments which were agreed upon at a joint meeting of committees of the Republican and Democratic parties here a month ago. Tacked on as an amendment to Section 5 of the special Board of Finance Act under which the Town is governed, the provisions were lifted word for word from Section 272C of the 1955 supplement to the General Statutes. References to East Haven were dubbed in.

The section states that: "no town official shall over-expend a department budget by more than \$100 without approval of the Board of Finance, and will be liable for such over-spending. In the Board of Finance must approve over-expenditures "but if the amount required shall exceed five hundred dollars, it must be voted by town meeting, or expenditure or transfer shall be made from the contingent fund until such expenditure or transfer has been approved by the Board of Finance."

Oddly enough, a bill has been introduced (H.B. No. 6) which would amend Section 272C of the General Statutes to raise the amount requiring town meeting approval from five hundred to one thousand dollars.

The measure was introduced with the intent of increasing the margin of such over-expenditures in view of the rising costs of government. This general legislative amendment would not affect the local limitation, if it is adopted.

Limit On Contingent Fund. Under House Bill 1265, which was introduced by Representatives Adelbert C. Mautte and Elizabeth Crouney, the proposed provisions would also set a two per cent limit on the contingent fund—two per cent of the total estimated expenditures.

More controversial aspects of the bill include making the Board of Finance "collective." Members, nominated by the two parties, will be elected to the board for four-year terms, after

School Bd. Troubled By Legislators Stand On Aid

Majority members of the Board of Education were simultaneously baffled and vexed over the failure of East Haven's two state representatives to back Senate Bill 997. The bill would provide \$40 more per-pupil aid to the Town of East Haven.

The matter was taken up by the Board of Education at its regular semi-monthly meeting Friday night. The six members present, voted to support the \$40 increase as embodied in 997 which was introduced by Senator Paul Amenta, of New Britain.

Last week Rep. Adelbert C. Mautte went on record favoring another set of bills—112 11B and SB 103—which would provide an additional \$21 per pupil. Several days previously he had stated in a published report that he favored an additional \$40 per pupil. But he also favored a retroactive additional payment of \$10 per pupil for the 2 years of the 1953-55 biennium.

Rep. Elizabeth Crouney had not indicated which of the several different bills for more state aid she would support—or oppose.

Annoyed. The majority members were annoyed when neither representative rose to argue East Haven's case before the Education Committee at a hearing on Wednesday last week. Particularly, after the board had arranged a meeting with the two state representatives to urge a forthright plan for more state assistance.

"I don't know why Mr. Mautte changed his mind," said Francis Walsh, chairman of the Board of Education, "I would like to have the board write a letter to Mr. Mautte and Mrs. Crouney to support Senate Bill 997."

Mrs. Sullivan "Stunned"

Mrs. John Sullivan, a majority member of the school board, was more outspoken: in her comments on the legislative hearing, "I was stunned," she said, "when neither one got up to speak on it (the need for more Educational aid)." "The least they could have done was to back the \$40 per pupil," she said of the two East Haven legislators.

Mrs. Sullivan said that she had prepared a statement which she was going to read at the hearing, but said that it "seemed useless" after the two local state representatives failed to speak on East Haven's need for more aid.

Mr. Walsh and Mrs. Sullivan indicated that they were "amazed" that Mr. Mautte indicated his preference before the hearing on the educational bills got underway. Now, they noted, he was going to study the bills before he commented on why he had changed his mind. They noted also that the local legislator did not sit in on the hearing to hear the pros and cons on the various bills.

Mr. Walsh said that when he and Mrs. Sullivan and Supt. R. Vernon Hays attended the legislative hearing they were under the impression that Mr. Mautte would argue for the \$40 per pupil increase. Then, Mr. Mautte informed them he would back bill 118.

The board chairman said that he was not in the position to speak for the board last Wednesday because no formal board action had been taken. For that reason, he said, he was asking for the board to express its opinion on the several pupil grant-in-aid bills so that the two state legislators could be informed of the school board's recommendation.

Statistics Reveal State's Birth Rate Hits High; Marriages, Deaths Decline

The number of births recorded in the state in 1954 increased sharply from the previous record reached in 1953; the provisional total, 93,316, exceeded the previous year's total by 2,130. The birth rate, 22.2 per 1,000 population, was the highest since 1923, with the single exception of 1947, the highest since 1923 marks the fourth consecutive increase in the birth rate. The record for the ninth consecutive year with a rate of 7.2, less than one-half the rate for 1954 and 1953. There were no deaths recorded from typhoid fever and diphtheria during the year and 2 deaths each from streptococcal sore throat, meningitis, scarlet fever and whooping cough. The deaths from whooping cough were the first to occur in the state since 1954 when 3 were recorded.

Chronic Diseases
The 1954 death rate from diseases, 15.7 from 15.9 in 1953, was the lowest ever recorded for the state. Reductions in death rates from 1953 levels were also noted for the diseases of the heart, 28.2 compared with 30.7; vascular lesions affecting the central system, 26.4 from 30.2; and diseases of the arteries, 21.3 compared with 24.3. Mortality from heart disease was the lowest recorded since 1950 and from vascular lesions since 1950, while that for diseases of the arteries has not been lower since 1939.

Infant Mortality
Infant mortality for 1954, 22.1 deaths under 1 year of age per 1,000 live births marked the third consecutive increase since the all-time low of 20.6 which was recorded in 1951 and the highest reached since 1949 when 23.1 of 2,500 infants born alive died during the first year of life. The reduction in infant mortality which has been accomplished in the past 10 years has been remarkable and any indication that mortality among infants is increasing is noticed with concern. Present infant mortality remains within reasonable limits of variation from the average mortality rate of the past five years, 21.4.

Communicable Diseases
Pneumonia, all forms, the leading cause of death among the communicable diseases since 1951.

More than 4,500 visits were made by Branford's Visiting Nurse Association during the year 1954 according to a report presented to the annual meeting of the organization's board of directors, held at the home of Mrs. Garvin on Monday, Feb. 28. The largest number of these, 2,131—were made to non-communicable disease patients. Other visits included acute communicable diseases, venereal disease, tuberculosis, maternity, infant health care, cancer, and crippled children's service.
