Never Discontinued Use Of E. Wesley Stepp, Town Pump, Barker Says

Statements that the Town Administration of Frank Barker had dispensed with the use of a Townoperated gasoline pump during the previous term were challenged as Plans Busy Month Selectman Barker,

"The gas pumps behind the Fire Of Activities House never were closed during my administration," Mr. Barker declared, "All highway trucks and other heavy equipment used gas from these pumps during my en-tire term in office. In fact, 1 set up the exact system which has been continued by the present Democratic Administration which was praised by (Bertel) Klockars, with one exception. While I was in office I insisted upon a fair rotation of all business for police cars between all Main Street gas-oline dealers. I have heard that there has been some departure from this equal sharing plan."

Demands Retraction Mr. Barker demanded that Mr. Klockars, who is a Republican member of the Board of Public Safety, retruct his criticism of his (Mr. Backer's) administration.

A copy of the policy certificate which was sent to Dr. Donadio by the company after he had written a letter of complaint bears this conspicuous notation stamped neross its face: "This is Limited Insurance - Read Carefully".

Dr. Donadio's complaint is that of a number of parents he had questioned, none claimed having seen a copy of the policy. His "beef" was touched off by a recent case in which a High School student's dental expenses exceeded \$100 while the insurance plan places a \$50 limit on dental ex-

The dentist claims that in a prior case, the insurance plan did not cover the dental fees, at all, bedental treatment "except as injury to natural teeth" and the case in point was a filled tooth and therefore described as "not natural" thy the insurance company.

"If there are limitations to these policies, then let the parents know what they are", Dr. Donadio said.

There is no enuse for excitement because purchase of private properties for a junior high site off No. High St., has been delayed, Ray Lurie, a member of the Elecnentary School Building Commit-

ee, said last night. Mr. Lurie said that had weather coupled with other difficulties had dowed survey work on the properties to determine their exact bounds and area. He said that the survey should be completed by the end of this week. Then the com-mittee will be able to get ready to inform the Board of Pinance the exact amount of money that will be needed for the purchase.

"We've been working on it," he said. "We do think that the work has been slow, but the weather has been up to his hips in mud completing his work."

Letis Was Advised

Mr. Lurie said that George Letis, chairman of the school build-ing committee had been advised of the progress of the work by himself and James Cunningham, another member of the committee.

He said that Robert Decker, who has been hired by the committee to do the survey work, had put in many hours setting the hounds of the properties. Because the property was being acquired for school use and because state grants were involved, he said, the work had to
