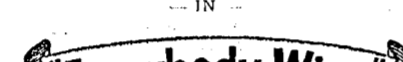

## Clancy Says Group Never Approached Him On Erosion

Replying to criticism that Town officials have not taken enough interest in the shore erosion problem here, First Selectman Frank Clancy said this week that he had never been invited by local groups to attend meetings on the problem. Mr. Clancy also said that he was prepared to speak at a conference in Clinton Saturday but before he could do so an able presentation of East Haven's predicament was handled by Stephen Papa, of the South End Civic Association. Mr. Papa criticized Town officials for not taking "enough interest" in the problem.

"Pretty Good Job"  
"I thought Mr. Papa did a pretty good job of presenting the case for East Haven," the first selectman said, "and there wasn't much that I could add."

Mr. Clancy said that while he had never been invited by the South End Association or any other group interested in erosion to attend conferences, he had, himself, instructed D. Charles Beausoleil, director of the Redevelopment Agency, to invite officials of the South End Civic group to attend Saturday's conference.

The first selectman recalled that the South End Association had invited Cong. Albert Cretella and the two state representatives to inspect the shoreline several months ago. But he, himself, was not invited, he said.

Saturday's conference in Clinton was attended by representatives in many shore line towns. State and federal officers were headed by Governor Abraham Ribicoff and U. S. Senators Prescott Bush and William Purtell.

Besides Mr. Clancy and Mr. Beausoleil, the local delegation included State Rep. Adolph C. Minette and Rep. Elizabeth Cronway. Mr. Minette spoke briefly on East Haven's needs and introduced Mr. Papa.

First Selectman Clancy saw little hope for assistance from the federal government. He noted that they had "listened" rather than giving any indication of aid. At the same time, he said, if East Haven is to secure any help it must join with others in a continual pressure for some form of assistance.

"There's no doubt in my mind that we have a serious erosion problem here," he said, "and all we can do is to keep after them (state and federal officials)."

**Replies To Road Criticism**

In answer to another criticism relating to the alleged failure of the Town to fix roads in the South End area, the first selectman said that he had never received a letter of complaint that Sol Paderi, president of the South End Association, claimed he sent three months ago to the first selectman. Mr. Clancy said that South End Rd. and South St., except for a portion fronting on the Criscuolo development, and Morgan Ave. were all armor-coated last summer. The portion near the development was not coated because, Mr. Clancy said, he expected that excavations for connecting water lines and heavy motor vehicles used in construction work would have damaged such surfacing.

## Old Stone Church To Take Part In Sunrise Service

The young people of the Old Stone Church will attend the Sunrise Service at East Rock on Easter Sunday morning at 6 o'clock. They will then return to the church for the annual Easter breakfast.

Easter church services will be held at 8:30, 9:45 and 11 a. m. with the Rev. James D. Glassco, interim pastor, reading a special Easter message. Glorious Easter music will be presented by soloists and the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Choirs.

There will be no regular sessions of the church school on Sunday, but provision will be made to care for small children in the Nursery and a film will be shown for the older children not attending church services.

On Saturday morning at 10 o'clock the young people of the church will follow an annual custom when they meet to work in the church sanctuary, cleaning and polishing for Easter. They will bring box lunches for noon-time and will enjoy volley ball in the gym during the afternoon.

Sunday evening at 7 o'clock all the young people's groups will meet together and the film, "Barabas the Robber" will be shown. This is reported to be an "excellent film" and shows how Barabas might have witnessed the death of Christ.

On Tuesday the Men's Club will hold its annual meeting and election of officers starting with supper at 6:30 p. m. Supper will be served by the Friendly Circle. An excellent speaker has been secured who will talk on stocks and the stock market.

On Wednesday the Adult Bible Class will meet in the church parlor at 11 a. m. At 7 p. m. the Evening Bible Class will meet in the Educational Building.

The annual Maundy Thursday service is being held tonight at 8 o'clock in the church sanctuary with the observance of Holy Communion and the reception of new members.

## Acceptance Letter Given Yedlin But Bond Still Good

First Selectman Frank Clancy today confirmed reports that the Town had granted to the Yedlin Construction Company a "letter of acceptance" on roads in High Ridge. However, he noted that an \$18,000 performance bond on the sub-contractor in charge of the road construction and held by the Yedlin Company was still in effect as a guarantee of proper construction.

The letter, which did not constitute final approval by the Town, has the effect of releasing from escrow money held in abeyance by the Federal Housing Authority as a guarantee that road construction will be carried out in a satisfactory manner.

**"Usual Procedure"**  
Mr. Clancy said that the letter releasing this "bond" was granted to the Yedlin Company in accordance with the usual procedure of the present and past administrations. However, Mr. Clancy said he admitted that such action appeared to be a mistake in the case of the High Ridge development.

At the same time, Mr. Clancy said he was confident that the Yedlin Construction Company would have the road conditions corrected before they were finally accepted by the Town.

Last night members of the High Ridge Civic Association voted to send on to Federal Housing Administration officials in Washington a petition of 318 names protesting the "deplorable" condition of roads in the development. The action was taken despite assurances from the Yedlin Construction Company that the condition would be corrected. A letter from Evans & Merkle, New Haven attorneys, stated that Donald Tucker, of the Newton & Tucker Excavating Company, sub-contractors who built the roads, "agreed that he would take immediate steps to put the roads in good condition and that in any event and no later than July 1, 1955, the road would have been properly constructed and accepted by the Town, and that thereafter would either be a cause of concern either to the owners of homes in the High Ridge section or to the Yedlin Construction Company."

A copy of the letter, sent to the first selectman, was released by him.

**Mr. Miller**  
The letter also stated that the Yedlin Company, at its own expense, has engaged Charles Miller, former town engineer, to serve as supervisor "to check on the roads to be completed by the Newton & Tucker Construction Company, and for the sole purpose of seeing to it that the roads shall be completed in accordance with required specifications."

It stated that on January 29, 1953 the Yedlin Company as builder of High Ridge, contracted with the Thomas F. McDermott Company, of Great Neck, L. I., to "supply 8" (inches) of run of bank gravel, will oil, sand roll same for a 30 Ft. wide roadway, for a distance of approximately 9,000 linear feet."

On April 27, 1954, the McDermott Company sub-contracted for the work with the Newton & Tucker Excavating Company of New Haven and the Continental Casualty Company of Chicago furnished a bond in the amount of \$18,000 for the sub-contractor.

## Chapkovich And Flanagan Win Endorsements

James F. Gartland, Democratic town chairman, was endorsed as a candidate for judge of the town court here and Richard Reilly, town counsel, was endorsed for deputy judge at a meeting of the Democratic town committee Tuesday evening.

Endorsements for four other officers included with the court were withheld until a later time. These are the posts of prosecutor, assistant prosecutor, clerk of the court and probation officer.

In addition, to the endorsements to the local court, the town committee voted its blessing to Edmund S. Flanagan, of 32 Morgan Ave., as a candidate for commissioner of the state police. Mr. Flanagan is a former state trooper and is now a special investigator with the office of State's Attorney Abraham Ullmann.

**Endorsed For Nursing Board**

Miss Elizabeth Chapkovich was endorsed for a post on the Connecticut Examining Board for Nurses. Operator of the East Haven Nursing Home, Miss Chapkovich is a registered nurse. She is a member of the local Board of Education.

Charles Copeland, former member of the Board of Education and former deputy judge of the town court, is seen as a likely prospect for the committee's endorsement for prosecuting attorney. The endorsements are being forwarded to Governor Abraham Ribicoff who is expected to send his recommendations for appointment to court posts to the legislature about the first of May.

The appointments become effective July 1.

Mr. Gartland, who served as town prosecutor under the late Judge Arden Kirkorian in the 1949-51 term, said he was "very happy" about winning the committee's endorsement.

## Explore Problems In Readiness To Transfer Schools

School officials will meet at an early date with the Board of Finance for the purpose of exploring several problems connected with the acceptance of the new schools. They did not relate to completion of the schools which has been satisfactory, it was said.

Francis Walsh, chairman of the Board of Education, said that he would request such a meeting within a few days. Attending would be R. Vernon Jans, superintendent of schools, and George Letts, chairman of the Elementary School Building Committee.

The trio would discuss with the Board of Finance several general problems relating to the transfer of the new Deer Run and Overbrook schools and the four-room addition to the Monauguin School from the Elementary School Building Committee to the Board of Education.

This transfer, together with the filing of completion papers with the state Board of Education would be necessary for East Haven to receive the first payment in a state aid grant.

Deadline for such transfer would be about June 1, Mr. Walsh said.

Members of the school board and of the building committee met last Thursday evening to discuss the acceptance. They also heard from Warren Hill, a consultant from the state Board of Education, regarding state grants-in-aid for school buildings.

## No Fatalities Here

East Haven and Branford were among 22 fatality-free towns in congested areas who were listed as free of traffic fatalities during the first quarter of 1955.

The Connecticut Safety Commission reported that there were three cities, 22 towns and 15 more communities in the 5,000-10,000 population group who had gone without traffic deaths so far this year.

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**Hearing On Finance Board**  
 The Hartford hearing last week on a bill to amend the Finance Act illustrated quite clearly the disadvantages of legislating for local governmental administration.  
 First of all, the remoteness of the hearing discourages or even prevents all but the immediately interested from participating. Individuals like Robert Hill, president of the Citizens for Good Government, were unable to attend because they could not take time off from their work.  
 Secondly, the committee which held the hearing on the bill revealed, through the questions and remarks of the chairman, that it is not acquainted in the slightest degree with the local situation.  
 Undoubtedly, it will become better acquainted when it begins to study the bill. As to its members may bring to bear upon the bill their own experience derived from their own dealings with municipal government in other places in the state.  
 However, these latter advantages are likely to be offset by the last minute rush which is typical not only of the Connecticut legislative sessions but of most state legislatures.  
 The danger is that the bill will be sent on through without close study.  
 It is unfortunate that opponents of the bill who were present did not have the opportunity in which the hearing was ended, the opportunity was theirs to present their views.  
 This silence was unfortunate because of the value which the committee chairman seemed to place on bipartisan agreement: If both parties are agreed, the chairman seemed to think, then the bill must be okay.  
 To return to an earlier point, then, such a legislative hearing puts the politician at an advantage and the layman at a disadvantage. Under such a system, whose interests are likely to be given priority, the public's or the politician's?  
 Town Chairman Matthew Anastasio was not far from the truth when he spoke of a clamor for revision of the Board of Finance Act. In fact, he is convinced that what he has proposed serves the general good.  
 Nevertheless, the consequences are plain. If the bill passes as it is now drawn, the Town administration will be divided between a weakened first selectman and a strengthened board of finance appointed, and very likely controlled, by the two town organizations.  
 In short, the power of both party organiza-

tions is increased and the power of the Town's mayor, for good or for evil, is decreased. Since the first selectman is a truly elective official (and the board of finance will not be, although it will pretend to be, elective) the power of the voter will be decreased.

**Survivors Insurance**  
 For municipal employees in such hazardous occupations as law enforcement and fire fighting, there is no adequate provision of benefits for survivors in the event of death before retirement age.  
 The need for such benefits to supplement the retirement program to which East Haven now subscribes, has been dramatized recently in the plight of a widow of an officer in the Police Department.  
 The private system of life insurance is open to persons, municipal employees and others. Still, it is customary in government, as well as in private enterprise, to provide a plan of insurance that is not only economical because it is subsidized to some extent, but is automatic.  
 East Haven now has two problems before it. One is to provide immediately for the needs of a person who has not had the advantage of municipal insurance plan. The other is to provide protection for the survivors of Town employees who face extraordinary risks in the line of duty. At least it should make such protection available.

**Open Public Records**  
 Twin bills to open public records to inspection have been introduced into the state legislature. The bills provide: "All public records kept by the State or any official thereof, or by any town, municipality or subdivision thereof, under any provisions or requirements of law, shall be open to public inspection."  
 The act would give any person wishing to learn the facts in records the right to inspect them. The bills had a hearing last week and members of the Connecticut Council of Freedom of Information, of which Free Press Publications is a member, as well as other representatives of newspapers, radio, etc. supported it.  
 As in the past, certain governmental agencies sent representatives to object to the opening of confidential files. Carter, White, and members of the Council on Freedom of Information, has recommended that the legislature define explicitly those records which are public property and those which are not.  
 With rare exceptions, news agencies have not delved into confidential files nor have they cared to. In order to get at the facts of government, the council on Freedom of Information has grown for a right to inspect public records.  
 Newspapers still remain the main safeguard of the public interest. Newspapers do not, at least, ought not, to pretend at having some sacred right to this information. Their prime function is to secure information for the public.  
 If they pursue this end of securing information on government and its actions, whether local, state or national, the public interest will be served.  
 Therefore, the state legislature should define those areas where reporters may tread to get the information they need. Newspapers are less interested in who is on the payroll and more interested in how effectively and properly local agencies are carrying out their functions.  
 A request for a legislative "delimiting" of which records should be open to public inspection and which are not is a fair one and ought to be acted upon favorably.

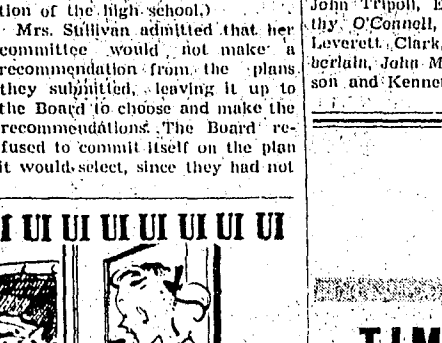
**P-T Council, School Bd. Differ In Approach To Classroom Need**

The tenuous spot in a sore situation at the last meeting of the Board of Education appeared to be a charge by representatives of the P-T Council that the Board had "done nothing" towards starting construction of a junior high school for the past two years.  
 In answer, Mrs. John Sullivan, chairman of the board of education committee, protested that her group had been meeting regularly since it was organized last November, compiling data on future anticipated enrollments and pupil seating.  
 The committee maintained that for accuracy's sake it was necessary to wait until the annual census had been taken by Mrs. Eileen Egan. This was rushed to completion and was expanded to include every living child from newborn babies up to children of school age. A census of pre-school-age children is not required by the state.  
 Burton Reed served as main spokesman for the Council. He presented and read a carefully prepared statement listing arguments in favor of prompt action on a junior high school. Mr. Reed said his committee regretted not having more time to collect facts for the report.  
 Prologued  
 Discussion on the junior high has dragged out over at least the past three years. A former Board of Education, of which Mr. Reed was a member, recommended the junior high plan after an exhaustive study.  
 Opposing the plan, and the minority board membership at that time was among them, favored the so-called "6-3-3" system of eight elementary grades and four high school grades.  
 The first town meeting on this held in the summer of 1952, ended in a deadlock. Opponents succeeded in obstructing passage of the first item on the call dealing with the construction of a junior

high school.  
 A second town meeting that was held until May 15, 1952 that the 6-3-3 plan was voted through, at least to the extent of authorizing negotiations for a junior high site and setting up a school building committee to build two 12-room schools and an additional addition to Mummaugh School. These latter schools were planned within a 6-3-3 system.  
 Second step Unfulfilled  
 The building committee has been "titled" the "Elementary School Building Committee" and no building committee has been elected so far for a junior high. Aid no funds have been voted for its construction. However, the town last week finally bought properties for a junior high site in accordance with an authorization voted at a town meeting last November first.  
 In fact, it is this absence of action — setting in motion the second phase of the building program which has motivated Mr. Reed and others in pressing for a commitment by the Board of Education.  
 The Board of Education, on the other hand, is taking the stand that the public, in general, will make the decision regarding any building of additional school facilities. Thus there is a division of opinion where Mr. Reed's group feels the board has a responsibility to make the decision. The decision should be in the hands of the public for completion of the building program.  
 Differences Emerge  
 Other differences of opinion emerged in the discussion at the meeting. For example the representative of the Council argued that the "6-3-3" system is a "new number in the low twenties" while Supt. of Schools R. Vernon Hays insists that the average is 28.3 pupils per class.

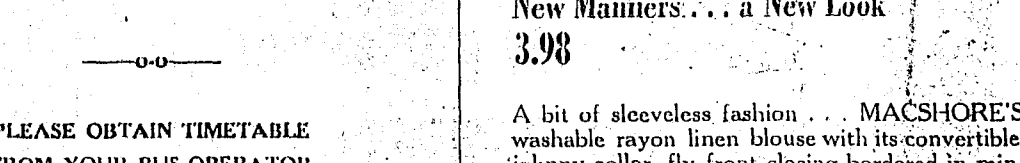

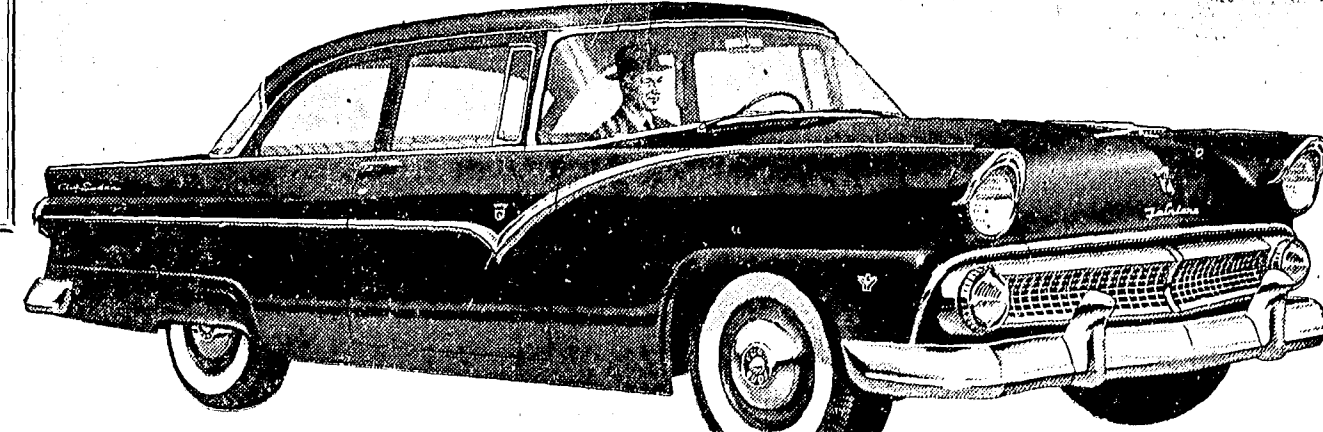

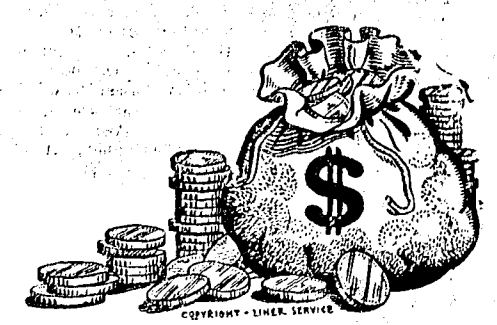
