Arrangements for removal of school children to safety lie in the hands of school authorities, Mr. Knight pointed out, since there would be no time for parents to scurry around hunting their children. In an effort to prepare the children for emergencies, Miss Katherine Mc-Kee, school principal, added that bi-monthly air raid drills are conducted at the school.

Once the movement starts, Ma Knight, emphasized, there will be a continuous double lane of trafleaving the area with no delations permitted.

Spare Food Supply Advised Unger certain weather condilons, should an H-bomb hit New York City, within two hours "we would be getting a fall-out from it strong enough to kill people if in the open," the Civil Direcor warned. Harold Hall Urges Policy Of Caution On Schools Decision

The appointment of a com-nittee to select an architect with whom the committee would pre-pare preliminary specifications for a junior high school was recommended Monday evening by School Supt. R. Vernon Hays.

Costs of preparing such preliminary plans would be around five or six thousand dollars, Mr. Hays said. Next, he advocated, that the specifications be submitted to a small number of "first class confuture of East Ilnven's school tractors" to secure estimates of
