# Tells How Battle Started Over Probate Court Bills

Under fire for allegedly "try Ing" Probate Judge Edward L. Not Fully Equipped Reynolds in the newspapers, First Selectman Frank Clancy t all three local reporters back him up Tuesday night in his protestations that neither issued the first report that help-ed set off the hottest controversy of the week.

Board of Finance to discuss the approximately \$1,000 in over-ex-penditures by the Probate Court. What is at issue is not the pro-priety of the expenditures (they were for court equipment) but whether the judge of probate should have secured prior approval of the board. Judge Reynolds claims he does not need such approval and that his expenditures were necessary.

As far as the newspapers are concerned the controversy was first revealed in a report car-ried in last Thursday's edition of this weekly newspaper and headed "Probate Court Expenditure Draws Finance Bd. Fire."

The story was based on obser-vations and information secured through questions by this reporter. Subsequent reports in-dicated that the headline was not exaggerated.

Daily Picks Up Story

On Saturday morning a morning daily "picked up" the story and capped it with the heading Finance Board To Probe Probate Court Spending." Then, the

action started. In a statement released to that paper on Monday, Judge Rey-nolds revealed that he had sent to Mr. Clancy a telegram "de-manding that the Board of Finance meeting I must appear be-fore he made open to the pub-lic so all may have the true

Judge Reynolds, who sald he had received telephone calls from "the local, newspapers and one radio station" for an answer said he would not provide one until the hearing. "I only regret", he said, "the Board of Finance did not adont the same But "since they have seen fit to try me in the news papers rather than within the confines of a hearing room" he was demanding a public hearing.

# Probate Court Still **Examiner Says**

If the Board of Finance pleased because the new Probate Court has exceeded its budget it may expect still more spending in the future.

That was indicated in a letter from Harold S. Burt, examiner of public records to Probate Judge Reynolds is scheduled to of public records to Probate meet Saturday morning with the Judge Edward L. Reynolds. The letter indicated that the probate court was still equipped with official legal forms and with proper protection or records.

"When calling on your Propate Court office in East Ha-ven May 10 I was glad to note some progress being made in assembling the necessary office equipment, record volumes, and forms. However, we note that you have only 34 of the approxmately 175 necessary forms.

"The law (copies enclosed) requires that the Probate Judge provide equipment and supplies to be billed to the town or towns covered by the district, and it is expected that the selectmen and the board of finance will co-operate in providing the necessary funds."

## Says Pay Raise Would Not Affect The Town Budget


During the course of his lec ture he cited healings through spiritual means alone of blood poisoning, stomach trouble, and other everyday problems.
