3 Areas Condemned As Below Health Level

Jerry Grady, chairman of the Zoning and Planning commission, stated recently that the body has found that three areas in this town are unhealthy due to inadequate sanitary facilities.

Grady said the commission had discussed the proposed sewerage plan for the town, and "from a planning point of view the board," favors such installation.

However, Grady said that such approval while based on conditions existing in the town, does not include the commission's approval, or disapproval, of methods necessary to raise appropriations for installation.

In this matter the chairman stated, "The board wishes to make no comment on financial methods, as this should be left to the Sanitation Committee . . . and for the public . . ."

In his report to the commission's approval, Grady stated that the State may find it necessary to step into the picture if the town doesn't take action regarding the installation of a sewer system.

Grady's report reads as follows: "At the Zoning and Planning hearing, the proposed plan for the Town of East Haven was discussed and reviewed. From a planning point of view the board has gone on record as favoring installation of sewerage for the following reasons:

"(1) Sewage conditions in certain sections of the Foxon Park, Momauguin and center areas are definitely below safe health levels.

"(2) If steps are not taken to alleviate sewage conditions the State or Conn. may well force the Town of East Haven to install sewerage or otherwise be fined at a daily rate until said sewerage is installed.

"(3) Installation of sewerage makes the town more acceptable for the domicile of industry. Introduction of light industries into East Haven is an absolute must if we are to hold the tax rate level at a line which all present residents can afford. "The board wishes to make no comment on financial methods as this should be left to the Sanitation Committee for presentation and for the public to choose in their discretion. (Signed) Jerry Grady, chairman."

Originated by the American Legion, this nation-wide program will, as in the past, endeavor to enlighten the young people as to the workings of the government and to promote better citizenship.

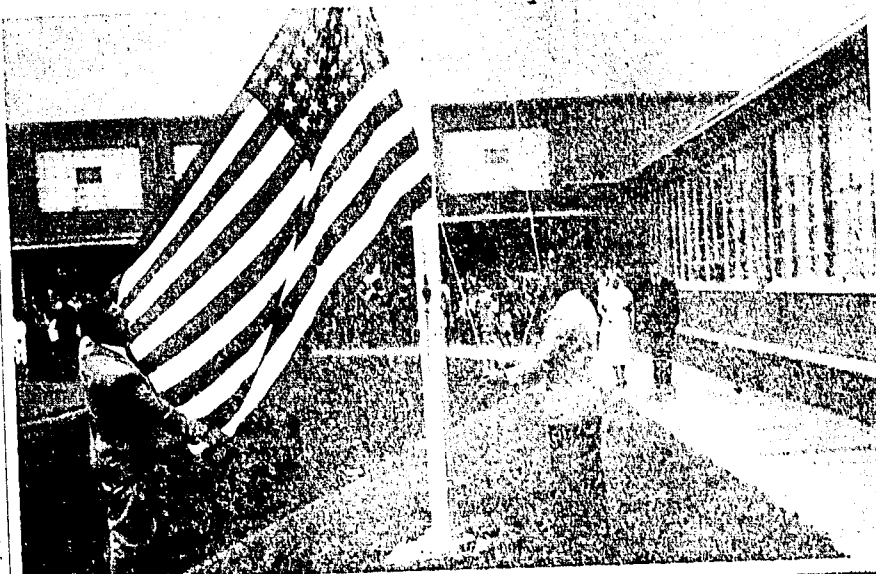

The Rev. Charles Callahan To Celebrate First Mass

Parishioners of St. Clare's church, Momauguin, will be able to witness a unique mass at 10:30 a. m. Sunday, when two brothers, both priests assist in the celebration of the first mass of a third brother, recently ordained as a Maryknoll missionary.

Last week, was a big week in the Callahan family. Crisafi Feted By Townspeople At Testimonial Last Night

High School Coach Frank Crisafi, his eyes wet with tears of gratitude and his voice choked with emotion, humbly acknowledged the tribute of his fellow townspeople last night.

Raising to his feet to face the capacity crowd that jammed the Weeping Willows restaurant, the guest of honor, attempted three times to express his gratitude. Unable, because of the emotional tide that swept over him, to give a coherent speech, Crisafi fumbled for words and phrases that would not come.

After several attempts, the honored guest summed it all up by saying, "I'm deeply grateful for this, and I want to thank you all for that you have done for me." An estimated 200 people attended the dinner, and heard speaker after speaker sing the praises of Crisafi's work, not as a winning coach, but as a man who did much to help the youth of East Haven find the right path to adulthood.

Among those who spoke, were Johnny Maher, former East Haven High School coach, now coach at Durbin High School; Supt. of Schools R. Vernon Hays; High School Principal Carl Garvin and First Selectman Frank Clancy. Toastmaster for the occasion was Harold Hall.

Maher, in his speech, recalled the era in which Frank Crisafi played under him at the local high school and Supt. Hays, paid him tribute for his success with the youth of the high school.

However, Mr. Garvin pulled the surprise of the evening. To the delight of the gathering, the principal read a questionnaire, filled out by Crisafi while a student at East Haven High, regarding his attitude, as a pupil, towards his studies as members of the faculty at that time.

In answering one of the questions regarding his future plans, the guest of honor gave no indication he intended to take up physical education. On the contrary, his future ambitions at that time were divided between forestry and art.

Scharf Denies He Gave Statements To The Press

In a letter to Chief of Police Edwin Priest last night, Don Bartlett, president of the Chamber of Commerce, denounced recent headlines referring to "delinquency problems" confronting Main Street merchants.

Referring to the news headline as "unfortunate," Bartlett said that it could be construed as to mean that the Chamber was critical of the police's handling of the Main Street situation.

The Chamber president said that this was not the intent of the investigation by the organization, when it decided to investigate the complaints of several merchants, about the "loitering and actions of youths on Main Street."

Bartlett pointed out to Chief Priest, that all the C of C was trying to do was to find out how many merchants may have similar complaints. If the matter warranted it, the Chamber, according to Bartlett would confer with Chief Priest on how best to handle the situation.

The letter to the police chief also claimed that the source of information for such stories was first apparently obtained from the organization's News Letter and then published during Norman Scharf, C of C secretary as the source of information.

Scharf, yesterday denied that he had given any information to the press regarding juvenile delinquency, and expressed his disapproval over the fact that he was quoted as the spokesman for the Chamber regarding this matter.

Scharf contended that he had not spoken to any reporter on the subject, but had he sent out any other release, other than the News Letter, containing information, or views on the problem.

Last night Scharf and the president conferred and agreed that a letter to Chief Priest, regarding the C of C's part in this affair, would be the best answer to the stories.

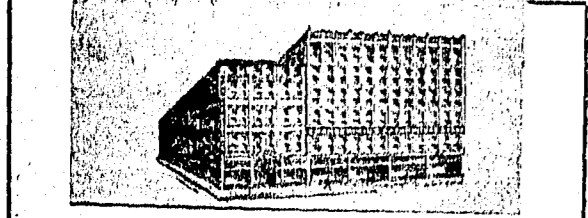

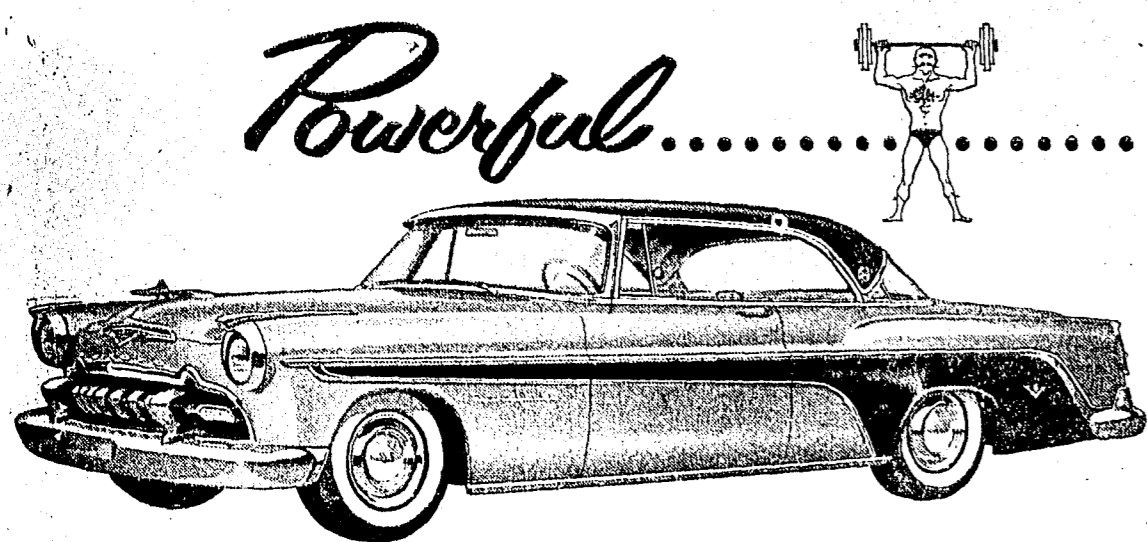

Mrs. Solakian Appointed RC Home Service Chairman

Mrs. Inke Solakian of Pine Orchard has accepted the appointment of Home Service Chairman for the Branford Branch, American Red Cross. Mrs. Solakian, who has been interested in many of Branford's community problems as the wife of the present president of the Bolla & Crown Chemical Co. The new chairman replaces Mrs. Joseph J. Collaps of Stony Creek who recently resigned following six years of service in the capacity of chairman.

Mrs. Solakian has explained that the Red Cross can often help individual families understand the regulations affecting servicemen and veterans and, in some instances, Red Cross can help families take advantage of these regulations to relieve a serious home situation. The new chairman points out that regulations which are often of interest to families include those relating to emergency leave, hardship discharges, deferment from overseas duty, transfers to be nearer home and allotments in pay. The chairman adds that while decisions are made by the Red Cross, it is the military officials who have a clear understanding of the problem as the family sees it.

Still another function of the home service chairman involves helping families who have not heard from their servicemen for long periods of time. In these cases, Red Cross is prepared to arrange a report concerning the health and welfare of the servicemen for the family. Further, the chairman can aid veterans and their families who are interested in learning of benefits available to them through the Veterans Administration such as compensation, pension and hospital care.

Cases have also arisen in which the Red Cross aids the needy families find their way to other community agencies which are better qualified to help with specific problems. Residents desiring aid through the Home Service are urged to call Hubbard 8-4511.
