

Town Votes July 26 On Amending The State Constitution

East Haven Town Clerk Margaret J. Tucker was notified by Connecticut Secretary of State Mildred P. Allen, that a town meeting of the electors "must" be held in East Haven on July 26 to vote on the proposed amendment to the State Constitution concerning the method of amending the document.

In her message to Miss Tucker, the Secretary of State stated:

"At the town meeting to be held in each town in the state on July 26, 1955, for the purpose of considering the proposed amendment to the constitution, concerning the method of amending the constitution, the provisions of article 101 of the regular session of 1955, the hours of voting shall be from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. No election of officers may be held in any such town on said day nor any other questions, referendum, proposition or matter of any nature be submitted to the electors in any such town on said day, and the voting machines shall be used in each such town meeting and only the designation of said proposed constitutional amendment as set forth in section 1 of said house bill and may not contain any other matter for voting by the electors nor may they contain names of candidates."

In voting only three steps are necessary: (1) Swing the handle of the curtain lever around to the right as far as it will go and leave it there. This will close the curtain around you and unlock the machine for voting.

(2) Then turn down the pointer over the "Yes" or "No" for the question — and leave it down. If this "Yes" or "No" pointer is pushed up after an elector has voted by pulling it down, the vote will not count.

(3) After voting the handle of the curtain lever to the left as far as it will go and leave it there. This will register your vote and open the curtain.

Education Board Makes New Office Of Assistant School Superintendant

Position To Be Filled When J. Corbett Retires; Hall Against Hiring Teachers To Fill New Opening; Chapkovich For It

Although uncertain as to when the incumbent business manager of the school system will "retire," the Board of Education has begun making plans to abolish the position and create a new office, entitled "Assistant Superintendant."

While making time until John Corbett leaves the school system, the board voted approval of a recommendation of one of its members that an assistant superintendent be hired for the school system.

Miss Elizabeth Chapkovich, chairman of the Committee on Schools, offered the recommendation, stating "It is our wish that a letter compiled by the Superintendent of Schools be sent out to all members of the school staff — the teaching school staff — notifying them that the position will be open."

She added that a discussion of salary could not be taken up at this time, but thought "It was more than likely that one of the members of our present staff will be hired for this position, if they are qualified and can be certified by the State."

Harold Hall asked if it "were in any way related to the vacancy that will probably be created in the business manager's office." He added that regardless of the title, the assistant would be taking on the duties of the business manager. Pointing out that the board was seeking to fill the position with a teacher, he went on: "I must heartily disagree. I think we should have a business manager."

Speaking of the teachers, he said, "I think their teaching, their degrees and whatever they may have accomplished by way of such studies fits them admirably for the job that they are doing, but I do not believe that they would fit as well in our business office, and I object on these grounds."

George Letts concurred, stating the position should be "thrown open in general." His motion to return it to committee was defeated. Stating that "the committee had made deep study of the matter," Harry Morgan moved to accept the committee's recommendation.

Chairman Francis Walsh insisted that there was no distinction between "assistant superin-

3 East Haveners Hurt In Bpt. Train Wreck

Local Residents Railroad Employees; All Treated At Bridgeport Hospitals And Released — None Seriously Hurt

Three East Haven residents escaped death or serious injury this morning, when a crack New Haven Railroad Express train was derailed in Bridgeport, killing the engineer.

The men, William Quirk 37, of Laurel Street, a conductor; George S. Kennedy 31, of 12 Maple Street, a fireman and Joseph Sano 60, of 28 Edgewood Road, baggage car master, were slightly injured in a wreck that claimed one life and injured more than 20 others.

The dead man, Arthur Orteno 62, of New Haven, was the engineer. The accident which occurred about 5:30 a.m. on Main Street, happened shortly after 5 a.m. today.

Kennedy and Sano were taken to St. Vincent's Hospital in Bridgeport, where they were released after Kennedy was treated for a "slight back injury" and Sano for "minor abrasions."

Quirk was treated at the Bridgeport Hospital for injuries to his right eye, believed to be just a bump. And abrasions to his right hand. He was admitted for observation, but released later in the day.

According to reports, the engine, towing 17 cars, was headed east at the time of the accident. It was travelling at a speed estimated about 30 miles per hour, when for some unexplained reason it left the track and plunged off the 20 foot high embankment that carries the tracks from the Bridgeport station west to the old circus grounds at State Street Extension.

There were about 200 passengers, including passengers and crew aboard the train at the time of the accident.

Orteno was pronounced dead in the cab of the engine, when it left the rails seven cars with it.

The train was identified as the crack Federal Express which runs from Washington to Boston.

Surprise Inspection By Health Officer Finds Conditions At Foxon Piggery "Presentable"

A surprise inspection by Dr. Robert M. Taylor, East Haven Health Officer, and Fire Marshal Ernest Hansen, of the Mellilo Piggery in Foxon, was held earlier this week.

According to the health officer's report conditions at the piggery ranged from excellent to "not bad."

Townsmen in the area of the piggery have been sending protests to First Selectman Frank Clancy, who received 25 registered letters complaining about the amount that permeates the area. The complaints blame the pigs and garbage at the Strong Street Piggery owned by Pasquale Mellilo, of 192 Mill Rock Road, Hamden.

Dr. Taylor also received a number of protests, but they were less than the ones received by the First Selectman.

Acting on the spur of the moment, Dr. Taylor, in the company of the fire marshal, pulled a "surprise spot inspection" July 6. Dr. Taylor in making his report to Mellilo warned the piggery operator that he would conduct further inspections every two weeks during the hot weather and monthly during the cold weather.

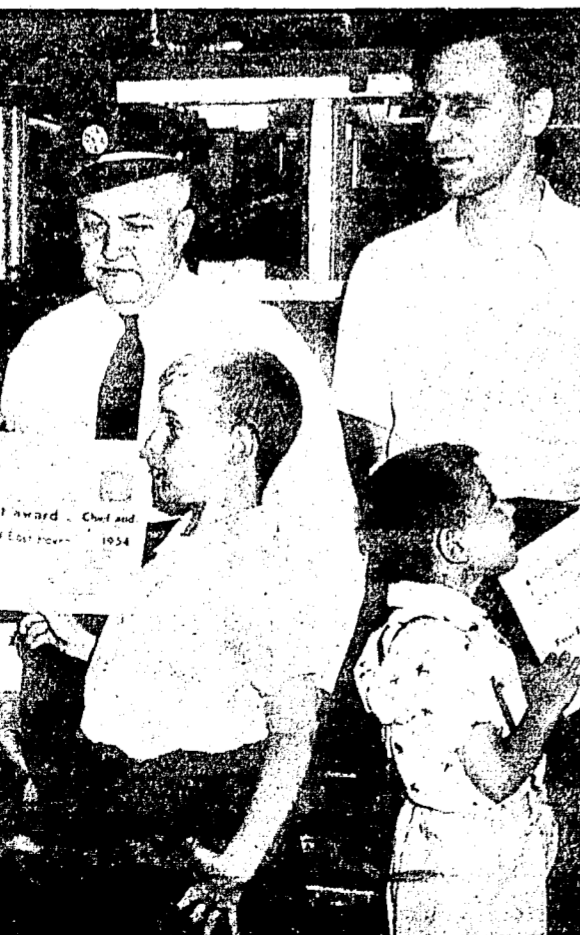
Dr. Taylor also said that he believed that many of the complaints were based on the fact that the senders were aware of the fact that the town had a new health officer.

In his report, a copy of which was sent to Mellilo, Dr. Taylor stated:

"Chief Hansen and myself made an inspection of your Strong Street piggery yesterday (July 6) during that very hot humid afternoon. I found five men working in excellent condition and the grounds between rows were plucked up and presentable."

"The hillside dump where you deposit the cleanings from the pens was not bad. I have one sug-

gestions and Chief Hansen has already told you about it, namely, to use a heavier lining over cleanings the very time that they are dumped off this site. I think it will go away with a lot of effort."

"I think the shower of complaints I received concerning your piggery were caused directly by the fact that a new Health Officer was on duty. A small in company of Chief Hansen, visit your property every two weeks in hot weather and once monthly in cold."

Political Issue

Meanwhile, Frank Clancy said that he believed some politicians could attempt to make a political issue out of the conditions in Foxon come the Fall election.

He said that at the present time, in view of Dr. Taylor's report he intends to do nothing regarding the protest since Mellilo is operating the piggery in a sanitary manner as can be expected and as prescribed by the health officer.

Clancy intimated that Frank Barker, present third selectman, and Republican candidate for First Selectman, might bring the piggery issue up in the election campaign in the Fall.

Barker is alleged to be against Mellilo's use of garbage for fodder for the pigs.

Newest Piggery Halted

This week saw the first round in the newest piggery battle that has raged between the people of Foxon and the piggery owner, Pasquale Mellilo.

In the Spring of 1953, an ordinance was passed at a town meeting forbidding the importing of garbage into East Haven. Mellilo collects garbage in the surrounding towns to feed his pigs.

Mellilo bought this ordinance less than a year later, Common Pleas Court Judge John

There are five good reasons why Mr. and Mrs. Rosa Maturio of 23 Sunset Hill, have taken a lead role in organizing and directing a number of Boy Scout units in this general area.

The "reasons", as Mr. Maturio smilingly pointed them out in Riverdale home, are the couple's five young sons. Of the five boys, two have already made an impressive record of achievement in scouting.

"The Maturios" are convinced that it offers their youngsters the best guide program of activities. But this is not the only reason that they have chosen themselves wholeheartedly into the Boy Scout movement.

Being Connected With Scouts. Mr. Maturio, a clerk at the Filing Box Company, has been with scouting ever since he joined Troop 22 in New Haven as a Scout. "Off and on" since

he has been connected with it in one way or another. At present he is Scoutmaster for Troop 44, sponsored by the Pilgrim Congregational Church in New Haven, a post he has had since 1953, and Cubmaster of Pack 44.

His interest was carried over to his wife, and Mrs. Maturio is a den-mother of Cub Pack 44 also under the sponsorship of the Pilgrim Church. "We've had a lot of fun" Mrs. Maturio said of her experiences as a supervisor of the Cub pack to which her three youngest sons, Thomas, 10, and William and Robert, 8-year-old twins, belong.

Other Boys Hold Awards. The two oldest boys are members of Troop 44 under their father. Alfred, who is 14, was made an Eagle Scout this past April 15 at a camp of honor of the Troop. He earned 21 merit badges to qualify, and today a

"Scoutmaster's Key" which he won in 1952. The special award is granted to those who have given outstanding leadership in scouting for at least three years and who have completed special training programs.

Also Candidate. As a Pack 44 den mother for the past three years, Mrs. Maturio also is now a candidate for a comparable honor, the "Scoutmaster's Award". She has served as a den mother since 1949 when she supervised the activities of Pack 20. Mrs. Rita Ralston, of Lenox St., New Haven is also a den-mother of Pack 44.

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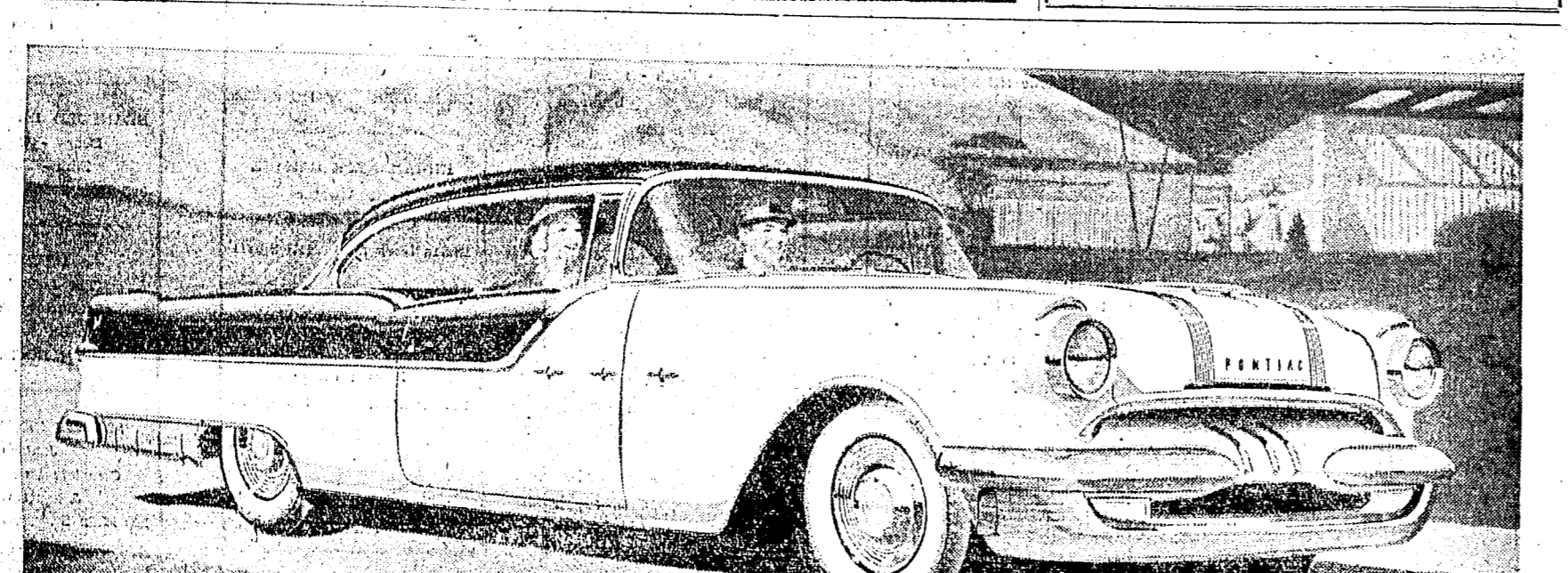

Every day, now that it's beach weather, I gather up my problems - physical and mental - and take them to the sand and the wind and the lapping water. Bank Officers To Be Selected At July 20 Meeting

A meeting of the incorporators of the Branford Savings Bank will be held at the bank July 20 at 8 p.m. Officers of the bank will be elected and reports of the action of the bank's directors will be submitted for approval. Recently, the directors of the bank voted a 3% interest dividend for all depositors. They also adopted a pension and group insurance plan for the bank's employees. Since the last incorporators' meeting, Savings Bank Life Insurance has been made available to the public at the bank. As a mutual savings bank, the Branford bank is owned by the depositors. The incorporators set up elect directors and officers to carry out the business of the bank under legal supervision. Since there are no stockholders in a mutual savings bank, the profits, after business expenses and a protective reserve are deducted, are returned to the owners, the depositors, of the bank. Mutual savings banks began in the early days with the idea of public-spirited citizens actually putting up guaranty funds from their own pockets to secure the small wage earner's savings. These were the first incorporators. Later, as the population of America spread south and west, other kinds of banking facilities were being organized and the guaranties necessary to set up mutual savings banks in new communities became more and more difficult to raise. The result is that today the people of only 17 states have the advantages of mutual savings banks. The incorporators of the local bank are Forrester L. Hammer, William H. Crawford, Roy C. Enquist, Lewis G. Hamilton, John S. Rogers, Louis B. Zacher, James A. Bradley, Frank B. Zawacki, Sidney V. Osborn, Jr., Irving C. Jacobs, Jr., Howard K. Prann, T. Holmes Bracken, Emil A. Nygard, Thomas E. Matthews, Michele Desl, Dana L. Blanchard, M.D., Oswin H. Robinson, John F. Zvonkovic, Salvatore F. Donadio, Gordon Bradley, Wallace H. Foote, Herbert R. Harrison and Herbert C. Holman. Delegates of 12 states met in Philadelphia in 1774 (Georgia was not then represented) and organized what has since been commonly called the Continental Congress.
