Probably it is age which inclines me toward more conservative Sunday papers now. But the enjoyment is as great, even if it takes all week to find time to read them.

I like the annual shopping of hundreds of things we can't buy—the quick research on books, records, plays, places to go and things to do. I liked the news of the week all Thursday—what who said on Tuesday because of what was done on Monday. I like to catch up with the world as it whirled, while I was revivifying on my own short-cut.

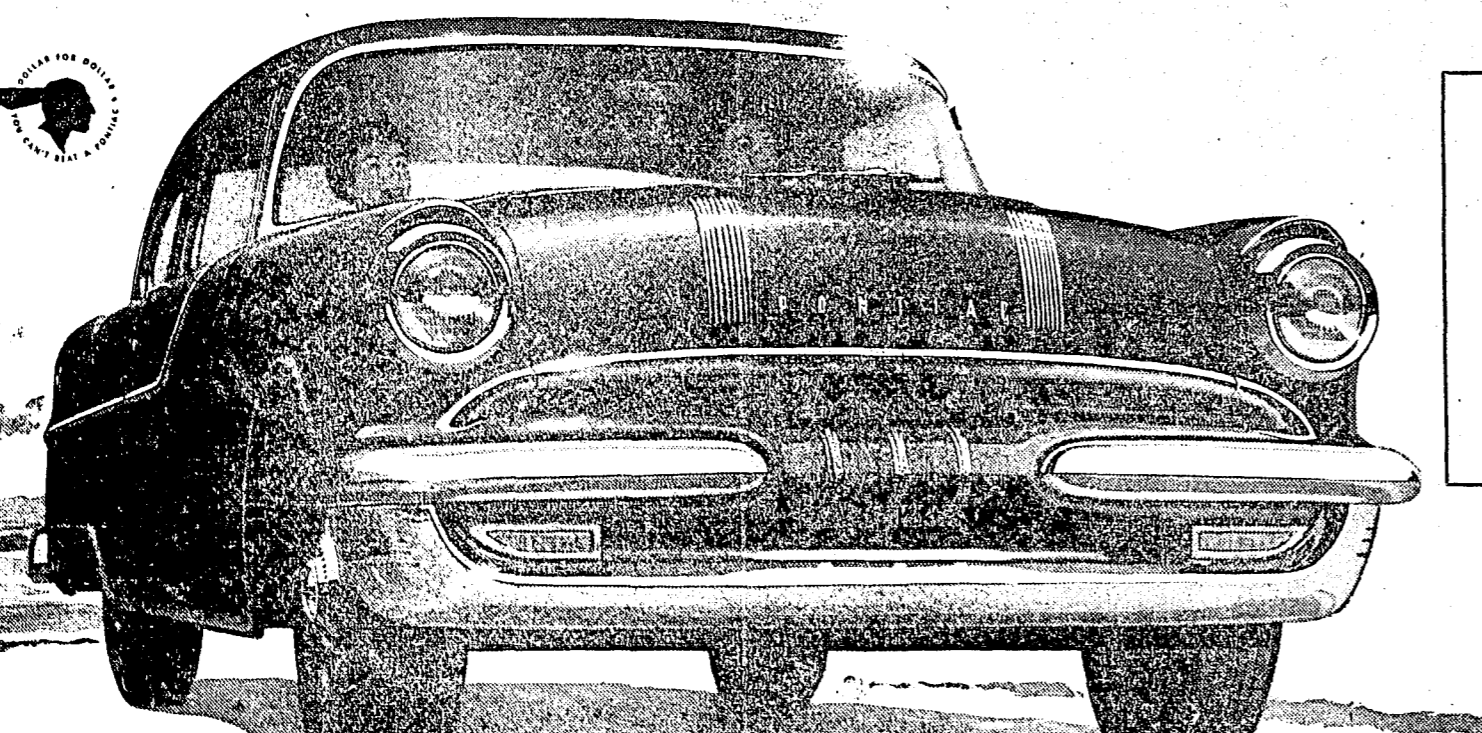

From Defeat To Freedom Riding With The Four Horsemen Of Apocalypse

(Ed. note: This is the second installment of the saga of the men of Bataan and Corregidor, written in commemoration of the 10th anniversary of the end of World War II.)

No sooner had I arrived back on Bataan than I again came down with malaria. This time it was the fourth attack. We were fording a small stream at the base of Mt. Mariveles when I collapsed.

Contrary to popular opinion, Corregidor was not the only fortified island at the mouth of Manila Bay. Actually Corregidor was one of many, and the one most helpless to an attack by land.

When the more heavily armed and the men who had escaped the barrage returned to aid those less fortunate. As stated 38 were in no need of any worldly help.

May 25, we leave Bataan for the last time. This time we rode out on trucks and were taken to Bilid prison. Having discovered a cache of sulphur drugs and malaria pills hidden in the jungle, the men are in pretty good shape. Weak but not suffering from malaria or dysentery.

A member of both of the early committees was James Cunningham, who has just completed his part of the work done by the Elementary School Building Committee.

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member, 1954, voters attended another town meeting. George Letis, committee chairman, described the site the committee had chosen on North High St., and the voters approved its purchase.

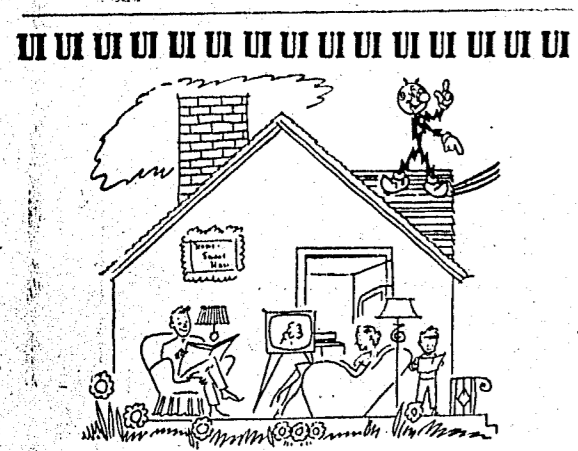

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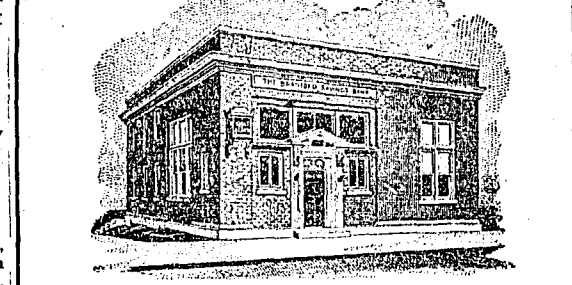
