Corbett Blasts Sewer **Project As Too Costly**

John Corbett, business mana-ger of the East Haven school proposed town sewer project, acquistion of property. They claiming that there were less expensive methods for cleaning up the town's polluted areas.

In his statement to the NEWS, Corbett said, that the premise on which the sewer project was founded was fallacious, and that such a program would not only increase the tax rate, but be-cause of such an increase would be a deterrent to attracting industry to East Haven,
Also, in lashing out at the

prospect of inducing industrial firms to set up in East Haven, Corbett, stated, "Is it necessary that every village in this beautiful New England area be an in-industrial town? Wasn't it the primary purpose of the people who moved here to get away from the asphalt jungles of the city. Education was elementary, not industry."

Too, the business manager said, that "if the installation of a sewer system is essential to the health and welfare of our town, why then hasn't the sewer committee seen fit to give a lucid explanation of every cost and obligation connected with such a grandeous project?"

"This explanation would be consistent with the recent de-tailed report on the present and future educational needs of the

No Need For a Sewer Authority Corbett stated that there was no need for a paid sewer authority, if the town wanted to clear

out the polluted areas.

"If the town is in earnest (to clean up pollution), rather than creating a sewer authority with two or three big salaried positions, they have other tools right in their hands to clean up the situation. You can notify the residents of any offending area that they must clean up the poll-ution, or the town will condemn the land as a public nuisance, and the town can buy that prop-

"The cost of acquiring a few "The cost of acquiring a few pieces of such property is infin-tesimal compared with a financ-ing a \$5,000,000 worth of sewers. The annual interest on \$5,000,000 is \$100,000. With that interest alone you could purchase property and remove the public nui-

"Too, they even considered buying \$600,000 worth of government subsidy with the \$5,000,000 project. This is bad business because, the \$600,000 will benefit relatively few of the people of this town, whereas the sewer costs will fall on everyone."

"The alleged sewer cost that has been project by the commit-tee does not include the cost of tee does not include the cost of connecting into the mains and laterals from the individual pieces of property. I am advised this will cost approximately \$200 per property owner. This money is going to be out-of-pocket."
