## Citizens' Committee Submits Questionnaire On 'Real Issues' To Fin. And Ed. Board Nominees

In line with their policy of submitting questionnaires to the candidates for First and Second Selectmen of East Haven, the newly formed Citizens' Committee this week sent a series of questions to the candidates for the Finance and Education boards.

The committee's questionnaire is broken down into two parts. The first of which is directed at the Board of Education nominees, and consists of two queries concerning East Haven schools. The second part consists of three questions pertaining to the Board of Finance.

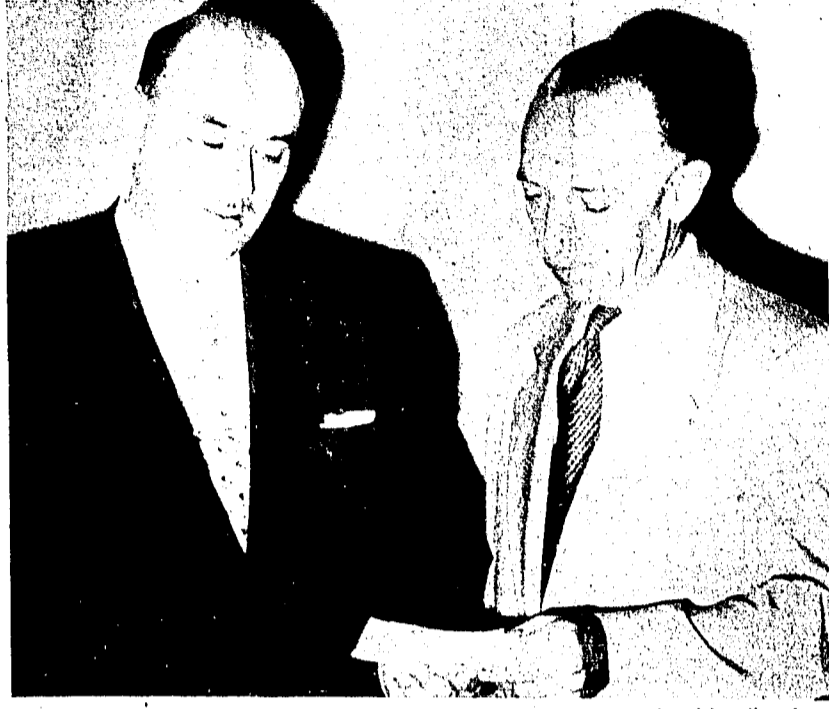
The Citizens' Committee in asking the candidates their views on the questions asked, state that it is "continuing its efforts to inform its members and focus public attention on the real issues in town government."

## Board of Education Appoints Three New School Custodians

At the regular meeting of the East Haven Board of Education last Friday night, three new high school custodians were appointed. It was announced by Francis Walsh, chairman of the board.

Of the three appointments, one is on a full-time basis and the others on a part time basis. The men appointed are Joseph Granitto, as a full time custodian to replace Arthur Rinaldo, who will leave the school system on Sept. 15; Angelo Baldino and Frank Piscatelli, part time custodians.

## East Haven Group To Meet Argraves In Hartford Fri.

A group of East Haveners, headed by First Selectman Frank S. Clancy, will travel to Hartford tomorrow to confer with Highway Commissioner Newman Argraves on altering the proposed feeder ramp for the Connecticut Turnpike (The Thruway).

In a previous meeting between the commissioner and the local group, Argraves refused to alter the design of the ramp on the grounds that any alteration would be costly.

However, Clancy and other East Haven businessmen maintain that the present plans, if carried out, would have the feeder constructed in such a fashion as to use up a good portion of the town's best industrially suited land.

## The activities of the committee, the questionnaire claims, "to date have stimulated the interest of a number of East Haven residents. Inquiries have been received from various parts of town and several persons have asked to be added to the roll of the group. In keeping with its policy the committee is eager to enlist new members but is making no effort to become a mass movement."

The questions submitted to the Board of Education are: 1. What do you consider the major problems facing the East Haven school system? In what ways are you better qualified to deal with these problems than your opponent?

2. Do you favor an expanding program of adult education and the use of school facilities as community centers?

3. The queries directed to the candidates for the Board of Finance are:

1. What do you take to be the function of the Board of Finance in planning town budgets?

2. Do you feel that a 35 mill tax rate can be maintained for the next two years?

3. If not, (ed. note: This apparently refers to Q. 2): To what level must taxes be raised? What specific costs of government will necessitate the increase? If a 35 mill rate can be maintained, is this to be done by economies in present services or the curtailment of expansion in town services? Or some other means?

## Clancy And Barker Ridicule Ferrara's Claim That He Was 'Maneuvered' Out Of Meeting

### Clancy 'Surprised' At Accusation Of Second Selectman

The accusation by Second Selectman Dominick H. Ferrara the First and Second Selectmen of East Haven had outmaneuvered him at the last meeting of the Board of Selectmen, at which the members of the school building committee were selected, started a verbal warfare in which he is being out-gunned by the other two members.

Yesterday First Selectman Frank Clancy issued a statement that followed on the heels of a blast set off by Third Selectman Frank A. Barker the day before.

Clancy claims that in view of the fact that he and Barker could have outvoted Ferrara had they wanted to make his allegations "look foolish." Clancy also claimed that Ferrara didn't know the difference between "collusion and cooperation."

Barker in his charges stated that if Ferrara "placed attendance at a dinner above the importance of a regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen, it is his job to excuse his absence, not to complain of excellent work done in his absence."

The Third Selectman also said he believes that Ferrara "deliberately absented himself" in order that he could attack the first steps initiated to see the town's junior high school program under way.

### 'No Comment'

The man in the middle, Dom Ferrara, when shown a copy of Clancy's press release by The NEWS, issued a "no comment" when asked about Clancy's claim as to whether or not he, Ferrara, wanted to see any or all of the committeemen appointed. Later, Ferrara amended his statement to "No comment—I'll answer you later."

Barker in his statement related that he and Ferrara arrived at the town hall first. They completed the routine business on hand some time before 8 p. m. (at which time Ferrara says he left). Barker said: "Ferrara approached me and said, 'It doesn't look as if there is going to be any meeting tonight.' Not knowing anything about Clancy's plans, I answered, 'Perhaps not—I don't know.' Ferrara then said, 'Well, I've got a dinner date to go to, and took off.' Needless to say, Ferrara and I do not have too many words with each other these days (ed. note: both are candidates for First Select-

man on opposing tickets), and if the above conversation "maneuvered" him out of the meeting, then he is very easily maneuvered."

Barker went on to say that he knew that a delegation of Forbes Place residents had said they would attend the meeting to discuss the traffic situation on that street, he decided out of courtesy to the group to be on hand should they arrive at the town hall.

"However," the Third Selectman said, "Ferrara had hardly left when Clancy came in. It was so close that I went out to see if I could call him back, but he had disappeared. Mr. Clancy arrived some time before 8 o'clock."

"In the light of Ferrara's statement to the press," Barker concluded, "and his distortion of the facts, it is now my belief that he deliberately absented himself from the meeting so that a cloud could be cast over the start of the Junior High School program."

"To Set Public Straight"

Clancy, whose letter is printed below, said that he wants "to set the public straight" on the facts surrounding the Sept. 1 meeting. The letter reads as follows:

"I was very much surprised, although maybe I should not have been, to read in the Sunday paper that Dom Ferrara has accused me of entering into some kind of a deal with Republican Frank Barker over the appointment of the Junior High School Building Committee."

"Just what he hopes to gain by such a statement I don't know, but I certainly intend to set the public straight on it."

"Ferrara's whole statement is political on the face of it. If Barker and I wanted to make deals we would not have to wait until Ferrara was off at a dinner somewhere."

"As a two out of three majority of the Board of Selectmen we could have voted in anyone we wanted. What could he have done about it if he had been sitting there as he should have been? That alone makes his claim that we schemed to get him out of the way look foolish."

"He also said that he waited until 8 o'clock for the meeting to start. When I came in I found the members of the Board of Finance waiting for me. Their meeting was not supposed to start until later so I asked them what time it was and it was 7:50."

"If Ferrara was still there at 8 o'clock, he was hiding somewhere. None saw him, but they did see me and they know what time I got there."

"The appointments themselves,

were as straightforward a piece of business as was ever transacted in this town."

"I asked the chairman of the Board of Education to recommend three board members for the committee as required by the vote of the Town Meeting. I felt that his recommendation should be accepted and Barker agreed."

"I had names that I wanted to propose for the other four spots and I expected the other Selectmen to propose names as they always do. Three out of the four spots went to Democrats. Does that sound like a deal with the Republicans?"

"No advance notice has ever been given out to either the Second or Third Selectman about what is going to be taken up at a Selectmen's meeting. We take up whatever business there is on hand, and anything new that has come up since the previous meeting."

Ferrara knows that. He knew, too, that we had to move fast on this Junior High School proposition because of the condition of our schools. He also knows that it is common practice to make appointments with only two Selectmen present."

"One thing I want to know is whether or not Ferrara wants to attack the men who were appointed. Does he think it is a

### \$220,000 To Be Spent By State On Shore Erosion

### West Silver Sands Beach Project To Be Part Of State Plan

In speaking before the South End Civic Association, John J. Curry, deputy state water commissioner, said Monday night that the State Water Commission is planning an erosion control project for the State's shoreline, and that West Silver Sands Beach, East Haven, was ticketed for \$220,000 worth of control work.

According to Curry this would constitute about one fourth of the necessary erosion control work planned for East Haven's coastline, which will ultimately cost an estimated \$650,000.

Other areas of the town's coast which will be taken care of in the future development of the erosion control plan are Momaugun Shell Beach and Silver Sands.

"West Silver Sands, as outlined by Curry, would be that part of Silver Sands Beach that lies between Pequot Street and Carolina Creek.

According to the plan presented by Curry to have the section from erosion by tides and hurricanes, groins or jetties, extending about 350 feet into the Sound would be created at 500 foot intervals. These groins would function to hold the new sand, sand to replace that which has been eroded, into place.

Curry said the money would be part of the \$2,000,000 that the Water Commission has been authorized to borrow under Public Act 520.

### Say Store Owner Continues To Defy Court Decision

### Town Counsel Says No Action Taken As Decision Appealed

Several property owners on Gerrish Avenue are incensed because the local court authorities have not seen fit to take action against the proprietor of a nearby store, whom the Court of Common Pleas ruled was barred from operating such an establishment by a ban of the East Haven Planning and Zoning Commission.

Cause of the discontent is Alex DelVecchio, of 28 Gerrish Ave., who converted an leechouse into a grocery store, despite the fact that the commission refused to grant him a permit to do so.

On August 25, Judge Sidney Johnson of the Court of Common Pleas ruled against DelVecchio, dissolved a temporary injunction and ordered him to cease and desist from doing further business. However, DelVecchio has to date ignored the court order and is still in business.

Oren Shorkey, of 31 Gerrish Ave., and Jack Garrity, of 28 Gerrish Ave., are now seeking to have DelVecchio conform to the commission's plan. Charles Copeland has not issued a warrant, nor has Richard Rilly, the Town Counsel, requested that one be issued.

Appeals Decision

According to Rilly, the reason he has not brought any punitive action is because DelVecchio's lawyer, William F. Geently, has filed an appeal against Judge Johnson's ruling and is seeking another temporary injunction, which if granted would stay in effect until the Supreme Court of Errors ruled on Judge Johnson's decision.

Rilly said that all any action on his part at this time could accomplish would be to close DelVecchio up for about two weeks until the Superior Court decides whether or not it should issue the temporary injunction.

In making his ruling on the case, Judge Johnson stated that by law, DelVecchio could change his premises which were non-conforming, as it was a business in a residential zone, provided such change could be accomplished for 50 percent of the assessed value of the building; also that in converting the leechouse into a store the building could not be enlarged.

The 50 percent ruling required that, in view of the fact the building (as an leechouse) was valued at \$330, DelVecchio was restricted to keep his renovation costs below \$165. The defendant argued that he had renovated the place at \$185, citing that much of the materials had been donated to him.

However, according to Judge Johnson, the outlay of cash was not the criterion since one could build a skyscraper from a chicken coop at no cost to himself if someone else supplied the materials, let the actual cost of the skyscraper would be much greater than 50 percent of the value of the chicken coop.

Also, the Judge found that in making the change, DelVecchio had enlarged the roof to cover a greater area than before, thereby enlarging the building.

Case Four Years Old

The history of the DelVecchio case began Sept. 5, 1951, when the businessman petitioned the Zoning Board of Appeals to remodel the leechouse. The board concurred on the grounds that the premises were not to be enlarged or its use changed.

However, on May 19, 1953, the Gerrish Avenue group represented by Tony DeVita, New Haven lawyer, appeared before the Zoning Commission to complain that signs posted about the remodelled premises indicated DelVecchio was planning to use the remodelled leechouse as a

**GOP First Selectman Candidate Answers Citizens' Committee Quiz**

Third Selectman Frank A. Blyden, candidate for First Selectman on the Republican ticket, has submitted his answers to the queries sent to him by the Citizens' Committee.

The committee in an effort to settle on the "real issues" of the coming campaign had sent a questionnaire to both political party candidates, "which dealt with what must be resolved if East Haven is to progress."

Question I: What do you consider the major problems facing East Haven today? (a) In what way are you better qualified to deal with these problems than your opponent? Answers: I believe that there are four major problems confronting East Haven at this time.

On the basis of personal ability, intelligence, background and general business ability I have no doubt that I am better qualified than any other man in the community to permit the public to make its own judgments on these points.

Question II: Do you feel that a 35 mill tax rate can be maintained for the next two years? If not, what level must taxes be reduced to? What specific items of government will necessitate the increase? If a 35 mill rate is to be maintained, in this I believe that the tax rate will be done by economies in the present services, or the curtailment of expansion in Town services. Or by some other means.

In answer to the first part of your question I must say, flatly, that no man being on this earth can possibly be able to predict the tax mill rate for East Haven in the next two years. It is for you some of the things that will decide whether or not the tax rate will be increased or go up or down. I believe that you will agree that they are beyond the control or influence of any man in any office, I offer them to you in list form.

1. The surplus or deficit in Town finances at the end of this fiscal year.

2. The rapidly and degree of school building which will affect the amount of money which the Town will be repaying on monies borrowed for that purpose.

3. Any increase or decrease in State aid to local schools.

4. Any later decision by the Federal Government to give aid to school buildings.

# Polio Vaccine Distributed Four Ways In Connecticut

1. Salk vaccine for the protection against the paralytic type of poliomyelitis has been available to certain of the children of the state through the free programs sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in 1954 and 1955. In the trial program of 1954 vaccine was offered to all second grade children of Hartford, Fairfield and Litchfield counties. In 1955 all of the children in the first four grades of these counties and in the first two grades of the rest of the state were offered the vaccine in free school clinics. About 28,000 children received the vaccine in 1954 and about 98,000 more got it in 1955, making a total of 126,000 children in the early grades of school who have received vaccine. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis will continue to supply vaccine until all the children who were in the 1954 program have received booster doses and all in the 1955 program have received second injections.

2. Poliomyelitis vaccine is available in the state through two other channels, state supply and commercial supply. The Connecticut General Assembly in 1955 voted \$100,000 for the purchase of vaccine for free use among the people of the state on whom it would be a financial hardship to purchase it. A part of this supply has been received by the state department of health and will be distributed in the same fashion as other biological materials — through local directors of health in the state upon recommendations of local physicians.

3. Commercially, vaccine is being received by physicians in the state for use among their private patients. Seventy-five per cent of available vaccine is being distributed in this manner. Many physicians have already received this vaccine through established drug supply channels.

4. In addition to existing state and commercial channels, vaccine will be available through a federal program. The Poliomyelitis Vaccination Assistance Act of 1955 makes money available to all states whose application is approved to buy poliomyelitis vaccine.

As with both the state and federal supplies of vaccine, persons who have usually obtained other immunizations for their children from their private physicians

may wish to continue this procedure rather than go to clinics.

Vaccine Still Limited to 5-9 Years Group

At present the use of poliomyelitis vaccine is limited to children from 5 to 9 years of age. It is this group which has in the past had the highest incidence of poliomyelitis. It is estimated there are about 89,000 children of these ages in the state who did not receive poliomyelitis vaccine under the program of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and are now eligible to receive it.

Course Of Vaccination

Poliomyelitis vaccine contains protective substances against all three known strains of polio virus. Immunization with this material should consist of a course of three injections. The first injection may be given at any time except to people in epidemic areas or in households where a case has just occurred. The second injection is effective anywhere from two weeks to six months after the first. The third injection seems to work best if it is held off for at least seven months after the second one, or before the beginning of the next poliomyelitis season. People who have had poliomyelitis in the past should receive the vaccine in spite of this. They have had experience with only one strain of virus and are not protected against the others. Vaccination protects against all three strains.

More than one-half million persons in 33 communities in New England are now drinking water from public supplies containing the necessary amount of fluoride to prevent dental decay.

Mrs. C. E. Smith, program chairman, introduced Mrs. Rosema Mueller of Fairfield whose subject was "What to Grow and How to Arrange It." The flower materials used for arrangements must be most carefully considered. It should have a clean-cut look, not exotic. Shrubs are essential for a bouquet as the foliage gives good background. The plum tree is, especially recommended. Six most attractive arrangements were demonstrated by Mrs. Mueller and were very unusual and attractive. No rigid rules have to be followed in arrangements — principles rather than rules were advised.

The arrangements shown had a decided Japanese influence. The first, a brown, flat container held canna seed pods and leaves. The second, amethyst color, small glass vase held red single and double dahlias. In the third, an alabaster vase held white gladioli, white, butterfly bush, asters and snowberry. Fourth: dining room table, dark vase, purple butterfly bush, blue and purple delphiniums, pink coxcomb and

scabiosa. Fifth: cattails, sassafras, funkia in a small vase. Sixth: large light green vase, red spider spray with large white flowers.

Mrs. Mueller urged all gardeners to plan gardens to grow what will be attractively arranged. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Frank Bigelow, Mrs. David Daggett, Mrs. John Kirby, Mrs. A. E. Hammer, Mrs. A. W. Bowman and Mrs. W. R. Smith.

As summer fades many gardeners relax their dusting and spraying program. This is a mistake as black spot on roots gains a foothold. An all-purpose dust will keep the foliage clean and plants thriving. Dust zinnias and chrysanthemums to prevent mildew and watch for late broods of aphids, especially on chrysanthemums and nasturtiums. Nicotine sulphate, such as Black Leaf 40, will give prompt results. The fragrance of rose-garantums, rather than the insignificant blossoms, is one of the reasons for its popularity. A small plant set out in Spring will have grown by now to a sturdy size with handsome, grey-green, crinkly leaves. A few sprigs will add much to a bouquet. For a subtle flavor when making crab-apple jelly, place a small leave in part of the glasses before filling them. Instead of attempting to bring a big plant indoors and carry it through the winter, take three or four cuttings and root them in pots of damp sand. Remove lower leaves and insert about two inches deep in the sand, pressing it firmly around the stems.
