

It's Friday night, and on the bustling streets of Mumbai, a girl heads out with her family to the cinema. As she rides through the winding blocks with her maa, baba, and bhai, old melodies fill the car. And as she captures the sights and sounds of the city with her camera, she imagines a movie unfolding before her eyes. And finally comes the best part: time for everyone to jump up and dance!

Reading age: 3—7 years old.

Back in the day, there was a heckuva party, a jam, for a word-making man. The King of Letters. Langston Hughes. His ABCs became drums, bumping jumping thumping like a heart the size of the whole country. Teens & Young Adults





AVAILABLE IN LARGE PRINT: In

the midst of World War II, an English musician, Norah Chambers, places her eight-year-old daughter Sally on a ship leaving Singapore, desperate to keep her safe from the Japanese army as they move down through the Pacific. Sister Nesta James, a Welsh Australian nurse, has enlisted to tend to Allied troops. But as Singapore falls to the Japanese she joins the terrified cargo of people, including the heartbroken Norah, crammed aboard the *Vyner Brooke* merchant ship.

AVAILABLE IN LARGE PRINT: In 1960s Southern California, in an era when women are expected to be housewives, Carol Donnelly breaks the mold as a legendary female surfer struggling to compete in a male-dominated sport—and her daughters, Mindy and Ginger, bear the weight of Carol's unconventional lifestyle.

AVAILABLE IN LARGE PRINT: Ali-

son has never been a fan of Christmas, but with it right around the corner and her husband busily decorating their cozy Vermont home, she has no choice but to face it—and then she gets the call. Mavis, Alison's estranged mother, has been diagnosed with cancer and has only weeks to live. She agrees to take in Mavis, though when things begin not to add up, and as the holiday festivities turn into a nightmare, she must confront just how far she is willing to go to protect her family.



AVAILABLE IN LARGE PRINT:

The reunion isn't exactly a beautiful arrangement—considering they're as compatible as ranchers and coyotes. AVAILABLE IN LARGE PRINT:

Tricia is a shy newlywed, married to a rising attorney on loan to navy intelligence; Charlene is a practiced corporate spouse and mother of three, a beauty and a bully. In Saigon in 1963, the two women form a wary alliance as they balance the era's mandate to be "helpmeets" to their ambitious husbands with their own inchoate impulse to "do good" for the people of Vietnam.


AVAILABLE IN LARGE PRINT:





Geddy Lee is one of rock and roll's most respected bassists: for nearly five decades, his playing and work as co-writer, vocalist and keyboardist has been an essential part of the success story of Canadian progressive rock trio Rush. But long before Rush accumulated more consecutive gold and platinum records than any rock band after the Beatles and the Rolling Stones, Geddy Lee was Gershon Eliezer Weinrib. As he recounts the transformation, Geddy looks back on his family, in particular his loving parents and their horrific experiences as teenagers during World War II.

AVAILABLE IN LARGE PRINT:

Rikers Island jail complex is the largest correctional facility in the city, housing eight active jails and thousands of incarcerated individuals who have not yet been tried. It is also one of the most controversial and notorious jails in America—and more so when, in 2017, it was announced that Rikers would be closed within the next decade, replaced with four jails within the city's boroughs.

Thanks to Julius Caesar, "crossing the Rubicon" has become a synonym for bold decision-making when the risks are great—but the rewards can be greater. Now, historian and bestselling author Alan Axelrod analyzes the Roman emperor as a business leader, using an engaging, conversational style to explore six inspirational principles that constitute his guiding tenets.

With her arrival on the music scene in the early 1980s, Madonna generated nothing short of an explosion—as great as that of Elvis or the Beatles—taking the nation by storm. Deftly tracing Madonna's story from her Michigan roots to her rise to super-stardom, master biographer Mary Gabriel captures the dramatic life and achievements of one of the greatest artists of our time.
