


Mrs. Quinn's Rise to Fame by Olivia Ford







Despite gold medals, WNBA championships, and a list of accolades, A'ja Wilson knows how it feels to be swept under the rug-to not be heard, to not feel seen, to not be taken seriously. Dear Black Girls is a necessary and meaningful exploration of what it means to be a Black woman in America today-and a rallying cry to lift up women and girls everywhere.

Kate is a pop culture commentator and host of the popular millennialfocused podcast Be There in Five. With her trademark style and vulnerability, she tackles AOL Instant Messenger, purity culture, American Girl Dolls, going out tops, Spice Girl feminism, her feelings about millennial motherhood, and more. Kate's laughout-loud asides and keen observations will have you nodding your head and maybe even tearing up.

At just twenty-one years old, Crystal Harris' life changed forever when she attended a party at the notorious Playboy mansion: picked out of the crowd by Hugh Hefner, she became one of his infamous "girlfriends," attending glamorous Hollywood parties and traveling the world. This candid memoir provides a fascinating look behind the scenes at a powerful cultural icon and brand, and an equally empowering perspective on hard-won lessons about who we allow to determine our value.

Growing up in Brooklyn, New York, it never occurred to Uché and her twin sister, Oni, that they would be anything but physicians. In the 1980s, their mother headed an organization of Black women physicians, and for years the girls watched these fiercely intelligent women in white coats tend to their patients and neighbors, host community health fairs, cure ills, and save lives.
